Dr. Charles E. McCollum will be the guest minister at the third anniversary service for Eddie Wayne Lawrence, pastor of Greenwood Baptist Church. The service will be held at the church, located on Martin Luther King Blvd. in Warrenton, at 4 p.m. Sunday, June 4.

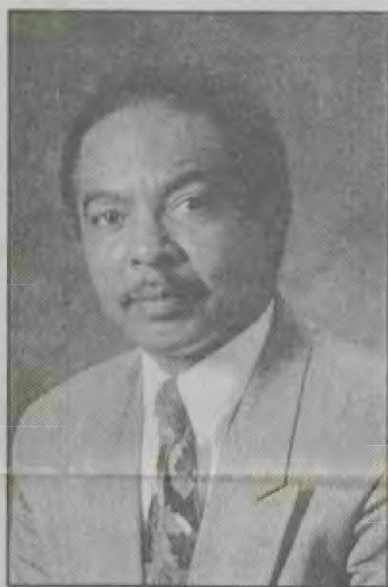
Dr. McCollum has served as senior pastor of Oak Grove Baptist Church in Littleton since 1975 and the Piney Grove Baptist Church in Halifax since 1977. He is also the founder and president of Eastern North Carolina Theological Institute. In addition, he is founder and executive facilitator of the Prayer Warrior's Network Ministries.

Dr. McCollum is a transition specialist at the Department of Correctional Education Adult School at Southampton Center in Capron, Va. A veteran employee of 19 years, he has served as adult basic education teacher for 17 years and has spent the past two years as transition specialist.

He received his undergraduate degree from Shaw University in Raleigh, and through studies at various Virginia graduate school programs has received the State Board of Education's endorsement in adult learning. He has a master of ministry degree from the International Seminar and Bible Institute and a doctor of theology degree from the Interdenominational Seminary and College of Theism.

Dr. McCollum has taken pride not only in the accomplishments achieved with growing churches, but also the successes achieved through working with incarcerated students, young men with low or poor reading skills who passed literacy tests or GEDs or whose reading and comprehension skills increased significantly.

As a transition specialist, for VDCE Southampton he has written a number of projects that are now a functional part of the transition program, including:

"Transition Out Program," "Project Reach" and "Steer Straight."

Dr. McCollum's goal is to see ex-offenders become responsible, reliant, dependable and contributing members of society.

Dr. McCollum is active in numerous local, regional and national religious affiliations and has written two books: *Becoming An Effective Prayer Warrior* and *Enhancing Ministry through Counseling*. In addition, he has recorded two albums, and a new one is planned for release this year.
