WAKE FOREST FORENSIC TEAMS SELECTED IN SPIRITED CONTEST

Hopkins, Malone, Wall, Baker,
Cloer and Gaskill New Men
Selected For Teams

SEASON OPENS MARCH 18

Queries Ten Debates Announced;
Schedule Featured by Inva-
sions South and Southwest

The tryouts for the selection of debaters to bear the forensic colors were held last week. On Thursday night the Euzelians came forward to cast several hats in the ring. Friday night found the Philomathesians contesting among themselves for places on the teams.

The faculty judges heard no less than fifteen speeches and on Friday night wrote their decision. The first debate on the schedule is with the University of Arizona, at Wake Forest, March 18th. The Arizona team debates some twenty-eight times before coming to Wake Forest, and this visiting team of two men won the championship in the West last year and has faced Oxford with a successful decision. The team is composed of veteran debaters, one member being a Rhodes Scholarship man from Arizona. At Wake Forest, the team will debate the question of the present enforcement of prohibition. Wake Forest will be represented in this debate by J. S. Hopkins and O. L. Norment. This will be the first open-forum debate held here, and a great deal of interest will result from this feature of the debate.

The University of Richmond will meet Wake Forest on the latter's territory on April 2d. J. T. Gaskill, Elmer Cloer, and T. W. Baker will argue for the Deacons on the question of Government control and operation of coal mines. April 9th will find Wake Forest contending with the University of Pittsburgh at Wake Forest on the coal mines question. C. B. Eary, L. B. Moseley, and F. H. Malone will compose the home team in this

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EDUCATION CLUB TO BE ABSORBED AS SIGMA CHAPTER OF KAPPA PHI KAPPA

Wake Forest Chapter Will Be
First Installed in North Carolina
by National Educational
Fraternity.

A telegram received by Mr. A. D. Hurt, president of the Education Club, made the granting of a chapter of Kappa Phi Kappa, a National Educational Fraternity, almost a surety at Wake Forest. This is the only undergraduate national educational fraternity in this country.

The Kappa Phi Kappa was organized at Dartmouth College, and with the proposed chapter at Wake Forest, the fraternity will have eighteen chapters. A number of the chapters are in the New England States; some others are at the University of Pennsylvania, Syracuse University, Miami University, Birmingham Southern College, College of William and Mary, and Washington and Lee University. The chapter at Wake Forest will be the Sigma chapter of the fraternity. Information has been received from the National Secretary that the chapter here will be installed February 27.

It is through the work of the Education Club that the granting of this chapter will have been made possible.

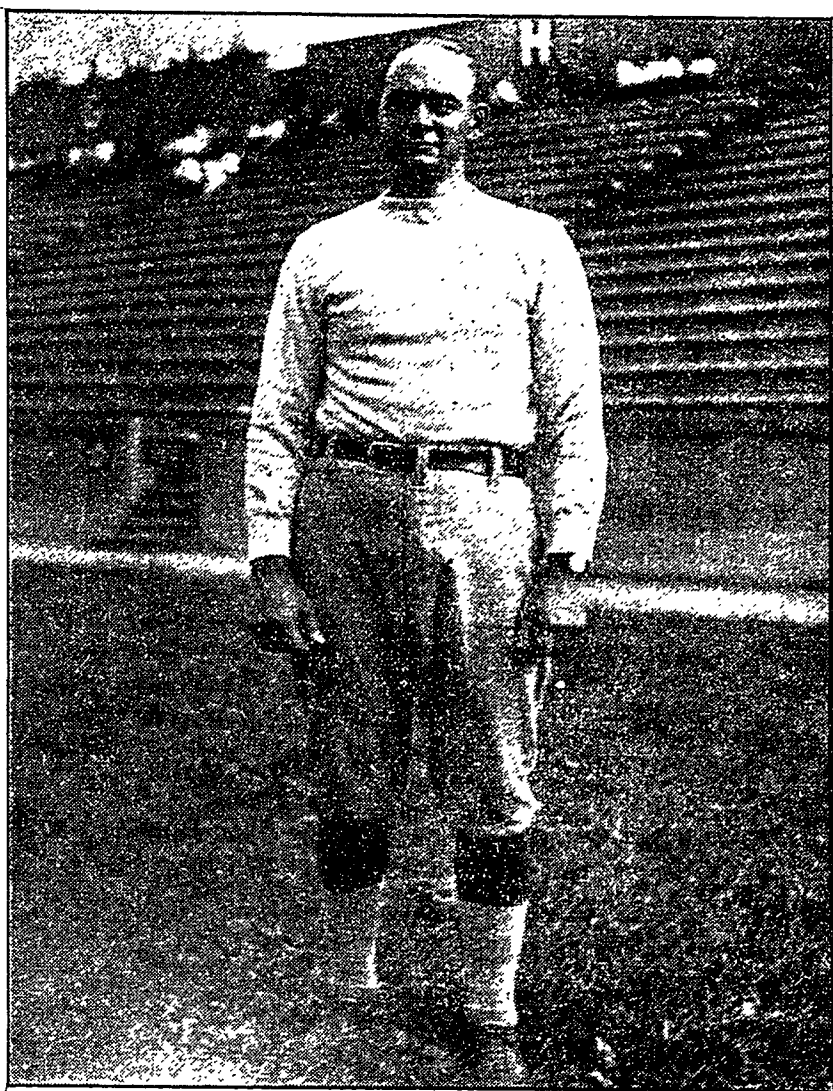
Old Gold and Black Recipient Of Praise

BASEBALL PRACTICE BEGINS WITH PROSPECTS BRIGHTEST EVER SEEN

Frank Armstrong Only Man Among Last Year's State Champions
Not Back; Caddell Also Has 1925 Championship Fresh-
man Team to Get Material From

John Caddell, recently elected varsity baseball coach for the coming season, has sounded the clarion call for indoor baseball practice, and every afternoon since Monday has seen the prospective pitchers and catchers working out in the gym. Coach Caddell says the weather will figure largely in determining the time for regular field practice to begin. He said, however, that the first real work-out would probably begin some time next week.

With ten letter men back from last year's State Championship team and a wealth of material from the 1925 freshman team, also State Champions, indications are now that the Demon Deacon baseball team of 1926 will be just as strong if not stronger than last year. Frank Armstrong, premier first-sacker, is the only regular from the 1925 team that will not be back this year.

The pitching staff for the coming season should be one of the greatest that has ever represented Wake Forest College. Simmons and Sorrell, star hurlers from the 1925 team, are back again and are bidding fair to outshine their previous successes. Sorrell, who was selected for every all-state team picked last year, should do the best work of his career this year. "Big Sim" is also scheduled to do some

good pitching for the Demons this year. These two veterans should be able to hold down the twisting for this year alone; but Ralph James and Key Joyner, both All-State Freshmen pitchers last year, will be in condition to back up these older men when necessity demands it. James is the man that, in a post-season game between the Wake Forest Freshman and varsity teams at Henderson last year, turned back the varsity State Champs with two hits and no runs, and won his game 1-0. Key Joyner also did some brilliant pitching for the Little Deacons last year. Coach Caddell certainly need not lose any sleep over his hurling staff.

To hold the offerings of these four hurlers, Coach Caddell has a pair of letter men and one freshman from the '25 team. Hood is the man that did practically all the catching for the varsity last season. This year marks the finish of his career here. LeRoy Martin is the other letter man who will work behind the bat this year. Martin was not here last year, but has had three years of varsity experience. "Phoebe" Phelps, man-size catcher on the newish team last year, will also get his chance this year.

Next, the Davidson freshmen journeyed down to Wake Forest and promptly received their second drubbing of the year from the Little Deacons. The score was 26-13. In a second game with the Duke freshmen Wake Forest avenged a former defeat by licking the Methodists, 12-11.

The largest crowd ever to witness a basketball game at Chapel Hill packed the tin can last Tuesday night to see the Tar Heels submerge the Wake Forest quint under by a 22 to 22 score. The game was slow and uninteresting during the opening period, with both teams displaying some ragged work at times. The Carolinians could not get started till the closing minutes of the game when they opened up and rushed the Baptists off their feet.

Carolina started the scoring in the first minute of play on a foul goal, but the Wake Forest five came back and took the lead on a field basket by Ellington. The lead saw-sawed for a few minutes, with the Deacons jumping to the front at 10 to 15. A time out for Carolina instilled new pep into the Phantoms' attack, and before half time they piled up six counters and led the Baptists 11 to 10 at intermission.

"Sprodie" Cobb scored the goal that put the Tar Heels in front on a long pot shot from the sidelines.

Former Lehigh Coach Elected
by Athletic Council Over
Many Applicants

James Baldwin was elected as Head Coach and Director of Athletics at Wake Forest on last Wednesday at a joint meeting of the Athletic Council of the college, an Alumni Committee, and a Committee of three Trustees, held in Raleigh. Baldwin's selection comes as no surprise to those closely connected with the athletic affairs of the college, as he had recently interviewed the officials of the college and had personally looked over the situation on a visit to the college last week. President Potat also had a satisfactory conference with the former Lehigh coach in New York.

The Athletic Council, in making its selection, was supported by practically all the Alumni together with the President's recommendation. There only remains the approval of the action of the Athletic Council by the Board of Trustees before the selection is definitely confirmed. However, it is considered as a matter of course that the Trustees will concur in the selection of Baldwin.

The length of the contract with Baldwin is left to the discretion of the Trustees, with the Council's recommendation that a three-year contract be offered, with the opportunity of renewing the contract at the expiration of the first period.

Coach Baldwin will report for spring football practice, probably beginning his regime about March 1. He will have direct control of the three major sports, with the assistants to be elected later.

The newly elected coach is well qualified for the position as Director of Athletics. He received his football

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Prof. White's Home Destroyed By Fire

College Classes Temporarily Dis-
continued While Students
Fight Fire

A sheet of flame spread over and gutted the residence of Professor R. B. White, member of the Law School faculty, last Friday morning at 9:30. College classes were temporarily discontinued while a majority of the students rushed to the northern extreme of the town to fight the fire and remove the household furnishings from the burning building. It was only after the interior had been practically demolished that the flames were harnessed.

First signs of the lumbering flame were detected by a member of the family as it was briskly eating a hole in the shingle roof above the kitchen. The dwelling is a large two-story structure, except for the kitchen. The

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FRATERNITIES

The rushing season and the 1926 Bid Day have passed, and the rivalry between the several fraternities has ceased. The editor is now called upon for the annual dissertation upon fraternities. However, the treatment of this subject will be somewhat different from editorials of preceding years. There are a few creeping tendencies which we must fortify our fraternities against, and which we should not allow to enter into fraternities at Wake Forest as they have at other schools.

Fraternities should not be ends within themselves. A fraternity must have purposes and ideals by which to raise the standards of its respective groups, and to develop the best of each individual in that group. A fraternity which persists in limiting its advantages and influence to the few and mapping out its program of activity in relation to its own inside circle is not accomplishing the end to which it was established. Too often, chapters of fraternities neglect to carry out the high standards which their founders incorporated in their constitutions, and in their place create new and false standards. They violate the spirit of brotherhood, which is the fundamental principle of fraternalism, when they become selfish and snobbish towards their larger brotherhood of the world.

Thus far in the history of Wake Forest fraternities there has been little of "snobbishness" evidenced. The line between fraternity and non-fraternity men has not and should not be drawn. There is a complete accord at present existing between the two groups on the campus.

Again, we would warn against fraternity politics entering in student elections. We have no evidence of any political frame-ups among the fraternities whatsoever. It can truthfully be said that Wake Forest is virtually free of political machines—at least as far as fraternities are concerned. However, we throw this out as a warning, to steer clear of this evil which has entered in the student elections of various universities.

As a last precaution, we shall offer our advice to the Freshmen who have received fraternity bids. It is not our purpose to console those Freshmen who failed to receive bids, but to warn the fraternity pledges of an egotism which is so likely to be acquired after Bid Day. A fraternity pledge is sometimes a test of real character; a Freshman who is recognized as a student of desirable and likeable qualities by a number of fraternity groups and who still remains the same boy he was before such recognition was extended is one to be lauded. Too often fraternity men consider themselves situated on a high pedestal of social standing, above their fellow-students who are not allied with fraternities. This is a distorted conception of fraternalism and should receive the condemnation of every fraternity

on the hill. Therefore, our warning to the pledges would be not to develop an expansion of the head—an egotism which is recognized only by yourself.

We have given these warnings against harmful tendencies not as an indication that these tendencies exist in the fraternities at Wake Forest, but as a precaution for the future. Fraternities at Wake Forest have fully justified their existence, and it is hoped that they will continue to maintain the high standards and ideals and the spirit of brotherhood, for whose promotion they were established.

DISTORTED NEWS

The daily newspapers of the State have recently devoted their activity to a sphere not their own, in attempting to dictate the policies of the several colleges of the State. They have created unauthentic reports; they have distorted news concerning the different educational institutions until the officials of the colleges of the State are continually kept in a state of amazement as to the reports which purport to come from the colleges.

Only last week there appeared a news article in the *News and Observer* which virtually announced that Wake Forest had selected its official athletic coach; that the selection needed only the President's O. K. when, as a matter of fact, the Council and the Trustees have not, as this issue of OLD GOLD AND BLACK goes to press, taken any definite action in this regard. It was true that Baldwin and the athletic officials of the college engaged in a conference which may result in a definite decision, but why should the newspapers of the State attempt to exaggerate reports, to distort news to fit their own desires, and thereby attempt to dictate our policies?

Another instance—a brilliant writer of the staff of the *Greensboro Daily News*, in a report to that estimable paper last year, had Dr. Potat resigned as President of the college and Dr. John E. White elected to the vacancy. In addition to creating an embarrassing situation for the two persons involved, the report was supported by no authority, and the basis of the article was either purely hearsay or conceived in the imagination of the writer. Numerous instances of this same course pursued by newspaper writers of the State present themselves.

In this connection, the colleges and universities of the State feel that they are fully able to pursue their own policies. We admit that the quest for news stories is a difficult task, but why should we have distorted news, articles of the "going-to-be-but-never-happen" variety, and articles which do not have the authentic approval of the parties concerned and yet purport of finality? We would suggest to several reporters that they should play "Hands Off" until matters are definitely stamped with authority, thereby giving to the press the advantage of reliable reports instead of distorted news.

DESTRUCTION OF COLLEGE PROPERTY

Within the past few weeks the college has experienced an unprecedented outburst of a disregard for the preservation of college property—almost vandalism. Bostwick Dormitory was the worst sufferer of the attacks of these student marauders. An expenditure of seventy-two dollars was necessary to replace doors which were broken down. An investigation was ordered by the Faculty Executive Committee, but the offenders or the motive for such an action could not be determined. The Council is now working on the problem.

The spirit which prompted such an unwarranted action holds no place at Wake Forest; it is not characteristic of the institution and must be blotted out. Judging from recent occurrences, however, there seems to be a growing disregard for the college property by a few students.

The popular conception of some students is that they are renters of college property. Following this conception, they commit acts of indifferent carelessness, destroy college property, and in general think that the institution is financially able to bear the brunt of their whimsical fancy—brute joy—in the destruction of college property. What pleasure one can experience in breaking down doors, smashing windows and, in short, committing acts of "collegiate vandalism" is beyond the power of the writer's imagination.

There must be some organized ef-

fort by the Student Council, backed by the student-body, in an endeavor to determine who these midnight hawks were who delight in preying upon college property. If any student happens to know the identity of any member of the destructive band, he should report the offender to the Council. In reporting the perpetrators of the act, he is not acting in the capacity of a tattler, but is only carrying out the responsibility attendant upon him as a student of Wake Forest to preserve better conduct upon the campus.

The spirit of an institution determines the conduct of an institution. Since this is a foreign and detrimental spirit at Wake Forest, it must be stamped out by severe measures if necessary. It is hoped that Council will mete out sufficient punishment to the perpetrators of the act, if they can be determined, to assure the college that the offense will not be duplicated.

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training on the varsity eleven of Dartmouth. After leaving the New Hampshire college he became head coach at the University of Maine. He was then elected Director of Athletics of Trinity College, now Duke University. During his one year's stay at Duke he produced the "Wonder Team," which was the surprise of the North Carolina collegiate football world. Wake Forest has just reason to remember his work at Duke for its smarting defeat at the hands of Duke when a substantial victory was predicted. The next year, Baldwin was offered more financial inducements by Lehigh University of Bethlehem, Penn., to become head coach of that institution. During his three-year regime at Lehigh the athletic teams of the university received national recognition. In 1924, the last year of Baldwin's tutelage at Lehigh, only Lafayette defeated Lehigh, by a lone touchdown. Included in the season's record were ties with Princeton, Holy Cross, and Rutgers. Baldwin also brought to Lehigh the Pennsylvania championship in both basketball and baseball.

Baldwin received the best recommendations from the institutions at which he coached, both as a coach of rare ability and as a man of magnetic personality. His election is a most popular one with the followers of Deacon athletics. He received the election over a list of prominent football coaches, among them being Rip Major of Wofford, Crumb of Princeton, Freshman Coach Bob Hays of Missouri and Wake Forest, Harry Rabenhorst, a former star on the Wake Forest football team and now coaching at Louisiana State University, D. F. Oaks and Rokusek, both former University of Illinois stars and at present on the coaching staff of that institution. Ostie, former Center College coach, and many other prominent applicants.

Coach Baldwin is married and is at present living at Cape Cod, Massachusetts, where he has been engaged in business for the last year. However, the lure of the gridiron was too great, and Coach Baldwin will now begin at Wake Forest anew. It is not known definitely when he plans to move his family to Wake Forest.

forensic battle. This team will also journey west in May for three debates: Birmingham Southern College, Birmingham, Ala.; Baylor University at Waco, Texas, and Simmons University at Houston. The latter debate will be held before the Southern Baptist Convention.

Wake Forest will debate for the third consecutive time William and Mary, which debate will be held at Wake Forest, date unsettled. D. S. Haworth and R. E. Wall will represent the home team.

The most coveted positions on the entire schedule are those on the team that goes to South Carolina to meet Furman University, then to Macon, Ga., to meet Mercer, thence to Atlanta, to meet Emory University. This southern schedule is the most important in many respects. Unlike the western schedule, which embraces colleges far outside our sphere of activities, this southern schedule includes strong universities which are within a reasonable radius. Wake Forest sends two of her experienced debaters, and two who are generally conceded to be the strongest, to meet the schools on this schedule. These debaters are A. S. Gillespie and C. R. Tew. These men made a record marked with no defeats last year, and this is the second time they will work together on a forensic schedule.

There are twelve men in all who compose the teams for this year. The schedule is not reported as completed yet, and other debates will likely be arranged on the query of the present enforcement of the 18th Amendment, and on the question for debate between Wake Forest and the University of Richmond.

origin of the fire has never been learned. There is not a single clue in the house. It is not known whether the fire started from the outer or underside of the roof. Once it began its destructive work, it gained headway and spread in all directions.

Many distorted tales went the rounds as to the arrival of the local fire department upon the scene. They seemed only to corroborate as to a rather tardy arrival of the fire annihilators. The fire department at Franklinton was communicated with after the one uptown, but was playing its stream of water upon the blaze first.

Members of the student-body fought in the fashion of true fire-fighters against the red-tongued property destroyer. All the help necessary was available for carrying the furnishings of the home from the burning building. Practically everything of any value was rescued from the flames by members of the local fire department and students who volunteered their services. A law library valued at several thousand dollars, which was probably the professor's most precious belonging, was removed unharmed. The building was stripped of everything. Bathroom fixtures, mantle pieces, doors, and all were torn loose and dragged out. One freshman was thoughtful enough to take even the grate from the fireplace and carry it outside.

The residence, which was valued at around twelve or fifteen thousand dollars, was located on a corner of North Faculty Avenue. The damages done will probably amount to near six thousand dollars. Insurance will partially cover it.

After the fire, Dr. Hubert Potat tendered Prof. White and his family the use of his home, where they have been since the misfortune and will probably stay until a house can be secured. Students roomed on the second floor of the residence. Prof. White plans to rebuild immediately.

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Worship Ought To Characterize Life

Parson Bagby Pleads For More Worship of God, in Sunday Morning Sermon

"Worship is the one thing above all else that God desires," said Dr. A. Paul Bagby, pastor of the local Baptist church, last Sunday morning during a sermon devoted to the theme of "Worship."

In part, Dr. Bagby further said: "It is the one thing we can withhold from God. All things belong to Him. It was in the creation of man that God took a risk. The vaster the universe the greater is the value of the human

soul. It is not belittling God or exalting man to say that they are kindred spirits. We can withhold from God our worship.

"What is worship? Elements in it are prayer, love, life, etc. But worship is receptivity. The sacrifice of God is a broken heart and a contrite spirit. Worship is receptivity.

"Worship ought to characterize every phase of life. If the people of this town really realized their own need, if the young men of the college really realized their own need, and if we had real worship here, the house would not hold the people. Oh, if we could worship God. Have we mocked Him?"

The Sunday evening service was given to a discussion of Esau, this being the second sermon in a series on Old Testament prodigals.

"Esau was a man of animal appetites. The world had a pull on him. The physical powers in him were unbridled. He did not appreciate the birthright.

"The emphasis was on the physical as over against the spiritual. I wonder what sacrifice we make that we may pass the 'red pottage.' Esau sold his birthright for the satisfaction of the physical. I do not believe there is one but that believes eternal life is from Jesus Christ, but what good does it do? Esau tried to regain that which he had sold by the wrong method.

"One of the sins of today is trying to seize the kingdom through intellectual processes. This is verily crucifying Christ afresh. All our plans are for having the rich blessings of God, but we fall before weaknesses. Esau acted, not only for himself, but also for his descendants, the Edomites."

The subject for next Sunday morning service is "Essential of Worship."

Education Club Hears Superintendent Best

The Superintendent of Franklin County Schools Discusses the Rural School Problem

The Education Club in its regular meeting February 5 heard Superintendent E. L. Best, of Franklin County. Mr. Best was for eight years associated with State College Summer School and for two years with Wake Forest Summer School.

The speaker discussed practical problems in the field of educational work. No man has a truer conception of North Carolina's school problems than does Mr. Best. "What can you do to increase your professional status?" was the first question raised by the speaker. He emphasized the fact that teaching is nothing short of a profession, and that an interest in the professional career is necessary on the part of every one who wishes to make his influence felt.

Superintendent Best brought before the club in a clear manner the big rural school problem in North Carolina. "The problem is," the speaker said, "giving the country boys and girls an equal advantage with town boys and girls." That means, the speaker said, an eight months minimum term, a good plant, and better-trained teachers.

The teacher's work links him in a vital way to the interests of the community in which he works. "The teacher's relation to the community is a vital question in the mind of both patron and teacher," declared Mr. Best.

Downey Reports On Memphis Conference

State Groups of Student Conferences to Give Way to South-wide Conference

R. P. Downey, president of the Wake Forest Baptist Student Union, attended the committee meeting of the Southwide Baptist Student Conference, held in Memphis, Tenn., January 29.

One student delegate, representing the Baptist colleges and schools of the State, was sent from each of the seven Southern States, to confer with Dr. Frank H. Leavell, executive secretary of the Inter-Board Commission, concerning plans for the Southwide Baptist Student Conference to be held at Birmingham, Ala., October 28-31, 1926.

If the great plans that have been made by this committee are carried out the Birmingham Conference will be the greatest of its kind ever held in the South. The Baptist Student Conference of the individual Southern States are to be abandoned, giving place to this one great South-wide Student Conference.

Some of the speakers who will very likely be on the program for this conference are: Dr. George W. Truett, Dr. J. Powell Tucker of Selma, Ala.; Dr. Henry Clark, of Memphis, Tenn.; Dr. W. J. McGlothlin, President of Furman University; Dr. W. L. Poteat, and it is understood that Lloyd George, of England, will be in the United States at the time of this student meeting and will be asked to speak before this conference.

Half the speakers on the program are to be older persons and half of them students of the colleges and universities of the South.

Some of the subjects that will be discussed are: "Leisure Time," "Personal Purity," "Athletics," "Divorce," and "The Home."

It is expected that around 1,500 students will attend this conference at Birmingham. According to the committee's statement North Carolina colleges and schools are expected to send 125 delegates or representatives to this conference.
