DECLAMATION CONTEST TO BE HELD MARCH 14

FINAL ARRANGEMENTS BEING
MADE BY COMMITTEE FROM
LITERARY SOCIETIES

\$50 SCHOLARSHIP AND
MEDAL, FIRST PRIZE

Male Students of All Preparatory
Schools in North Carolina Eli-
gible—Free Entertainment
Given While at College.

Hoping to make the third inter-
scholastic declamation contest the
greatest of its kind ever held at
Wake Forest College, committees
from the Philomathesian and Eu-
zelian Literary Societies are now
working with a committee from the
faculty on arrangements for this
year's event. The preliminaries will
be held in Wingate Memorial Hall
on March 13, and the final contest
on March 14. The contest is open
to the male students of all prepara-
tory schools in North Carolina.

A similar contest is held each year
with the aim of acquainting high
school students with the College and
the class work done here. The par-
ticipation is made interesting by
the awards offered to the successful
speakers. As a first prize the Col-
lege offers a scholarship worth \$50,
in addition to the handsome medal
awarded by the two literary socie-
ties.

A second prize consists of a pin
bearing the emblems of the two
societies, set in pearls.

The committee on arrangements
announces that information regard-
ing the contest will be mailed to the
various schools within a few days,
but that in the meantime this an-
nouncement may be regarded as of-
ficial.

The contestants are considered as
guests of the societies while they are
at Wake Forest, and every effort is
made to make the time spent here
most pleasant.

714 Lawyers Have Received

the twenty-seventh, passed the exam-
ination successfully.

RECEPTIONS CONSTITUTE
GALA DAY'S ACTIVITIES

GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP
OF R. R. TO BE DISCUSSED

Three Athletic Events Staged for the
Week-end—Marshals and Speak-
ers Preparing For Event With
Great Enthusiasm

Besides the annual debate, ora-
tions, and reception, two basketball
games and an inter-class track meet
have been arranged to make the
eighty-fourth celebration of the
founding of the Philomathesian
and Euzelian Literary Societies,
which is to be celebrated on Friday,
the fourteenth, and during the rest
of the week, the most interesting
and entertaining of all former anni-
versaries. A large number of
young ladies is expected to grace the
celebration, and all indications
point to a very successful celebra-
tion.

The annual anniversary debate
will be held on Friday afternoon at
two-thirty o'clock, in Wingate Me-
morial Hall, with Mr. G. B. Nance,
Eu., presiding, and Mr. M. B. Tolar,
Phi., acting as secretary. The query
for the debate is, "Resolved, That
the Federal Government should own
and operate the railroads." The af-
firmative side of this question will
be upheld by Mr. W. E. Honey-
cutt, Eu., of Yancey County, and
Mr. L. S. Clark, Phi., of Buncombe
County. Messrs. L. B. Dawes, Phi.,
of Wilson County, and F. C. Free-

CAROLINA DEFEATS WAKE FOREST, 30-17

BAPTISTS FURNISH UNUS-
UALLY FAST GAME—FINAL
STAGE DETERMINED VICTORS

CAPTAIN HANBY AND
NEIL LEAD SCORING

Game Staged at Chapel Hill Was
Hard Fought, Consistent and
Clean Throughout—No Re-
turn Game Scheduled

Regardless of defeat by a score of
30 to 17, Wake Forest furnished
Carolina one of the fastest basket-
ball games of the season, at Chapel
Hill Saturday night.

The Baptist quintet played a hard
and consistent game, but failed to
get together at the right moments.
At no time in the game, however,
was a Carolina victory assured until
the final stage. The passing of both
teams, as well as the general team
work, was of superb quality. Hanby
was the greatest point gainer for
Wake Forest, shooting four field
goals, and Neil came close behind
with three field goals and one foul
goal to his credit. Rabenhorst and
Sowers, guards, played an excellent
game on the defensive. The out-
standing stars on the Carolina team
were Cuthbertson, Carmichael, and
Morris.

more seldom succeeded in making
goals.

Hanby and Neil at forward, and the
enduring fight put up by Guilford,

It shall be our aim to conduct a publication that will deserve such a cognomen. This necessitates that we present the whole truth, without prejudice or bias, in an accurate and legible manner. With this end in view we offer our first edition and begin on the work of the session.

AS IT SHOULD BE.

Some time ago Wake Forest played the North Carolina State College in basketball. The result of the game was rather disastrous for the record of our team and damaging to our ambitions. However, there was one aspect of the game that will be remembered after the score is forgotten. It is for the friendly rivalry that was exhibited in the cheering, on both sides, that we are grateful. It has not always been thus. Memories of the "Battle of Fayetteville Street" make us all the more grateful. We trust that the game referred to marks the beginning of a new relation between the two institutions, the end of which we hope never to see.

WELCOME, SECRETARY FUNDERBURK.

We welcome into our midst Mr. Funderburk, the new Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association, whom we hope it will be our good fortune to retain among us. Mr. Funderburk is an alumnus of Wake Forest, and is therefore especially fitted for the work he has so ably begun. A marked change has already become visible in the enthusiasm and interest of the student body in this work. The increased interest in the religious meetings is especially noticeable.

Mr. Funderburk's work has already taken visible form in the

opening of the little chapel for a reading, writing and recreation room. A victrola and a piano have been installed, and many boys are taking advantage of the opportunity for wholesome amusement.

With its three ideals—spirit, mind, and body—we hope that the "Y" will greatly increase the religious and brotherly feeling among the students, and make the institution such an interesting factor in college life that a paid secretary will be a Wake Forest requisite, and in due time necessitate a Y. M. C. A. building. C. M. M.

AN APPEAL.

Among the valuable contributions the Y. M. C. A. is giving to the student body is the free motion picture show. Wake Forest has always needed more social life, and we welcome this part of the "Y" program. Yet, there are men in the student body who fail to appreciate the motive, and take advantage of this hour to act unseemly in public, or we might put it, behave in a manner not in accord with gentlemanly qualities. It has gone to such an extent that their conduct is offensive to ladies, and they are in this manner defeating, to a large extent, the purpose of the entertainment.

It shall not be our policy to act as the perpetual "knocker," or the great reformer, but we are desirous of taking this opportunity of calling attention to this circumstance, which we believe will be sufficient to remove the cause.

IS TRAINING IN PUBLIC SPEAKING NECESSARY?

In this new age perhaps no one thing is more important in a man's equipment for life than the ability to clearly and forcibly express himself. Whether in law, medicine, ministry, teaching, farming, or business, the man who can most convincingly convey his ideas to others becomes the leader of his sphere and to a large extent, moulds the thought of his community. Public sentiment is the only efficient antidote for any public evil; the greatest factor in establishing reform. Public sentiment is moulded, largely, from the pulpit and public stage and the men who most adequately fill these places are to shape the life of tomorrow.

Wake Forest is recognized as an institution of rare achievement in debating. Her Medical and Law departments are of the best; and the Science and Literary departments are unquestioned. We receive full credit in all the great northern universities for our class-work, but our boys get absolutely no supervised training in one very important phase of activity, namely: public speaking. We have a very enviable record in debate, despite this handicap, though we suffered two crushing defeats last year. We are meeting the same foes this year with the same disadvantage. The record of the institution is to be defended; the pride of our societies is at stake; Wake Forest's place in the life of tomorrow must be made secure.

How long are we expected to do it alone? Other institutions have experts giving full time to training men in oratory and debate. They are having great success and consider it worth far more than the cost. Why can we not have the same at Wake Forest?

INTER-CLASS TRACK MEET SCHEDULED SATURDAY

Representatives From the Four College Classes Will Compete for Valuable Prizes Given by Local Merchants

The annual Wake Forest inter-class track meet, which will add much to the attractiveness of the Anniversary Celebration, will be held Saturday afternoon, February 15, on the College track field, at 2:30. All the classes will be represented and the event bids fair to be one of the most interesting of the season. The meet is being arranged by Assistant Manager Herring.

Each of the four classes have a promising amount of material from which to select a team, and it would be hard to predict which of the four will claim first honors. At any rate the competition will be great, and the spectators may look forward to an interesting contest. The participants have been undergoing strenuous training for the last several weeks and are in good trim for Saturday's exhibition.

This is the third event of its kind to take place here, the first having taken place at the Society Day Celebration of 1916. Its chief purpose is to encourage this particular department of athletics and to get a line on the available Varsity material.

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LARGEST FRESHMAN CLASS IN HISTORY OF COLLEGE

NEW CATALOGUE SHOWS
ENROLLMENT OF 450;
CREDIT FOR LAB. WORK

DORMITORIES AND
PROFESSORS NEEDED

Tendency Unusually Strong For
Modern Language and Science
Courses.

That the present session of College is an extraordinary one in many ways will be shown by the new catalogue which is just now going to the press. The outstanding feature that distinguishes the present session from all preceding is the number of freshmen, which has just passed the 240 mark. This is the largest freshman class in the history of the College, and that fact is considered significant, especially since the war has taken its toll so heavily from the class of young men who enter college each year. The total registration now stands at 450, which shows that 75 men who were not in college last fall have registered for the spring term. Twenty-six of these are new men, the balance having been in college in years previous.

Another feature of the new catalogue is the change in the credit which will be given for laboratory work in the Science Course. As a result of the strong tendency of the past year towards scientific courses the laboratory work accompanying such courses will be increased and a credit of five hours will be given instead of four as heretofore.

The situation which has developed here this spring points strongly to the enlargement of lodging and boarding facilities. It seems that a number of the people of the community who once let rooms to students have decided to discontinue the practice. This makes the need of another dormitory more urgent than ever before.

The rooms in the new dormitory have always gone at a premium, and this year the rooms in the dormitory wings of the Administration building are in great demand.

The strong tendency towards the Modern Language and Science courses also makes necessary additions to the faculty. At present five additional professors are urgently needed. The college is hoping to meet the needs of the hour, but no official statement has been made as yet.

The letter from Mr. Barbour stated that the committee was trying to secure a limited list of the outstanding men of the United States to go on this special mission, and that Dr. Poteat was sought from the Southeastern Department.

and Clyde Earl Gooch, of Granville County. This was the smallest class that Wake Forest has ever sent up, except the first, and that numbered three. When all of the members of this year's class passed it made the second successive year of a 100 per cent record.

Since the Law School was established in 1894 there have been seven hundred and fourteen members licensed by the Supreme Court to practice law in North Carolina. There are between 500 and 600 in active practice today. Several of these members are in the present State Legislature and the leader of our State, Governor Bickett, is a Wake Forest man.

There are in College 37 students who study nothing except law, although there are 110 in all who take one or more classes of law. Since the war is over and conditions are gradually becoming normal the law school is very optimistic of its future.
