

SECOND CONTEST WITH N. C. STATE IS WON BY WAKE

Eleven Innings Are Required for Wake Forest to Win Second Game With State College.

JOHNSON AND CURTIS BOTH PITCH WINNING BASEBALL

Game Made Twenty-Three Frames Necessitated Before Either Team Could Procure a Decision; Bill Ellis's Hit in the Eleventh Brings in Needed Tally.

After State and Wake Forest had battled ten frames to a standstill, Ellis in the eleventh parked one of Curtis's offerings out in Faculty Avenue, scoring Stringfield from second and ending the second extra-inning affair with State in as many days, when Wake defeated State here last Tuesday, 1 to 0.

Following Monday's twelve-inning mix-up for a tie, it seemed that this game would end by the same route. But Ellis didn't see things that way and an eleventh frame victory resulted.

Both Curtis for State and Stanley Johnson for Wake Forest hurled brilliant baseball from the mound. Each twirler allowed but three hits, each walked two men, while Johnson fanned twelve as compared with seven by Curtis.

State succeeded in getting one man only as far as third, when in the seventh Redfearn went to second on an overthrow and stole third. But at third he died.

In the ninth, Stanley Johnson drove out a scorcher, too hot to handle. Stringfield then beat out a bunt, and when Jennette's pop up was muffed, the bases were filled with one out. Duncan replacing Barnes at first, pulled out a fly to left field, on which Johnson could have scored had he not mistaken it for a bingle, and remained on third. When Ragsdale popped up, the side was retired minus the much-coveted marker.

It was the history-making eleventh that did things. Stringfield walked, was sacrificed to second by Jeannette. And then Bill Ellis came up. Curtis grooved one and the next time the ball was seen it was rolling down Faculty Avenue, Stringfield had loped in home, and Ellis would have had a circuit (Continued on Page Two.)

Johnston Leading Wake Forest Nine In Batting Record

Home Run Ace and Star Left Fielder Hitting at a Clip of .321; Average of Team Somewhat Off Due to Batting Against Strong Twirlers.

In the seven college games that the baseball team has played so far this season, beginning with the Elon College game and including the Carolina contest last Saturday, the team as a whole is batting at the limited rate of .242.

MANY FEATURES OF SOCIAL NATURE FOR THE SUMMER SCHOOL

Location, climate, equipment, and recreative factors combine in making Wake Forest the ideal place for the establishment of the annual Baptist summer school, which will begin its first session on June 14 of the coming summer.

The town is only seventeen miles from the capital city of the State, thus placing it almost in the exact center of North Carolina. Two trains on the main line of the Seaboard Railroad and two trips by a bus with a capacity for hauling sixteen persons daily arrive from and depart for Raleigh. This enables one to visit the city, fulfill his mission, and return to Wake Forest within a few hours. Then, every student, whether he come from the north, east, south, or west will have but short distance to travel in going to and from home.

STRONG FACULTY LISTED FOR THE SUMMER SCHOOL

Twenty-Two Professors of North Carolina's Leading Schools Will Compose Wake Faculty.

PROSPECTS FOR SUMMER SCHOOLS ARE PROMISING

Courses in Teacher Training, Eleventh Grade Work, Law, and Regular College Work Will Be Offered by the Summer Session.

Everything is in readiness for the beginning of the Baptist Summer School at Wake Forest College, which was authorized by the Board of Trustees at their meeting last November. The session opens for the law students on June 7 and ends on August 23. For the academic students school begins on June 14 and extends through July 27.

The outstanding feature of the summer term is the large and able faculty that has been selected. Dr. W. L. Poteat is president and Professor H. T. Hunter is director. From the faculty of Wake Forest College, Professors Gulley, Gorrell, H. M. Poteat, Carroll, Paschal, Nowell, Pearson, White, Timberlake, Rouse, and Speas have been engaged. Miss Evelyn Campbell of Meredith College will be dean of women, and will serve on the teaching staff of the education department. Prof. J. Henry Highsmith, former professor of philosophy and Bible at the Baptist University for Women, Raleigh, N. C., former professor of education at Wake Forest (Continued on Page Two.)

GAME PUTS UNIVERSITY AHEAD FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Perfect Fielding and Sterling Defense of Wake's Nine Features Exhibition; Local Team Not Out of Race for Championship and Has Another Chance at Carolina.

Wake Forest played its third extra inning game of the week, and lost its first game of the season when it went down in defeat before Carolina on the local diamond last Saturday by the tune of four to three. It took the University eleven innings to do it, but their ability to hit at the crucial moments turned the tide of battle and gave them the victory.

Captain Lefty Wilson was the choice of Coach Fetzner for mound duty and Captain Saxe Barnes was the selection of Jim White. Neither pitcher was in the form that has netted them victories in the past, Barnes especially being unable to keep out of dangerous predicaments and proving vulnerable when hits were needed by the opposing batsmen.

Jennette led the wielders of the stick with three hits and a base due being hit by a pitched ball. Johnston, the Baptist home run king, laid out long ones that escaped being circuit drives only by inches, while his contemporary, Lowe, was at a loss to locate the pill. Twice he struck out, once he went down bunting foul on the third strike, and twice he flew out to the out field. Both fielders worked in brilliant style, but to Ragsdale goes credit for the feature catch of the day. A terrific smash had been sent to right, the wind got in behind the ball and carried it way beyond the foul line. Ragsdale stretched out those long limbs and while running at top speed glued the tip of his fingers to the pill.

Carolina scored first in the third inning when three clean singles and a miscue by Barnes netted them two tallies. Wake evened up the count when in the fourth Jennette hit, was advanced to third when Ellis laid down a bunt and raced to second on a wild (Continued on Page Two.)

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EDITORIAL

We don't mean to be attributing the loss to Carolina to hard luck but it does seem hard to lose a game to Carolina and also fail to win the first State game when the game is ours and two are out and two strikes are on the third opposing batsman and then tying runs are scored.

Wake Forest is by no means out of the race for the State championship. We have another game with the University which will be played at Chapel Hill on May 12. Unless something unforeseen and unexpected occurs Wake will have as good a record in respect to games won as Carolina excepting last Saturday's defeat. Therefore, our purpose at the present is to win all the State games from now on and then win from Carolina on the 12th.

Are you coming to the Summer School? Then do you know anyone who is contemplating attending school during the summer? To make the Summer School successful it is necessary that a large enrollment be secured and to secure a large enrollment we must advertise the Summer School and boost it. Do your part by boosting it to the limit.

Old Gold and Black has, in the past, been running until the last of April of each scholastic year. This year however, there will appear no issue of the paper next week and in its place the last issue will come out on May 6th. By doing this certain news can be published that would not be available for the last issue in April. Therefore Old Gold and Black will not appear next week but will continue as usual on April 29th.

Johnnie Johnston's record of home runs is not exceeded by that of any college player in the State. He is tied with Lowe of Carolina and they alone have as many as four homers to their credit among college baseball. From indications Johnnie will give Lowe a hot race for honors in that phase of the game, as was illustrated last Thursday when he circled the diamond three times with four base swats.

THE SUMMER SCHOOL, A SUCCESS?

Now that a Wake Forest Summer School has become a certainty there falls a responsibility upon every loyal Wake Forest man, whether alumnus or student, to assist in making the Summer School a success. The degree of success that the initial summer session achieves will largely determine whether or not the Summer School at Wake Forest will continue.

In the recent survey of the educational facilities of North Carolina, as brought to light by the report of Dr. Bachman of the New York State Board of Education, it was seen that the opportunities for receiving efficient training in the schools and colleges of North Carolina were very, very limited. For example his report made known the astounding fact that the best of the secondary schools in North Carolina are not as good as the worst schools in those states possessing a model system.

Such facts as these are indeed humiliating to every North Carolinian and should arouse in him the desire to bring about some means of remedying this undesirable condition. A Summer School at Wake Forest is nothing other than a step in the direction of affording more and better opportunities for education in the State. The physical equipment of the college, a number of its faculty, and its curriculum will be opened during the summer months to aid in the gigantic problem of enlightening the populace of the State.

Thus in this respect alone is the existence and maintenance of a summer session at Wake Forest justified. However, in other respects also there should be every means possible exerted by those interested in Wake Forest to make this phase of Wake Forest's activities a tremendous success. During past decades Wake Forest has come to the front in leaps and bounds; from an institution of a couple of hundred students it has reached a first rate college of five and six hundred men; from a college offering a B.A. degree with limited courses it has attained distinction as to its proficiency in training men in Law, Medicine, the Ministry and other walks of life. In present times a student is afforded opportunity to take practically any course that he desires in connection with the regular B.A. work. Departments of Commerce, Chemistry, Political Science, Modern Languages, Bible, Higher Mathematics, General Sciences, Philosophy, Education and other departments have been expanded and broadened until a Wake Forest man is well equipped to meet with ease the demands of the twentieth century requirements.

However, until this year no Wake Forest Summer School has been in existence, which in itself has been a drawback to the college. With a summer session available for teachers throughout the State, eleventh grade students, college and law students, there will undoubtedly result a larger enrollment in the coming regular sessions, and there will also follow a similar increase in the reputation and efficiency of the college.

The Committee on the Summer School, since the sanction of the summer session proposition by the Board of Trustees, has been exerting every effort possible to make the project successful. They have advertised the Summer School broadcast and have arranged for as good a faculty as can be found in any similar vacation session in the South. Merely to glance over the list of men and women that constitute the faculty is sufficient to warrant Wake Forest's being selected by a vast number of prospective summer students. In other words, everything has been arranged for by the committee and nothing is lacking to enable the Summer School 1921 to make a triumphal entry into this phase of Wake Forest history, save obtaining a large registration for the session.

The school opens June 14th and ex-

tends until July 27th, admirable dates for those intending to make use of the summer months to gain an education, for others to prepare themselves to teach, and still others to make up delinquent work. There are courses offered which should appeal to eleventh grade high school students who are desirous of getting off conditions, to teachers who wish to prepare themselves for imparting knowledge to the secondary students of the State and to regular college students who need several hours to graduate.

In connection with rural teaching the Summer School is prepared to give courses for teachers wishing this kind of training. The State Board of Education of North Carolina has arranged to recognize the Wake Forest summer session as the required training for teachers and will give them due credit for work done while here. Furthermore, the regular summer session of the Law School will continue and the Wake Forest law faculty, heralded far and wide for its ability and strength will also lend its efficiency in making the summer session the better.

In conclusion, we all have thrust upon us the responsibility to do our part. Whether we be alumni or students, it is our duty to assist the Summer School Committee. Talk Summer School through the State, advertise it in every nook and corner of North Carolina and, as an inevitable result the Summer School will make its appearance for the first time under successful conditions that will make it an everlasting and permanent phase of Wake Forest College.

College, and present State High School Inspector, will be another head-liner in the summer education school. Prof. B. Y. Tyner, who is Director of the Teacher Training Department of the Normal School at Fredericksburg, Va., and has been very prominent in educational activities of that state, will have supervision of the teacher training courses. E. J. Coltraine, Superintendent of Schools of Roanoke Rapids, and for eight years principal of the Farm Life School, and A. J. Hutchins, Principal Asheville High School, are to give courses bearing on school administration, school law, rural organization, and principles of secondary education.

Miss Alice J. Selby is to be primary supervisor. Miss Selby is a graduate of the Columbia College for Women, supervisor of primary work in the city schools of Columbia, S. C., and has wide experience as instructor in primary departments of summer schools. Miss Josie W. Brock, Principal of the Cornelius Harnette School, will instruct in grammar grade work. As an associate professor of English Miss Helen Harriet Salls, Professor of English, Oxford College, has been engaged.

Courses of study have been provided for primary teachers, grammar grades teachers, high school teachers, principals, college students, special students, high school students, and law students. Thorough courses are to be given in the departments of English, History, Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics, General Science, Modern Languages, Latin, Education, Geography, Music, and Primary Methods.

The school has been fully approved from the State Board of Education has come expressions of welcome and encouragement to the Summer School. Full recognition and credits will therefore be granted teachers for all work completed. College students may receive as much as three hours credit on their degrees, or may make up deficiencies, and eleventh grade pupils may make up any reasonable deficiencies in any subject of that grade and receive college entrance credits for work.

It is believed that the Employment Bureau, which is to assist, without charge, principals to secure teachers,

and assist teachers to learn of positions, will prove a feature.

Expenses have been placed at as reasonable amount possible. For every summer student a matriculation fee of ten dollars will be charged. College students will pay ten dollars tuition, high school students five, and law students fifteen. Teachers will be exempt from any tuition. Room rent will amount to six dollars, and the best of board may be obtained at five to seven dollars per week.

Considered from every viewpoint the Baptist Summer School offers a curriculum, a faculty, a location, a cost, and a program of attractions that can not be surpassed by any institution of learning in the State.
