

ODK Honors Nine Prominent Students for Campus Work

Two Professors and Two Alumni Honored By Honor Group

On Monday morning, March 20, the names of ten students, two professors, and two prominent Wake Forest alumni appeared on a huge facsimile of the ODK key, placed in front of the chapel. These men were elected to the national honorary leadership fraternity the previous Thursday night, on the basis of their outstanding achievement in college activities.

Eight seniors were named: Raymond "Moe" Bauer, Norfolk, Va., Grady Friday, law student from Dallas, N. C., John Gibson, Valdosta, Ga., Bob Sherrill, Asheville, Gene Hooks, Rocky Mount, Robert Howren, Rome, Ga., John Pate, Fayetteville, and Raymond Stone, Louisville.

The remaining two students elected are juniors: Wiley Warren, Roanoke Rapids, and Paul Williams, Lexington.

New Members

The new members represent a wide range of campus activities. Bauer was elected on the basis of his participation in athletics and student government. He is an All-Southern pitcher, and has accumulated four years on the varsity baseball team. He is president of the senior class. Grady Friday is prominent in fraternity activities and student government. He is vice-president of the student body, the president of his fraternity, and has been active in the glee club, a cappella choir and little theater.

John Gibson is outstanding in religious activities and athletics, as a member of the varsity football team, varsity track team, and vice-president of the ministerial conference. He is also a member of the Little Theater. Bob Sherrill is active in the field of publications, as editor of the "Student" and a member of the Publications Board. Gene Hooks is an All-American third baseman, vice-president of his fraternity, and co-captain of the baseball team.

John Pate is outstanding in scholarship and fraternity activity, as president of the Interfraternity Council and president of his fraternity. Robert Howren was elected for his work.

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Moot Court To Try Drive-In Movie Case

The truck, owned and operated by Kermit Caldwell, was parked at a speaker stand. Patterson hit the truck as he was looking for a place to park his car. He will probably contend that the darkened arena constituted negligence on the part of the theatre owners.

Sam Behrends, the manager of the theatre, is expected to claim that Patterson's actions constituted contributory negligence. Charlie Whitley and Hiram Ward will represent Patterson, while Don Riley and Harry Harrison will represent Behrends.

Shirley Picked For Top Post In Debate Team

Debaters Take Second and Third Places in Tournaments

Professor Franklin R. Shirley, Wake Forest debate coach, was elected governor of the southeastern province of Pi Kappa Delta, a leading forensics fraternity, and his debaters placed second and third in tournaments participated in during the week preceding spring holidays.

At a business meeting during the Pi Kappa Delta Regional Tournament held at the University of Georgia March 20-21, Professor Shirley was elected to head the southeastern division of that speech organization for the next two years. He succeeds Coach T. P. Christopherson of South Carolina in the governorship of Pi Kappa Delta chapters that extend over nine states.

At the same tournament, Coach Shirley's proteges gained a three way tie for second place with a total of seven wins and five losses; in second place with them were the University of South Carolina and University of Georgia.

In that tourney, Wake's crack negative team of Bob Crouch and Lamar Caudle took four wins against two losses, while the affirmative team of L. W. Pullen and Dave Clark broke even with a 3-3 record. In individual contests, Lamar Caudle was the only Wake representative to score, taking a third place in the impromptu speaking contest.

On March 24-25, Wake Forest's debaters were at Georgetown College in Georgetown, Ky., for the Blue Grass Tournament. The Wake negative team took third place among the 27 negative teams participating, and the combined records of the negative and affirmative

Beginning with a program, "Choosing A Vocation," in chapel the Vocational Guidance Conference sponsored by the Student Council will get under way on Monday, April 17.

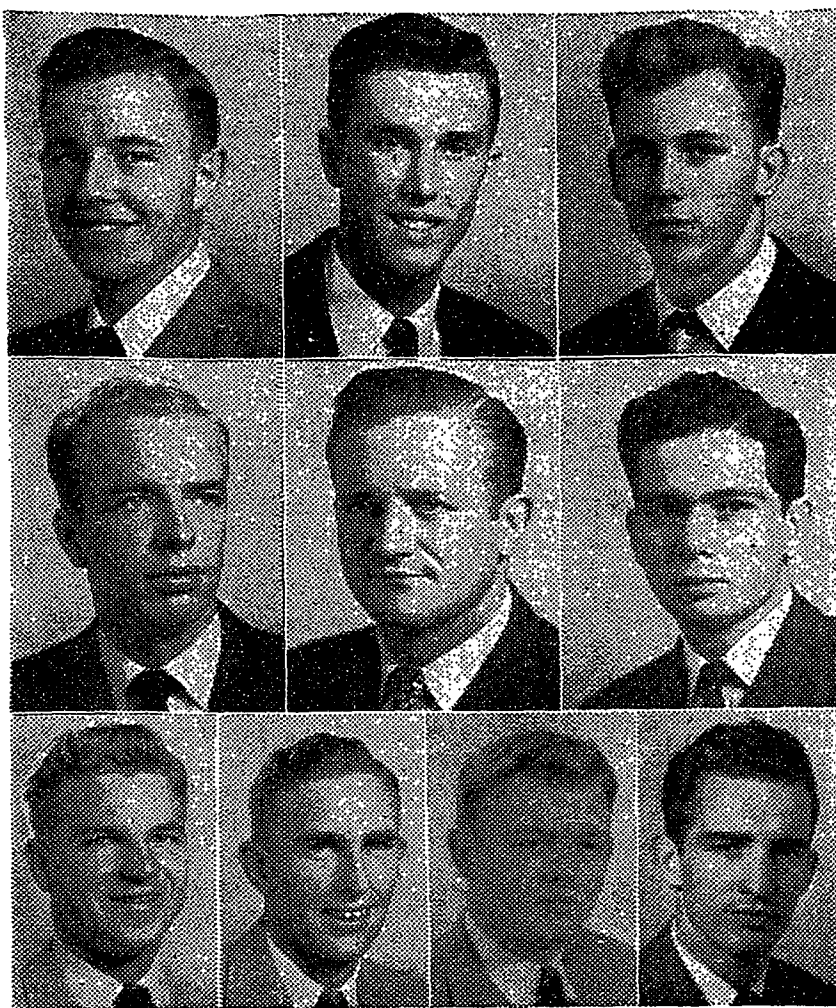

Work Begun on Rock Springs Recreation Park by Students

Various Groups Assigned Specific Areas; Faculty Cooperates

A work day at the proposed Rock Springs recreation area was scheduled for yesterday (Thursday) afternoon, according to Dr. B. E. Smith, general chairman of the project.

The work involved in preparing the area for a recreation park to be used by Wake Forest students and faculty members was slated to get underway yesterday if rain did not prohibit. At "Old Gold and Black" press-time Tuesday, Dr. Smith stated that in the event of rain, a later date would be set for the student groups and faculty members who were to have worked Thursday.

All work on the project will be done by students, under faculty supervision and individual student leadership, in cooperation with the Student Government Association, the Faculty Wives Club, and the Social Committee of the Faculty.

Since work began in earnest on the recreation center early this year, plans have been organized so that the project now entails the building of an out-door theater stage, the making of a retaining stone wall next to the spring, the construction of four picnic ovens with tables for each one, building several bridges across the stream and marking trails to lead through the area. In addition, seating space for about 1,000 people will be provided. The entire area, of course, will be cleaned up by various student organizations. All Wake Forest students will have an opportunity to participate in the project, with specific groups being responsible for definite jobs.

The Wake Forest Little Theater, with Bob Phelps and Roger Jackson, student leaders, will build the out-door theater stage, the Alpha Sigma Phi fraternity, under student Emmett White, will construct the retaining

Those who have been chosen for these honors can rightfully give themselves a pat on the back.

The 28 who have demonstrated their ability and desire for learning by being chosen for Phi Beta Kappa have reached the utmost and truest goal of the educational endeavors: that of achieving the top scholastic rating. Those who were honored by being elected to ODK have shown their versatility as well as their superior scholastic ability.

We wish these students in later life success such as they have achieved at Wake Forest. They have shown their ability to be successful.

Again, we say congratulations. These 37 may rest assured that they have been a credit to Wake Forest, and they have been successes during their stay here.

A WORTHY TRIBUTE

As Dr. Hubert Poteat put it, "It used to be that whenever a man graduated from Wake Forest, it was understood that he would have the ability to stand up on his hind legs and 'speak a piece' whenever he had something on his mind." While probably that could not be said today of every Wake Forest graduate, it certainly seems that the Wake Forest debate team and the two speech societies here are carrying on in the old Deacon tradition of producing excellent public speakers.

For years the Wake Forest debate team has been considered tops in this region and has been ranked among the best in the nation. This year has been no exception; in every tournament entered, Wake Forest has emerged either in the winner's spot or in second or third place. It can be said without exaggeration that the name Wake Forest has almost become a synonym for good debating. One student at a college in debate competition with Wake Forest remarked casually to members of the Deacon team that when the debate coach at that college lectured, she sometimes would say, "Now Wake Forest does this," when pointing out to her team what she considered good debate strategy.

Wake Forest has been blessed with excellent coaching as far back as we can remember. Until September, 1948, Professor A. L. Aycock doubled in teaching English and coaching debate, and his teams enjoyed excellent seasons. When Professor Franklin R. Shirley, a full time speech and dramatics teacher took over, the precedent was not broken. Last year and this year, the excellent success of Wake Forest debating has been too obvious to mention here.

At the Pi Kappa Delta Regional Speech Tourney held in Athens, Georgia, March 20-21, Coach Shirley received an honor

which he richly deserved and a job which he will capably fill. He was elected governor of the Pi Kappa Delta Southeastern Province for the next two years. The governorship of that speech fraternity province is one more feather in Professor Shirley's and Wake Forest's cap.

But the debate squad is not the only campus organization which teaches good speech. The Philomathesian and Euzelian Literary Societies, though weakened from their old position of predominance by the advent of the social fraternity, are more than holding their own this year and have become stronger during the fall and winter. Through their speech rivalry, they teach and encourage many who would not debate, and carry forward the tradition of the graduate who can "speak a piece."

The continuance and growth of interest in speech is indeed encouraging to Wake Foresters who cherish the tradition of which Dr. Poteat spoke.

Students often think of their professors as stiff, matter-of-fact people, but after a student comes to know his professor's interests he can appreciate his professor more. It would be impossible to meet people who are any more interesting than the host of professors that we have on our campus. We hope that through these articles you will learn to know and appreciate your professors more.

This week's professor is a most versatile one, and he is an artist in more ways than one. His love for music has been cultivated to the extent that he has developed a large library of classical records. Professor Allen's technique in drawing is excellent, and he has illustrated several of the books used in our school. Photography is another of his interests, and his work in this field is quite good. Professor Allen enjoys working with wood. Many of the attractive pieces of furniture in his home are the result of his handy work.

Professor Allen was born at Mt. Gilead in 1918. He received his B.S. degree in 1939 from Wake Forest College. In 1941, he received his M.A. degree from Wake Forest. In October, 1942, he entered the service as an aviation cadet at Lowery Field, Col. In February, 1943, Professor Allen was commissioned a 2nd Lt. at Yale. His military activities led him first to England in 1944, and during the summer of 1944 he was attached to a reconnaissance outfit and accompanied the 3rd Army into France. From France he moved on to Luxembourg, Belgium, Holland, and Germany. At the close of the war Professor Allen was stationed in Brunswick and from there returned to the United States as a major. Practically all of his work was in the field of photography, and in this work he was in charge of about two hundred men.

Allen came to the U. S. in November, 1945, and returned to Wake Forest during the spring term 1946. He then spent one year and a half at Duke University doing graduate work, and at Duke he completed all of his work except his dissertation on which he is working now.

He was married in November 1943. His wife was Clara David of Bennettsville, South Carolina. Mrs. Allen attended Flora MacDonald College where she received voice training.

If you have not met Professor Allen you should not fail to do so. His pleasing personality is enjoyed by all who know him. He is now serving as an assistant professor of Biology.

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Students To Visit Wake Court Clerk

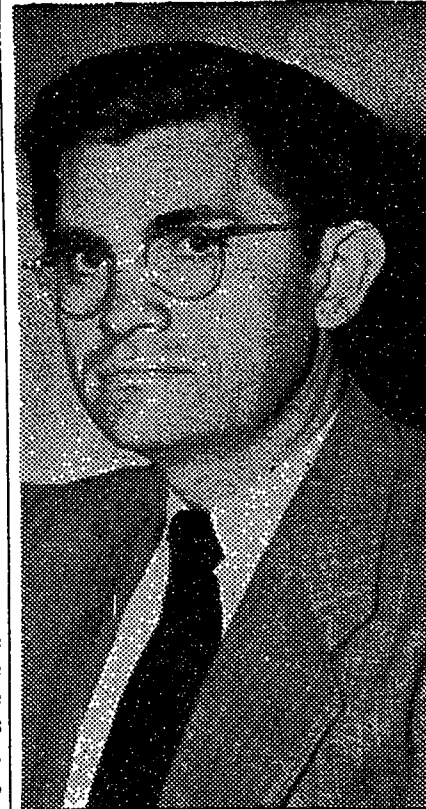

College Choir Travels 1,132 Miles Through Three States

Spring holidays, for most Wake Forest students, meant going home or taking a trip to Florida, or just a week of relaxation and rest from studies. But for the College Choir, last week meant traveling about 1,132 miles on the third annual spring tour. The choir performed in churches, schools, civic clubs, and colleges in both Carolinas and Virginia.

The programs, both secular and sacred, proved to be quite popular wherever they were presented. The secular music, under the title of "Music of America," included such favorites as "Begin the Beguine," "Embraceable You," and Romberg's "Serenade." On the sacred program, Malotte's "The Lord's Prayer," "Now Thank We All Our God," and several Negro spirituals were most readily accepted by the audiences of both Carolinas and Virginia. "Nobody Knows the Trouble I've Seen," "Were You There," and "Joshua Fit the Battle of Jericho" were the best-liked of the spiritual group.

Southern Baptists Select Chicago

The Southern Baptist Convention which has nearly eight million members in 22 states will meet this year for the first time outside of the traditional South. The annual meeting will be held in Chicago, May 9-12, and will be attended by 15,000 messengers elected by the churches.

Baptists are unique in that their annual convention is primarily a body representative of the churches and not a minister's group. The convention is constituted of "messengers" rather than "delegates" from the churches, in that no one carries authority to bind his congregation back home to the decisions of the convention.

The theme for this year's convention, over which Dr. Robert G. Lee, Memphis, Tenn., will preside, is taken from the fourth stanza of "America." It is "Freedom's Holy Light." Southern Baptists are expected to consider several important social and religious questions facing America today. Among these are separation of church and state, the race problem, what to do about missions in communistic China. The closing service of the convention will be an evangelistic rally in the Chicago Coliseum, in which the Baptist churches of Chicago will join.

Southern Baptists are expected to go with their convention to San Francisco, Calif., next year.

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DEACONS OPEN LOOP SLATE WITH DAVIDSON

SPORTS WARNINGS

Coach Lee Gooch and his Wake Forest Demon Deacon baseball team returned from a statewide tour recently with four victories under their belts in five contests played.

The Deacons pounced on Elon College in the season opener for a 5-0 win. However, on the following night, Elon turned the tables on the Baptists, beating them 12-3 in a loosely-played test. Wednesday night in Kannapolis, the Deacs topped Michigan State College, one of the better clubs in the midwest by an 11-8 score. On a night much too cold for a baseball game, Gooch's nine trimmed Catawba College 2-1 in Salisbury. The Deacons wound up the week's activities Friday afternoon in Asheboro by defeating McCrary's Eagles 3-1 in an abbreviated seven-inning affair.

As a unit, the Deacons are not quite ready to assume the position as the No. 2 club in the nation, a spot they held in 1949. Cold weather has greatly hampered the club's progress thus far. The pitchers are not just ready to go the full distance in a nine-inning ball game. In a couple of the games last week, pitchers had a hard time finding the plate. But once hot weather rolls around, Gooch figures that the Deacon hurlers will be able to pitch nine innings easily.

The Baptist hitters appear to be slowly rounding into form. Here again is a case of a need for hot weather. Most of the players seem to be hitting the ball fairly well. On the road trip last week, several of the Deacons — Charlie Teague, Bady Harris, Gene Hooks and Joe Fulghum, to mention a few — hit the ball rather hard at times. In the two games that he played, Tunney Brooks pounded out a double and homerun, the first roundtripper by a Deacon this season. Brooks and Woodrow Wilson Wrenn appear certain to divide the catching duties this season.

COSTLY FIRE

The baseball team as well as the athletic department suffered a severe setback on the opening day of the trip. All of the Deacons baseball equipment was lost in a fire early Monday night.

The Baptists had just received a new set of road uniforms and used them for the first time in the Elon opener. After the game, it was decided to leave the equipment in the dressing room at the ball park. The Deacons made their headquarters at the college and were to meet the same team in Greensboro Tuesday night so that appeared to be the most logical thing to do.

Only the decision turned out to be somewhat disastrous. No more than an hour after the team left the park, the fire alarm sounded. The stands were burning quickly. The wind was raging so that it wasn't but just a matter of seconds before the fire had reached the Deacons dressing room.

That's about all there was to it. The wind had taken charge of the fire and the fire immediately took care of the stands and all of the Deacs equipment. No less than seventy bats and twenty-two uniforms went up in smoke. Each player lost his own personal glove and some of the boys even lost two. Charlie Teague had just received a new glove that morning from New York Yankee second-baseman George Stirnweiss and it lies among the ruins.

But the Deacons decided, to coin an old phrase, that "the show must go on." And to the surprise of many, it did.

Next morning, Manager Jesse Haddock hurried back to Wake Forest where he picked up the Baptists' white home uniforms, a few dozen balls, and a shipment of bats. Shoes, sliding pads and gloves were purchased from sporting goods stores in Raleigh, Burlington and Greensboro.

In a completely new outfit, with the exception of the white uniforms which incidentally, were bought at the close of the 1949 season for the NCAA tourney, Lee Gooch's Deacons faced Elon again Tuesday night right on schedule. Most observers had figured that the games would be cancelled, but Athletic Director Jim Weaver gave the Deacons the "go" sign.

'OFF THE CUFF'

All-American Charlie Teague, the diminutive Deacon second-baseman, astounded fans in some of the games with several long wallops. . . . Not many of the spectators figured that the "little man" possessed such power. . . . Joe Fulghum's booming bat caught the eyes of several major league scouts. . . . The husky Fulghum was probably the leading hitter on the trip. . . . Said Elon Coach Jim Mallory, "The uniforms that were burned in the fire were about the best looking set I believe I've ever seen." . . . The general appearance of Catawba College surprised many of the Deacons. . . . The school is well laid out and the majority of the players commented that it was one of the finest small colleges in the state.

FACE DAVIDSON

Friday afternoon at Davidson, Wake Forest will meet one of the better clubs in the Southern Conference. The Wildcats usually field a well-balanced unit and boast one of the top hitters in the state outfielder in Auburn Lambeth. Many big league scouts have had their eye on Lambeth for a long time and consider him to be a fine prospect.

The Wildcats are a member of the Big Five, composed of teams only from North Carolina. The Deacons play Davidson on a home-and-home basis this season but it is expected that in the coming years, the Wildcats will be met as many times as is State, Duke and Carolina.

Palmer and Tiddy Lead Deac Golfers

Compiling the amazing record of only one loss in thirty matches at Wake Forest, Arnold Palmer, number one on the Deacon Golf Team, has proved beyond a doubt he is one of the country's leading amateur golfers.

Playing the number one position is nothing new to the 20 year old junior from Latrobe, Pennsylvania. Palmer is a leader in golf leagues for high schools and Palmer played in the leading position for his entire four years in Latrobe High.

In 1946, Arnold, at 16 years of age, was runner-up in the National Junior Tournament played in Detroit, Michigan. However, he won the Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic League Championship and also the high school championship of Pennsylvania, the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association Championship. In 1947, during his senior year, Palmer repeated both victories, a real feat in any state but even more so in Pennsylvania because of the stiff competition.

Palmer, following in the footsteps of his father, who is a golf professional, branched out in the summer of 1947 and scored a well deserved tournament victory in the Western Pennsylvania Amateur played in Pittsburgh. This tournament included both junior and senior players.

Many Offers

In the fall of 1947, Palmer enrolled at Wake Forest although he had scholarship offers from Ohio State, Miami, Pittsburgh, and Stanford. With the spring of 1948, came one of the strongest golf aggregations ever put together at Wake Forest. Palmer led the Deacons to 12 wins in 13 matches and culminated a great freshman year by winning the Southern Conference Individual Championship over such favorites as Carolina's Harvie Ward and Duke's Art Wall.

In the spring of 1949, Palmer again had another great year and climaxed it with a repeat victory in the Southern Conference Golf Tournament. He had previously led the Deacons to ten wins, two losses and two ties in matches with many strong college golf teams from all over the country.

NCAA Medalist

Last summer the National Collegiate Athletic Association Golf Tournament was held in Ames, Iowa, and Arnold put Wake Forest College on the map by winning the medal in the qualifying round. He, however, lost out in the semi-finals.

Coach Johnny Johnston each year enters the Deacon Golf Team in the famed North-South Amateur Golf Tournament at Pinehurst and Palmer has advanced to the semi-final round both years he has been in Baptist Hollow. This year he is determined to bring that elusive crown back to Wake Forest.

DEACS MEET 'PACK IN ANNUAL EASTER TEST

Bauer Expected To Open On Hill For Wake Forest

Wake Forest's Deacons and North Carolina State's Wolfpack, two of the Southern Conference's most ancient rivals, clash Monday afternoon in the annual Easter contest between the two schools.

Coaches Lee Gooch of Wake Forest and Vic Sorrell of State have indicated that they will call on their ace hurlers for the game. Raymond (Moë) Bauer, senior lefthander from Norfolk who has beaten the State team as often as he has faced them, will undoubtedly gain the starting assignment for the Deacons. The Wolfpack will rely heavily on the strong right arm of Irving Page, the only pitcher in the circuit to stop the Baptists last season.

State's record to date shows that the Wolfpack has a much stronger unit than that of 1949 and appears to be the team most likely to give the Deacons its biggest trouble this year.

Fowler Leads

The Wolfpack, led by hard-hitting centerfielder Bill Fowler, has been considerably strengthened by the addition of three sophomores. They are first-baseman Billy Smith, catcher Bill Wilhelm, and shortstop Herb Brinson. They rarely quarrel or get mad, and are good church attenders.

A machine that makes speech sounds visible will soon be in use at the University of Texas. Called a sound spectrograph, it will be used chiefly by the Romance and Germanic languages departments and in phonetics experiments.

Professor Ernest F. Haden, who will have charge of the machine and the laboratory, explained how the sound spectrograph operates. A sample of speech recorded on steel tape is transferred through an analyzing mechanism to a special type paper that reproduces various speech sounds with characteristic shapes. The chart shows frequency patterns, speech intensity and the time variations from the slow drawl to clipped speech.

"Marry a woman who knows more than you do" is the advice given to college students by Warren Bruner, management consultant conducting an experimental course in career determination at Marietta College.

A junior must have a quality point ratio of at least 2.6 on all the work he has done.

Transfer students may be elected if they have spent three semesters at Wake Forest prior to the time of election and have a 2.6 on all work undertaken at Wake Forest.

It was pointed out that scholastic standing is not the only consideration. A candidate's moral character must be unquestionable, and he must have shown a wide interest in culture.
