The topics that will be discussed at the meeting by the above gentlemen read as follows: "The Relation of the Alumni to their Alma Mater," "Local Alumni Associations," "A Million Dollars for Wake Forest," "The Opportunities of the Alumni in directing students to Wake Forest College," "The Relation of the College to the Deremination," "Appointment of an Alumni Representative."

The alumni address this year will be by Dr. Archibald Cree, of Atlanta, Ga.

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Richmond Loses To Wake Forest

By Taking Both Contests For a Second Time Wake Forest Wins Series

While I. L. Bennett and E. B. Cox argued their way to victory over Wirt L. Davis and E. W. Miller of Richmond College in Raleigh Monday night in the Academy of Music, the other Wake Forest team composed of B. M. Boyd and R. H. Taylor won the decision against Richmond before an audience in the Virginia city. In Raleigh Wake Forest upheld the affirmative of the proposition "Resolved, That the United States should adopt the policy of subsidizing its merchant marine engaged in foreign trade." In Richmond Wake Forest argued in the negative. For the second time the North Carolina Baptist institution emerges from the contest winner of both debates, the first having been last Easter.

Col. J. Bryan Grimes, Secretary of State, presided over the contest in Raleigh heard by an audience quite filling the Academy auditorium. Throngs of students from Wake Forest and many of the townspeople were present, coming by automobile and special train for the event.

The judges who gave Wake Forest the decision were Justice W. A. Hoke of the Supreme Court, Judge J. C. Biggs, and Dr. T. W. O'Kelly. The conclusion was reached with out consultation, the judges placing their ballot in the hands of the marshalls directly after the concluding speech. J. Grady Booe of Wake Forest and C. C. Boyd of Richmond were the alternates, the marshalls of the occasion were from the Eu. Society, C. C. Gregory, chief, S. B. Whitehead, Roy C. Keller; and from the Phi. W. C. Downing, chief, H. T. Shanks and J. R. Britt.

Wake Forest debaters exhibited the same ease of delivery, the same confidence in themselves, the same force of argument characterizing almost every debater that has represented the college in such contests. They won on clarity on clarity of expression, on argument that carried the punch, and on massing of material in such a way that it grew with each successive speech until it was hurled hot and unmanageable into the hands of their opponents.

The Richmond representatives presented their subject in a way demonstrating close study. Theirs were carefully prepared speeches, but little team work. Evidencing less training in delivery and probably less experience on the platform, they fought hard and were still talking when the time-keepers rapped the limit.

Messrs. Boyd and Taylor were opposed in Richmond by Samuel H. Gellman and Winston Bristow. J. B. Rucker, alternate, accompanied the team. Bishop Dennis J. O'Connell, Rev. Cecil Lewis and Rev. T. A. Smoot, acted as judges in the Richmond debate.

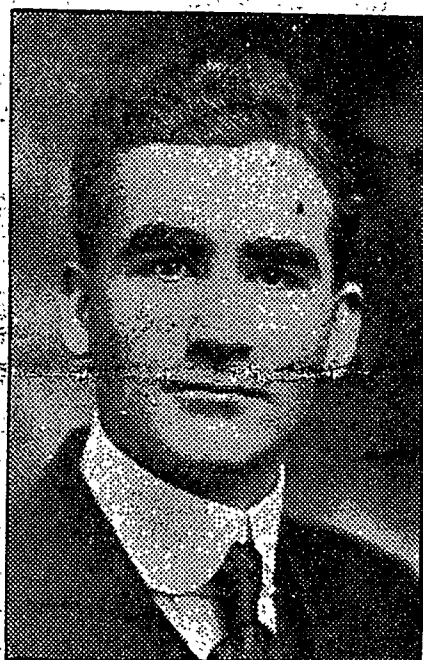

Wake Forest Student Gets Carnegie Medal

George D. Rowe of Fredericksburg, Va., a student at Wake Forest College for the past two years, was yesterday awarded a Carnegie medal for heroism. Rowe's heroic act in saving the life of Howard R. Masters from drowning in the Potomac river at Widewater, Va., is well remembered throughout Virginia today. It was in 1911, August 23rd, that he performed the deed. Rowe is one of the most popular students in college and is taking his Bachelor of Science degree in medicine this spring.

Presbyterians Hit Ball Hard and Timely and Win Out in the Ninth, 6 to 3

Wake Forest rang down the curtains on the 1916 season Thursday afternoon, losing the second game of the year with Davidson 6 to 3. Ellis started the game and for a while had everything going his way, but the Presbyterians gradually began to solve his delivery and soon tied an early lead that the Baptists had staked him to and then in the ninth drove him from the box, securing three hits for so many runs.

Wake Forest began hammering Hengeveldt's delivery in the first inning, putting one run across. He was found for four hits the second inning and one the following, but after that he tightened up and refused to give up a single safe blow the remaining six innings.

The Baptists missed a good opportunity to sew up the game in the second inning, poor base running costing several runs. Vassey led off in that frame with a two bagger to left. Gladney hit to short and Vassey held the throw, allowing Gladney to reach first safely. Ferree then singled, scoring Vassey, and

fourth, but Wake Forest maintained a one run lead until the eighth. In that inning Hengeveldt opened with a healthy double to left. He advanced to third on an infield out and scored when Black hit to Sams. Davidson promptly proceeded to unknot the score the last inning, falling on Ellis for three hits and as many runs and sending him to cover, Franks relieving him and retiring the side without further scoring.

The game ended Captain Holding's Ferree's and Sam's career on the team, all three men being lost by graduation this spring.

WHO KNOWS?

On nearly every university campus there are occasionally two or three men with a future. Some will be the great American inventors, poets, authors, statesmen, or scholars. The peculiar thing about it is that most of these persons feel prophetically their promise, because of an exalted egoism within, an invincible punch, and a special ability along their special lines.

But of course no man with the in-born talent of greatness is apt to tell anyone of what he really feels, for embryo greatness or genius doesn't ordinarily grow that way. Though genius is often a bashful thing outwardly, it waits and works with the power of radium within the personality and mind.

Most of the future big men among the students would have been great whether they came to college or not. But many others are laying the foundation by careful labor at college for a lighting system which will be reflected with a far greater brilliance on the historical sky.

With college graduates, the question of business success is not between clambering or slipping low on the hillside of human careers, but it is merely the problem of how high they will get. And it is in the classroom and campus activity that every student is forging his hill-climbing machine. Some of the students who are "big men" when in college realize that the highest of highest greatness is not from them, and wisely seek the associates. Diogenes-like, two or three whom they think will reach the summit of success.

One interesting thought is that whenever a student brands one of his fellows as a "little off" or visionary for some non-conformity, he may be ridiculing one of those chosen two or three dozen who are headed toward the ranks of the immortals.—Michigan Daily.

Local Companies Are Prosperous

Plow Manufacturers and Supply Shops do Good Business

Wake Forest is the plow manufacturing center of a comparatively large part of the state. There are two up-to-date foundries here that specialize in making one horse plows. As many as 20,000 castings for plows are produced in one week at these plants, which includes every part of many different models. These manufacturers have no competition of any consequence south of Norfolk, Va., nor north of Goldsboro, N. C. All the country east of the Seaboard Air Line to the Atlantic Coast Line Railway, and south of La Cross, Va. and Weldon, N. C., to Wadesboro, N. C. is thoroughly worked by these companies. Since plows are in constant demand, and must stand the test incident to their use, the fact that the local shops are unmolested by competition in so large a territory argues well for the quality of the article which they are producing.

Though these foundries specialize in making plows, they also make cast iron andirons, window weights, boiler grates, parts of stoves, and other ordinary iron castings. This diversity of work makes it possible for them to operate regularly, and give employment to an average of about twenty men. Their total volume of business is approximately \$30,000 annually. These plants are known as The Wake Forest Foundry Co. and Dunn Plow Co., and are among the leading local industrial factories.

Wake Forest also has a modern general repair and supply shop. Any sort of vehicle from a log cart to a road cart, including automobiles, is quickly and skilfully repaired at this place. A full line of Fiske tires and Ford accessories is carried at all times and four men are given regular employment. Holliday and Taylor operate this business which amounts to approximately \$6000.00 a year.

Wake Forest Loses to Spiders by Close Margin

Richmond College Track Artists Win By Margin of 8 Points

The Richmond College cinder path artists won from Wake Forest in Richmond last Saturday in dual meet by the close score of 58 to 50. The Virginians showed up strong in the dashes, taking all first places, while Wake Forest reversed the proceedings in the long distance events. Harris was the greatest individual point winner, the fleet-footed Baptist star, registering twelve points. Liggan, of Richmond College, came second with ten points to his credit.

Wake Forest was leading until the last two events. Failure to qualify in the high hurdles, and the absence of any one to vault cost them the meet, Richmond winning without any opposition, taking all eighteen points in the final two events.

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Mr. Rucker Demonstrates His Hilarious Histrionics

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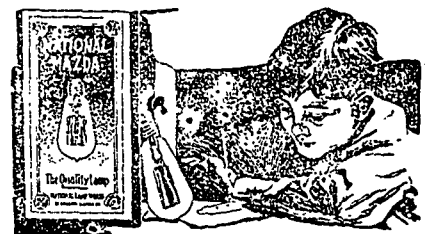
