B. L. RHODES

The Rev. Beecher L. Rhodes, D.D., 72, retired Baptist minister, died Wednesday, Aug. 28, 1957, at his home in Norfolk, Virginia.

Funeral rites were conducted Friday, Aug. 29, at 3 p. m. at Freemason Street Baptist Church. Interment was in Colosse Church cemetery near Windsor.

Dr. Rhodes retired in 1953 after serving as pastor of Berkeley Avenue Baptist church for 30 years.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Emma Grigsby Rhodes, and a sister, Mrs. Ernest Rhodes, of Windsor.

Dr. Rhodes had served as president of the Norfolk-Portsmouth Baptist Association Council and as its moderator. He was the Virginia representative on the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and trustee of the Crozier Theological Seminary at Chester, Pa.

Dr. Rhodes was born in Windsor, Isle of Wight county. He attended Fork Union Military Academy, the University of Richmond, Crozier Theological Seminary and the University of Pennsylvania. He received a master's degree in sociology from the University of Pennsylvania and his doctor of divinity degree was conferred upon him in 1937 by the University of Richmond.

EDWARD W. STUBBLEFIELD

Dr. Edward W. Stubblefield, a retired Baptist minister, died at his home in Princeton, W. Va. on April 14, 1957. He was born near Lovelaceville, Ky., May 2, 1872, the son of David and Julia Peck Stubblefield.

He was educated for the ministry at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and did graduate work at the University of Chicago.

He was married on Nov. 1, 1904 to Mattie B. Knott of St. Louis, Mo., who preceded him in death Dec. 16, 1956.

Dr. Stubblefield accepted his first pastorate in 1898 at Flemingsburg, Ky. He also served churches in Kirkwood, Mo., Oxford, Miss., Galveston, Texas, Clarksville, Tenn., Covington, Ky., and Durham, N. C., before coming to Princeton in 1927.

He retired from the active pastorate in 1943 to devote his full time to writing and general work, visiting the sick and shut-ins in their homes and at the hospital. He was known to many through his daily hospital visits to all patients.

Dr. Stubblefield was a devoted pastor and beloved by countless numbers in the communities in which he lived and served. His chief concern was the welfare of those to whom he was undershepherd and for the salvation of souls.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Ben W. Cox and the Rev. Cecil B. Cook, Jr. on April 17, 1957 at the First Baptist Church in Princeton, W. Va. The body was taken to Kirkwood, Mo., for burial in the family plot.
