

DR. KITCHIN OFFERS RESIGNATION

Second Annual Magnolia Festival To Be Inaugurated Tomorrow

Crowning of May Queen To Begin Week Of Events

The second annual Magnolia Festival gets under way Saturday afternoon, May 7. The crowning of the Festival Queen will inaugurate a week of events which will end when the final curtain falls on "The Only Girl" on Friday night, May 13.

The intervening six days will be consumed by such a variety of activities that the average student will be too busy attending the numerous programs to remind himself that examinations are less than ten days away. See page 2 for schedule of events.

Still in its embryonic stages, the Magnolia Festival shows every indication of becoming the event of the year for future Wake Forest students. When the college moves to Winston-Salem, the Festival will not be left behind, according to most authorities. Of course, if there are no magnolias at Reynolda, the name might have to be changed, but in decades to come, this week of music, dancing, art, and drama will indeed become an integral part of Wake Forest life.

The idea of a May Day program at Wake Forest was conceived by Miss Marjorie Crisp, who came to the college last year to head the Women's Physical Education Department. Since Wake Forest had been a coed school only a few years, a May Queen and her Court, so prevalent in most colleges, had never reigned over May 1st at this college.

After May Day

Miss Crisp approached Miss Lois Johnson, dean of women, about the matter. In the discussion that followed, it appeared that in previous years, the Glee Club, the orchestra and the band had presented Spring concerts and plans were made to have all of these programs on the week following May Day. Prof. Thane McDonald, head of the Music Department, concurred wholeheartedly.

By this time, the original idea had outgrown its one-day time limit and would extend over a period of several days. Therefore, the Little Theater, which had already scheduled its usual number of performances was invited to share in the week and plans were made to have the art gallery open during the week.

Thus, the Music Department, the Women's Athletic Association, and the Little Theater, working together, mapped out the preliminary plans for the event. The seven-day affair was christened the "Magnolia Festival" in honor of the campus magnolias which customarily blossom early in May. Such a name seemed to be in keeping with Wake Forest tradition, also.

Ten coeds, elected by their fellow students, formed the first Wake Forest May Court.

At this time, another program was added to the growing lists of events that would make up the Magnolia Festival. In 1942, in order to stimulate interest in music on the campus and in an effort to provide a more diversified recreation, the Magnolia Festival was expanded.

The Philomathesian Literary Society swamped the Euzelian Society in the Founder's Day contests held last week by a score of 100 to 25 out of a possible 125.

Out of a possible 125 points, the Phi's chalked up 100 to win the inter-society contests for the second consecutive semester.

The Phi's won both the girls' and men's debates, the girls' and men's oration, poetry reading, and after-dinner, allowing the Eus to win only the best men's debater, the extemporaneous, and the dramatic reading contests.

The week of contests began on Monday, April 25, with the men's debate, which was won by Henry Huff and Dan Britt of the Phi Society; Dan Lovelace who was aided by Bob Howren in representing the Eus, was declared best debater in this contest. The girls' debate, which was to be held the same day, was conceded to the Phi's, for whom Elva Laurance and Marjorie Macey were to debate; Miss Laurance was selected as the best debater.

Candy Crumpler of the Phi's beat at Jinx Royal of the Eus in the girls' impromptu contest on Tuesday afternoon. Ray Stone won the men's impromptu, the Phi's over Lloyd Abernethy. In the dramatic reading field on the same day, Crea Dean of the Eus won the contest over Dave Clark of the Phi's; and Allan Johnson of the Phi's beat Truman Smith in the declamation contest.

In the extemporaneous contest on Wednesday afternoon, Ed Christman, representing the Eus, beat B. T. Henderson of the Phi Society.

Following the banquet held by the two societies at the S & W Cafeteria in Raleigh on Friday night, the week of contests came to a close with the poetry reading and after-dinner speech contests. The poetry reading was won by Carol Oldham in competition against Betty Winingham of the Eus, and the after-dinner was won by L. W. Pullen for the Phi's; the Eus offered no contestant for the after-dinner contest.

Candy Crumpler of the Phi Society sang a solo at the banquet and Henry Huff was called upon by Joe Miller, the Phi president and presiding officer for the banquet, for an impromptu speech on the subject "Lovelace the Gopher."

Trustees Board Appoints Group To Fill Vacancy

Dr. C. C. Warren Heads Committee to Name Successor

Last Friday the Board of Trustees made plans for the choosing of a successor for President Kitchin whose retirement will become effective July 1, 1950.

A committee of trustees was appointed to seek out and recommend to the Board a successor. Dr. C. C. Warren, Charlotte, was named chairman of the committee. The other members appointed were O. M. Mull, Nane Starnes, C. B. Dean, H. E. Olive, L. R. Varner, C. V. Tyner, and I. E. Carlyle, president of the Board.

To aid the trustee committee in its weighty task, an advisory committee was appointed. All the members of this committee are alumni of Wake Forest. J. J. Hayes was named chairman. The others are Gerald W. Johnson, T. Lamar Caudle, James F. Hoge, Robert L. Humber, Kyle M. Yates, and W. H. Weatherspoon. Four additional members will be named to this advisory committee by the President of the Alumni Association.

The Board further voted that in addition to the advisory committee of laymen an advisory committee of seven pastors in the State be named to aid in securing a successor for President Kitchin.

The trustees paid high tribute to President Kitchin in accepting his resignation and appointed a committee of three to draw up a resolution of appreciation for his work, life, and services rendered to the college for the past 33 years.

Another committee of three was named to draft a resolution of respect for services rendered to the college by the late Senator Broughton.

President Carlyle made a report on the progress of the Wake Forest enlargement program. Total resources and pledges now amount to over 4 3-4 million dollars. Of this amount, a little over 2 million is now on hand. The largest contributors to date have been the city of Winston-Salem and Forsyth County.

Cook Sponsors Music Recitals

Student spring recitals, sponsored by the music department, passed their half-way mark this week with the piano recitals by George Cribb on Monday night and Charles Horton on Tuesday. The recitals are held at eight o'clock in Room 205 of the Music-Religion building.

Next week's recitals will feature Vera King, contralto, on Monday, May 16 and Bill Herring pianist, on Tuesday May 17.

Previous recitals have been given by Miss Phyllis Cooper, soprano, of Raleigh, who is serving on the Wake Forest music faculty, the college Little Symphony Orchestra Bill Parham, clarinetist, and Ruby Orders Osborne, pianist.

Cribb's concert was outstanding in introduction of some unfamiliar modern selections along with the well-known Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, Brahms, and Chopin of most programs. The five short selections in the second group of his recital were varied in tone and tempo and very picturesque in their subject: a bear dance, a berceuse, a sea chanty, and a Greek ceremonial dance.

Cribb's technique although not perfect, was poised and free of any taint of "showing off." His attitude seemed to invite the listener to enjoy this music, which he liked, with him.

Orators Named For Graduation

Pruden and Humber Will Address Graduating Class

The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered this year by Dr. Edward Hughes Pruden, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Washington, D. C. Dr. Pruden has visited the Wake Forest campus several times in the past. He spoke at the Religious Emphasis Week services in 1944, at the Wake Forest Baptist Church, and has made other brief visits to the campus.

Born in Virginia, Dr. Pruden has seen quite a bit of the world. He received his A. B. and D. D. degrees from the University of Richmond, and his Th. M. from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky. He studied at the University of Edinburgh and at Yale University for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

He has been a member of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board, and in the late 1930's taught at the University of Shanghai. Dr. Pruden is a member of Omicron Delta Kappa and of Tau Kappa Alpha, honorary Forensics Fraternity.

Baccalaureate Sermon

The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered on Sunday evening, May 29, and on the following evening, Monday, May 30, Mr. Robert Lee Humber will deliver the commencement address. Mr. Humber is a familiar figure at Wake Forest. He is known best in connection with his efforts toward the establishment of a world federal government. From the time of its inception at Davis Island, N. C., Mr. Humber's resolution for world federation has been adopted by fourteen of the forty-eight state legislatures. Mr. Humber personally presented his resolution at each of them.

Mr. Humber is an alumnus of Wake Forest. He is a member of the class of '18, and also received his degree in law from the Wake Forest School of Law. He later took an M. A. degree from Harvard and studied under a —See ORATORS, Page 2—

Trustees Accept July, 1950, Date For Resignation

President to Remain with College as Hygiene Professor

The Board of Trustees accepted with reluctance President Thurman Kitchin's resignation effective July 1, 1950 at its meeting last Friday.

Dr. Kitchin expressed his desire to remain vitally linked with the college and thus will serve as president emeritus and professor of hygiene and physiology effective upon his retirement from the presidency of the college.

President Kitchin informed the trustees that his decision to announce his retirement plans at this time was prompted by the consideration that at the end of the next fiscal year, June 30, 1950, he will have served the college as president 20 years and as a member of the faculty 33 years, and that he will be only a few months away from his 65th birthday.

Increasing Responsibility

Trustees were further informed by Dr. Kitchin that the removal of the college to Winston-Salem involves an ever increasing responsibility which he feels that he should not assume, that the college has reached a period of its most phenomenal development in making plans for its removal to the new site in Winston-Salem, and that a younger man who will be associated with the college for years to come should be elected to the presidency.

Dr. Kitchin enrolled at Wake Forest as a student 47 years ago and has had official connection with the college for 33 years.

In returning to the classroom, as a full professor of physiology and hygiene, he will be giving instruction in courses which he formerly taught for fifteen years as professor and dean of the Wake Forest College School of Medicine. Dr. Kitchin found much delight in his former teaching duties.

High tribute was paid by the trustees to the remarkable success of President Kitchin's nineteen year administration. Attention —See KITCHIN, Page 6—

Ray Jones Named Chief Cheerleader

Ray Jones was named chief cheerleader for next year at a meeting of the cheerleaders Wednesday night, April 27.

There will be ten cheerleaders next year, not including the chief. Because they have had two years experience in leading Wake Forest students in school yells, Betty Isbell, Betty Head, and Jerry Green will automatically be retained on the 1949-50 cheering squad.

Jones disclosed that the cheerleaders plan to use more skits at football rallies and games next fall, and that a card system will be employed at one game, probably Homecoming. If the experiment proves successful, a system similar to that used by Carolina last year might be incorporated.

Jones also announced that the cheerleaders will yell at all home football and basketball games, and as many of those away from Wake Forest as possible.

At this meeting, the cheering squad decided, in addition, that a class will be held next fall, at which time students interested in trying out for cheerleaders will be given instructions concerning the types of yells to be used, and will be shown how to do those yells. Furthermore, the prospective candidates will be told what cheers are to be used at tryouts, so that they may practice before the actual selections are made by the Intramural Board.

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FOR MANY YEARS

It is with a profound sense of regret and personal sense of loss to the Administration, faculty, and student body to learn of Dr. Kitchin's resignation effective July 1, 1950, as president.

The statement has been made to the effect that Dr. Kitchin's administration has been one which has promoted a phenomenal growth of Wake Forest College during the past twenty years, but this has been shown to be somewhat of an understatement for the fact is that the college has grown more in the past twenty years than it did in all of the 100 years previous to Dr. Kitchin's ascendancy as President.

Dr. Kitchin's accomplishments, and those of this administration, speak for themselves without any further need for eloquence on the part of anyone. It may be controversial to say it in so many words, but it would seem that at the head of this long list of accomplishments would stand Dr. Kitchin's goal of bringing the college academic standards up to a point such that the college is recognized the country over for its high academic standards. It was this accomplishment which led in turn to the Smith Reynolds Foundation's offer to set up the trust fund with which to make the move to Winston-Salem.

Considering Dr. Kitchin's intention to resign as President, it would seem that the President was making a wise move in order to give the trustees sufficient time to select a competent successor, and considering the accomplishments and ideals of the President as shown during his thirty-three year official connection with the college, a President who can carry on the ideals and traditions of Wake Forest College will be hard to obtain.

Dear Sir:

I think that an incident occurring on Saturday morning, April 30, at 11:00 a. m. should be called to the attention of the students and townspeople so that proper action can be taken for the protection of the citizens and transients of Wake Forest.

It is commendable that the town should take prompt action in removing stray dogs after the recent appearance of a dog with rabies in the vicinity. But if the destruction of the dogs is to endanger the lives of the townspeople because of the method used I think that it should be either changed or stopped.

Chief of Police Howard seems to have little consideration for human life; his use of firearms in a crowded area is reckless and shows little ability for the office he holds in Wake Forest.

As for the facts of the incident: It was immediately after class change at the college, and numerous students were approaching the business district via, the underpass. There are a number of steps that lead up on the right hand side of the underpass, and a dog was on the grass area enclosed by the underpass, sidewalk and steps. Officer Howard stopped his car by the blinker and got out with a rifle, apparently a .22 caliber. He shot the dog twice, only to injure it. The dog, howling and in misery, floundered onto the sidewalk, where Officer Howard approached it and shot it with his hand gun. The hand gun was fired at such an angle into the sidewalk that it could easily have injured one of the students on the steps had the bullet ricocheted.

The general opinion of those present was that this exhibition was unnecessary and in reckless disregard for human life. Some are of the opinion that Officer Howard and his guns are a greater menace than the dogs.

Bill Lamb, director, has been in charge of arranging engagements, selecting students to fill them, and generally supervising. He expresses deep gratitude to the host churches and pastors for their cooperation, kindnesses to students, and generous contributions which have gone to defray costs of the station wagon and maintenance.

Phi Alpha Delta Chapter

The Edgar W. Timberlake chapter of the Phi Alpha Delta law fraternity was host to the Rutledge and Ruffin Inn Chapters, of Duke and Carolina respectively, at a joint meeting and banquet held at the Club Bon Aire in Raleigh, Thursday, April 28.

Toastmaster of the occasion, Lon Folger, local P. A. D., introduced the following state dignitaries, who were guests at the banquet: Superior court Judge Henry L. Stevens, Secretary of State Thad Eure, and Edward L. Cannon, secretary of the N. C. State Board of Bar Examiners.

Justice Robert Morgan of the Timberlake chapter announced that the purpose of the meeting was, to obtain better cooperation in the three chapters of Phi Alpha Delta.

Justice Edmonds continued his speech with the advice that the modern successful lawyer continues to be a student, learning to live by meeting all obstacles with free thought.

In concluding his speech, Justice Edmonds said that the fundamental requirement of a good lawyer was that he be a good citizen and in order to be such, he must participate in governmental affairs by leading others in his community to exercise the privileges afforded by the government.

The affair was attended by 325 members, wives and companies of members.

There is a man in our midst who has become as much a part of the college in one year as Wait Hall in its many years of existence. There are very few students who do not recognize the small, slender frame and gray hair of Ernie McKenzie when he walks across the campus. Ernie is definitely an asset to Wake Forest. Even his friendly "Hi" with the yankee accent has become a by word of the students.

Ernie is finishing his first year in Wake Forest, not as a student, but as head trainer of athletics. His work will speak for itself. Prior to the coming of Ernie, Wake Forest did not have a professional trainer. Daddy Behm served as trainer but was not schooled in the art of physiotherapy and the likes. The Deacon athletes received good attention but not like they do at the present.

The many athletes that are served by Ernie are "his" boys. The likeable trainer takes an interest in every boy that has his ankles taped or dips in the whirlpool. Ernie has more troubles on his shoulders than any member of the faculty ever dreamed of — and he loves it. Ernie can always smile when he is looking after his boys because he has a feeling of personal satisfaction. The welfare of the boys are always foremost in his mind and he likes to think that he is helping Wake Forest athletics advance by aiding the boys that do the work.

MISSSES GAMES

As much as Ernie likes football he misses nearly half of the game. While the thousands of fans are watching the play and trying to see who has the ball Ernie is looking for any injuries that may have occurred to a Deacon. Ernie says, "I see if any of my boys get hurt and then I look to see what happened on the play."

In a busy season when two or more sports are going on at the same time Ernie is perhaps the busiest man in Wake County. Every day there are between 50 and 60 boys that must be taped, rubbed down, etc. Ernie works feverishly to see that all the boys get the proper care before the practice begins. After the practice is another story.

With Peahead's crew butting heads and Greason scrimmaging the hoopsters many injuries can occur — and usually do. The job of fixing cuts, bruises, etc. also falls upon the head trainer. While Ernie isn't taping ankles, he may be teaching a class in Physical Education on first aid and safety, or caring for a polio victim with his physiotherapy treatments.

Ernie came to Wake Forest from Dartmouth College where he served as a trainer for two years. Prior to his job at Dartmouth he had worked with the U. S. Public Health Service in Pittsburgh for eight years as a technician.

"FRIENDLIEST CAMPUS"

McKenzie wandered south of the Mason-Dixon line last summer for a visit and stopped over for a visit in Wake Forest. After meeting the students he was sold on the place. As Ernie claims, "this is absolutely the friendliest place I have ever seen. I was so impressed with the way the students and townspeople received me that it was actually hard to believe. I used to be a Yankee from the steel city of Pittsburgh, but now I'm a converted rebel and proud of it. I have been very happy here."

For a guy that never played too many sports the Deacon trainer is a real fan. In his 37 years Ernie has always been around sporting events. "I used to play football as the sixth string fullback on a team in the Western Hills league," McKenzie laughs, "but I liked boxing and wrestling a little bit more." Ernie turned pro for two years and tried his hand in the ring as a means of making a living.

The work Ernie has done at Wake Forest has been nothing short of amazing. Under Ernie's care many students have been able to participate in sports that never dreamed of such a happening. There have been nearly fifty students and faculty members that have received treatments for muscle alienations, sacroiliac conditions, polio, and bone injuries. With the use of the whirlpool, infra-red lamps, radiant heat, and a diathermy machine Ernie has been helping his patients regain their health. For proof of his effectiveness the Athletic Department has signed statements by students declaring how much they have been helped.

REAL FAN

As for being a real Deacon rooter Ernie is of the superstitious type. After the second baseball win he decided that he would wear the same pants for every game. That was fifteen games ago and he still hasn't changed. "I'm not worried about getting them cleaned because I made a bet with Dick Vander Clute that if we won 20 games this year he would have to pay the cleaning bill. I have a good bet," says Ernie.

After all his work in the gymnasium has been finished Ernie likes nothing better than his nightly cup of coffee at the Hen House. That is his idea of perfect relaxation and comfort. Coffee and chatter with friends is Ernie's greatest enjoyment and it brings to close a day that has been packed with his first love — helping students. Whether it be a first string guard or a coed suffering from water on the knee Ernie gives them the best treatments available . . . and always with a friendly smile and a warm "hi."

Ernie McKenzie is definitely a large part of the campus life and athletics at Wake Forest. His efforts will never go unnoticed and the many things he has done for Deacon students will be appreciated for many years to come.

Pitching, Hitting, Larceny of Bases Wins Number 18

Two Deacons Steal Home; Every Wakester Gets Safe Base Hit

Wake Forest's baseball winning streak was extended to 18 games here Wednesday as the Deacons shellacked the State Wolfpack, 9-2.

Twenty-eight hundred spectators saw the Baptists romp to their seventh straight Big Four League victory while adding another triumph to the remarkable string which has school officials here combing the record books to determine if the Deacs aren't close to a new national intercollegiate record.

State's old southpaw jinx, slender Raymond (Moe) Bauer, turned in another sparkling mound performance for his third victory over the Wolfpack. The lean curveball lefthander, who claims the Wolfpack as his favorite "cousins", has allowed State 12 hits in three games, six of them today.

13-Hit Assault

A 13-hit assault on Ernie Johnson and wholesale larceny on the base paths in the late innings were other contributing causes to the latest Wake Forest success.

Coach Lee Gooch's Deacons, who had given Bauer only a slim 3-2 lead after six and a half innings, broke out in a rash of base hits and stolen bases on their last two turns to bat to rout their Big Four neighbors from Raleigh. A four-run barrage in the eighth round tucked No. 18 safely away.

Twice, Deacon base runners stole home while the Wolfpack scrambled in confused attempts to break up delayed double-steals.

Wake Forest's Hoch-Teague keystone combination reeled off two fast double plays, the game's top fielding plays.

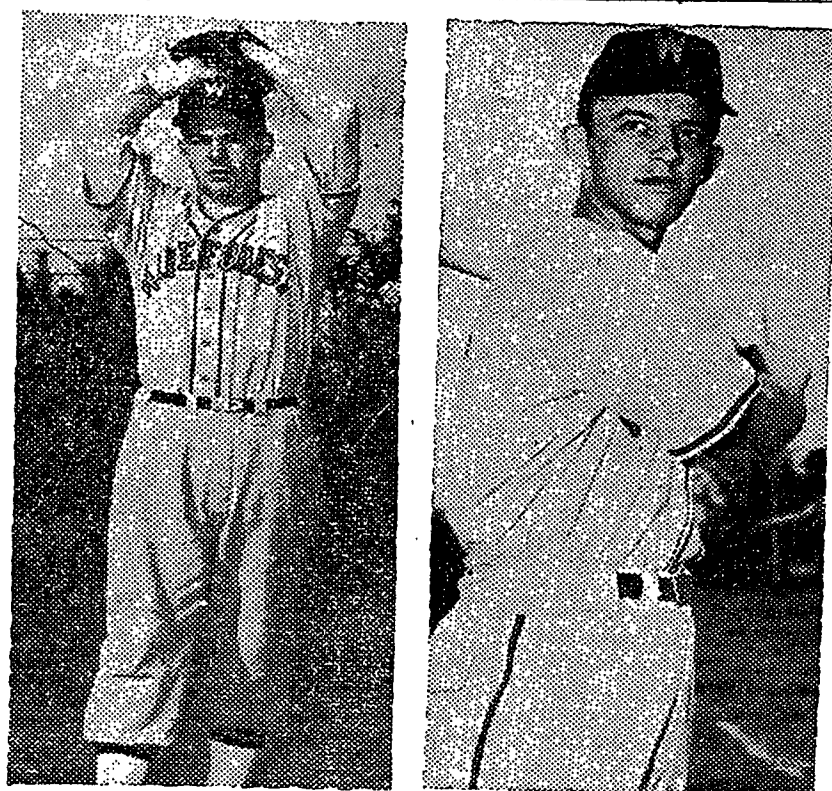

Baldy Harris Proves Capable Performer for Deacon Nine

"He could always hit that ball," commented an old high school opponent of Paul T. Harris one night this spring. That remark might well be termed axiomatic to a baseball career that has led him from bat boy on a championship semi-pro team to one of the most dangerous hitters in the fast Southern Conference loop.

Currently roaming the outer gardens for Coach Lee Gooch's Deacon nine, he is proving the axiom true by hitting a very respectable .333, compiled against some of the top professional and college clubs in this section.

"Baldy" broke into the starting lineup for the first time this year after being ineligible last season. He had played here first in 1947 as a pinch hitter, and despite a long hitch in the Army, came through with a .303 average at the plate.

In Centerfield

This year, Baldy and Charlie Kersh have alternated in center field, with the left-handed Harris usually starting against right handed hurlers. For the first dozen or so games, Harris was literally "knocking the cover off" the ball; lately, he has cooled off somewhat, although he still has not gone hitless in but one game throughout the whole season.

That previously mentioned long hitch in the army included 20 months overseas in 82nd Airborne paratrooper outfits with which he participated in five earned major engagements, including the invasion of southern France and the Battle of the Bulge where he was wounded. In all, he made 19 jumps and rose from a private to staff sergeant. He was not discharged after his wound, but rejoined his outfit, and it was the Christmas Eve of 1946 before he was finally discharged.

Baseball is second nature to Baldy, for like his team mate, Wiley Warren, he is from Roanoke Rapids, that veritable well-spring of baseball players. He captained his high school team during his Junior and Senior years, batted in the clean-up slot, and helped lead it to the runner-up position in the Northeastern Conference when he was a Junior. One of the biggest disappointments of his career, he says, came that year when Ike Perry, local athlete, pulled down what would have been his winning blow with a grandstand catch and saved the conference crown for Elizabeth City. "And Perry hadn't caught one all day before that, either," he moaned.

Was at State

Upon graduation from high school, Baldy went against Fate by enrolling at State College where he was planning to play baseball. Fate jerked him out of school in 1943, however, before he got to perform for the Wolfpack, sent him to Uncle Sam, and when the army finished with him, Joe Talley, former Wake Forest star, talked him into enrolling at Wake.

Incidentally, Joe Talley, who is now principal of Roanoke Rapids High, along with Irv Dickens, Dave Fuller, and Smut Aderholt, all former Deacon stars, performed with a semi-pro Roanoke Rapids ball team back in 1938. That team, with Baldy jerking bats, went to the national finals in Wichita Kansas. So Baldy got the winning habit early.

Pro Career

Majoring in Physical Education, Baldy plans a pro career after graduation. This summer will find him in the semi-pro Albemarle League where many Deacon players spend their summers. He is a member of the Kappa Alpha social fraternity.

Track Team Defeats G. W.

The Flying Deacons have at long last brought home a track victory. The meet was held Saturday in Washington, D. C. with the Deacons edging George Washington University 67 to 64.

The times for the various running events were slow because of a very slow track, plus several bad starts and finishes. Wake Forest held the edge in all dash events by having at least three men place in each dash. The mile run was captured by Shelton Bass, Louis Pate, and Dick Newton, in that order.

The 880 relay team (Gregus, Gregory, Smith, and Gibson) won handily in 1:31.5 seconds, and the Medley relay team comparatively overwhelmed its opposition and won the affair by some 20 yards.

The Old Reliable

Billy Wiggs, Wake's old reliable, got three first places to lead the scoring. He placed first in the 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, and the broad jump and totaled 15 points.

The field events were dominated by George Washington with Wake Forest gaining only a few seconds and thirds. The Baptists had piled up such a lead on the cinder oval that only a shut out in the field events could spoil their

chances for a victory. By annexing their few points in the field events the Deacons decided the meet in their favor.

Friday night the track team will run against State College in Raleigh under the flood lights, and the recent victory may even be repeated against the highly favored Wolfpack.

Among those scoring points against George Washington University were: Henry Watkins, Dick Newton, Al McCotter, E. Watkins, Hugh Curd, Henry Gwinn, Bill Gregus, "Nub" Smith, Ken Ward, Frank Gregory, E. D. Price, Bill Wiggs, Henry Miller, and John Gibson.

Asheboro Plays Host to Deacs; Blue Devils Here

Deacons Meet One More Semi-Pro Outfit May 12

Wake Forest's red-hot baseball Deacons journey to Asheboro tomorrow afternoon for a contest with the strong semi-professional McCrary Eagles.

It will be the Baptists' 19th contest of the season and the next-to-last encounter with a professional or semi-professional club. Whiteville will be met on May 12 in the last meeting with other than collegiate foes. The Deacs have seven games remaining in Big Four play.

The Baptists swing back to home grounds next Wednesday for their last encounter with Duke's Blue Devils. The Deacons have defeated the Devils in three straight contests this season, 6-3, 6-5, and last week's 3-1 11-inning edging.

Statistics released last Tuesday show that Wake Forest still has a team batting average of over .300, although the club collected only 12 safeties in their two Big Four battles last week. The Deacs have 184 hits out of 592 appearances at the plate for a team batting average of .309.

Hits Even 400

Wiley (Boone) Warren, flashy first baseman, has 20 bingles in 50 attempts for an even .400 average for the team leadership in batting. Scrappy Charlie Teague is second with .382; Joe Fulghum and Charlie Kersh, hard-hitting outfielders, are next in line with .379 and .375, respectively. Art Hoch, Paul "Baldy" Harris, Gene Hooks, Dick Vander Clute and Harry Nicholas are all hitting .300 or better.

Vander Clute holds the best pitching record with five victories in as many starts. The Dutchman has allowed only 10 runs in the 39 innings he has pitched, has struck out 28 men and issued 13 base-on-balls. Harry Nicholas and Charlie Kinlaw hold three triumphs apiece, Max Eller and Raymond (Moe) Bauer, two each, and Vernon "Preacher" Mustain and Dick McCleney have each notched one victory.

Nicholas has allowed only eight hits in 19 innings; Teague leads in runs-batted-in with 24 and triples, 3; Warren and Kersh have collected the most doubles, 4 each, and Gene Hooks leads in home runs with 4, closely followed by Paul Livick, Fulghum and Teague, with 3 apiece.

GOLF TEAM WINS OVER DUKE, 18-9

The Wake Forest golfers continued their winning ways by chalking up victories over their old rivals from N. C. State and Duke last week. The wins gave the Deacon linksmen a record of 9 victories, one tie, and one defeat. Two matches and a tentative match with Carolina remain.

The Deacs met N. C. State's golf squad on April 26 in Raleigh and turned back the Engineers 15-1 to 11-2. Arnold Palmer carded a hot 69 to take low medal honors. State had previously bowed to the Baptist by an identical score, 15-1-2 to 11-1-2.

Victory number 9 came at the expense of the Duke linksmen last Tuesday in Raleigh. The Deacs had little trouble in subduing the Dukesters by a score of 18-9. Palmer was again the big gun for the Deacs and his '70 won medalist honors.

The Deacs will meet the Davidson golfers in Charlotte today and will meet Harvie Ward and his University of North Carolina teammates in Winston-Salem tomorrow. A tentative match with Carolina in Winston-Salem next Friday is also scheduled. The Southern Conference Golf tournament will get under way in Winston-Salem next Saturday to close the golf season for the Deacs.

Prof. William C. Soule, of the School of Law, was elected for a four year term as active faculty member.

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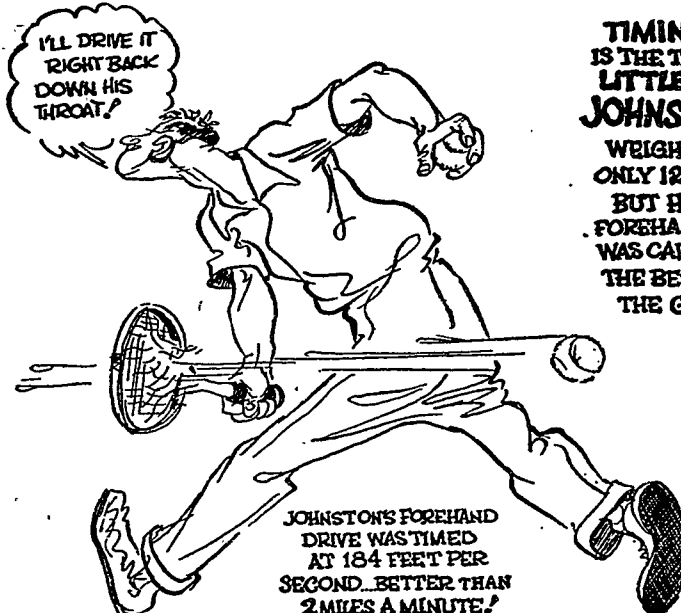
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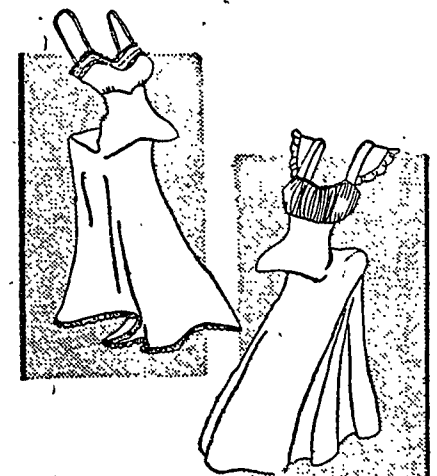

uation. His technique was correct, but not stiff and he managed to put a great deal of feeling into the music by apt crescendos and well-handled accents. Such finger dexterity as he showed in the clean performance of runs and cadenzas comes only after long practice.

Horton's program incorporated five groups. Outstanding in listener enjoyment were the thunderous Preludio e Fugue V, which began the program, the familiar Ritual Fire Dance by de Falla which spiced the middle of it, and the well-known Chopin Scherzo in B-Flat Minor which closed it.

The two Debussy numbers, The Maid With the Flaxen Hair, and The Sunken Cathedral, provided a delicious contrast in the same group. The little blonde must have been extremely dainty, from the melody about her, whereas the cathedral calls up images of a majestic old ruin of gray stone entwined in ivy and surrounded by somber shadows.

Mrs. Osborne's recital was outstanding in the pleasantness of tone-production she worked into her numbers. Members of the music faculty have been heard to say that they did not realize the old piano had such tones left in it.

A clarinet recital is somewhat unusual here, but Parham's was well-organized and well-executed. He chose such composers as Mozart, Brahms, Rubenstein, Dvorak and Rimsky-Korsakov.

Two of his selections with a fire and rhythm suited to the instru-

ment were a tango by Albeniz and a Spanish dance by Moszkowski.

tion was called to the fact that he was inaugurated in 1930 at the beginning of the great depression period when enrollment was low, academic standards unsatisfactory, and financial support meager.

In the early years of his administration destructive fires destroyed two major buildings, placing further strain on the plant.

It was pointed out further how Dr. Kitchin steadily guided the college through the uncertain years of World War II, when enrollment dropped to 300, the Army Finance school came to the campus, and co-education was begun. After the war, adjustments had to be made to meet the influx of returning service men and for an enrollment which has since reached an all-time record at 2,100.

Within two decades of the Kitchin administration, numerous new buildings have been erected, and highest standards have been reached by the Liberal Arts College, the Law School, and the School of Medicine.

All departments have been

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strengthened and enlarged, and a four-year school of medicine established at Winston-Salem.

A new school of business administration has recently been created at Wake Forest. The college and its various schools are now members of regional and national education associations, and financial support of the college has been greatly increased.

The faculty and student body

join the Board of Trustees in according grateful recognition to Dr. Kitchin for his service to the college.
