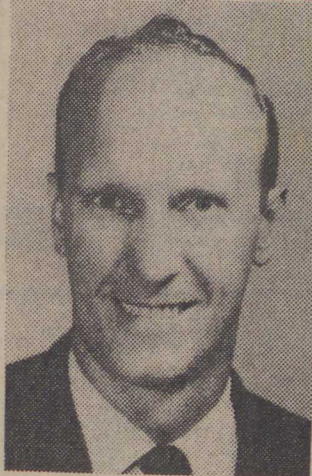

Wagner returns here as Southside pastor

In 1957 Tommy Wagner left his job as meter shop foreman and stoplight serviceman with the City of Thomasville to enter college and study for the ministry. Now, after 25 years and having pastored churches in North and South Carolina, he has returned to Thomasville as pastor of Southside Baptist Church on Fisher Ferry Street.

Wagner delivered his first message at the church on Dec. 5.

He finished his seminary training in 1969 at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary at Wake Forest, but has since done further study in theology. His most recent work was as pastor of First Baptist Church in Crossnore, near Grandfather Mountain. Under his leadership during the past five years, the budget grew from \$34,000 annually to \$67,900.

While at Crossnore, Wagner was

active in the Avery Southern Baptist Association, of which the church is a member. His church provided a house for the associational parsonage and an office without charge. The church led the association in support of its causes, in the amount of 5 percent of undesignated receipts to the budget, and the cooperative program of the Southern Baptist Convention received 10 percent.

Wagner served as moderator/vice moderator of the Avery association. He also served on several key committees.

The minister is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond "Doc" Wagner of W. Green Street. His wife is the former Robena Everhart, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Everhart of Lexington. The two met while students at Pilot High School. They have three children.

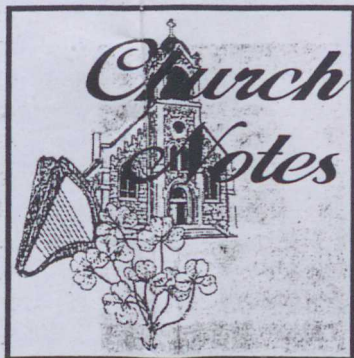
Oak Hill and Southside churches will hold joint spring revival

bachelor of divinity and a master of theology from Covenant Theological Seminary in St. Louis; and a doctor of theology from Concordia Theological Seminary in St. Louis. He has authored a number of books on various theological, language and Bible subjects.

Many new additions will welcome former members and visitors back to Southside Baptist Church as the congregation begins their 75th anniversary celebration this Sunday. New acquisitions, renovations and constructions at the church include sidewalks, church sign, airconditioning, Pastor's study, library, sanctuary with a new pulpit and choir loft, organ and piano stall, tape ministry, and sound system. In 1920 the church became a part of the Liberty Baptist Association and, during exciting growth, the old building was outgrown and a new one was erected in 1952. A three story educational building was added later with one of the largest fellowship halls and kitchens in the Liberty Association, Sunday school classrooms, Pastor's study, choir room and library.

Rev. Tommy Wagner, pastor of Southside for six years, invites all to the celebration services scheduled beginning September 4 when Luther and Mary Frances Morphis, retired Southern Baptist missionaries, will be special guests. Rev. Morphis will deliver the 11 a.m. message during worship services.

Other special services are revival meetings with Rev. Harvey Clark, former pastor of Richfork Baptist Church, on Sept. 11-14 and homecoming with Rev. Leonard Rollins, director of missions in the Liberty Association.

Everyone attending these services will receive a different anniversary gift each Sunday.

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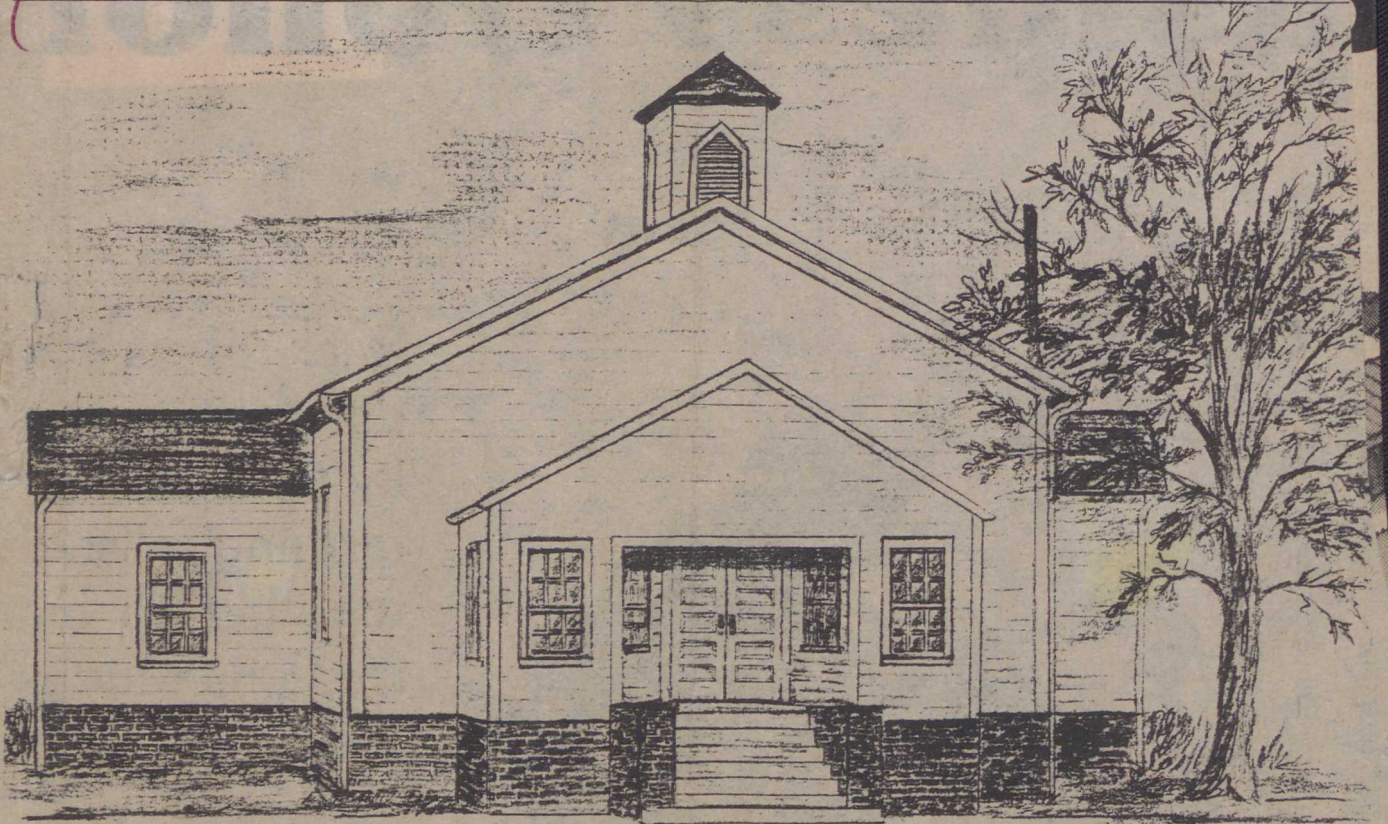
