Deacs Win Big Four Title In Duke Game

Baptists Take Crown In 19-13 Win As Miller Stars;
Kissell Passing To Ondilla Is Decisive Factor
As Wake Defense Holds

Wake Forest's Demon Deacons came out of a stymied second half and took the Big Four championship for the first time in 26 years by defeating Duke's Blue Devils 19-13 last Saturday in Durham. It was the fourth straight year that the Deacs ruled as the major grid power over the Devils, and it took a Duke alumnus Coach Tom Rogers of Wake Forest, to show the Devils he had learned plenty and could dish it out. The weather was perfect, the crowd was overflowing, and Wake Forest was putting on a show. Although rated even by some writers and even though others gave the edge to the Durhamites, it was all Deacon Day throughout the first half, and the strong Wake defense kept a great deal of the second stanza reserved for the Baptists with their terrific stands under pressure.

The first quarter saw a see-saw battle between two even squads, but in the second phase the Wake unleashed power seldom seen in this strong and even conference. The Deacs, who had defeated N. C. State and the University of North Carolina on other week-ends, captured undisputed sovereignty of the cherished Big Four crown, and rightly they deserved the honor to wear it, for although hampered by injuries throughout the season, and the lack of reserves on the bench, they took all three opponents with comparative ease and by decisive margins.

Ground Attack Rugged.

As had been the custom in past games, the passing attack of the Wake Foresters was not the deciding blow to the Devils, for on the ground it was Wake Forest over and over again. Big Bill Miller, running the best he has all season, tore through the Devil forward wall on every occasion in the second period, and bulldozed over for one of the Baptist talls. Around the end went Guido Scarton, called "Mr. Outside" of the Deacs, and on many runs had speed and deception in foiling the men of coach Murray.

First Quarter Slog

Both teams battled on a near even keel all during the initial stanza as a few passes and many ground plays took precedence. The Deacs made a pair of first downs almost in succession to begin a drive, but the march was halted and Joe Koch punted out of danger. No sustained drive was made by Duke in that quarter although several of the blue backs broke out into the clear on two or three plays. It was the second quarter that brought the Wake Forest fans to their feet. The shining light of the Deacs' first touchdown was end Bob Ondilla, who snaggled pass after pass to get up the Wake tally. Ed Kissell threw to Ondilla for five yards, then again for eight. A heave to Jack Lewis advanced the ball 15 more and the stands sensed a Wake score. Miller tore the line for eight, and Scarton picked up 10 on a pass. Miller bulldozed on into the Duke secondary before being stopped, and on the next play, Dickie Davis, who had been sent in for Kissell, found Ondilla in the end zone and the Deacs led 6-0. Sonny George made the placement. The catches made by Ondilla were of the variety very rarely seen, for they were leaping snags caught on the finger tips.

Miller Shines

Big Bill Miller then began putting on a one-man show for the fans as he forgot his injured knee and bulldozed time and again for yardage. After Kissell had thrown for no good repeated passes, the leather was donated to the driving fullback who found superb blocking and made good use of the opportunity. He handled the ball six out of 11 times, and when the time was running short, he crashed over from the six right through the center of the Devil line, and Wake Forest had another six points. George's attempted conversions was no good, and the Deacs led 12-0.

Deacs Show In Second

It was the same Blue Devil team in the second half as it was the first, but something new had been added. After taking the measure of Georgia Tech the week previously, the Devils came out of the dressing room fired up for another win. Their split-T formation clicked with precision, and their long passes found receivers far downfield on numerous occasions. The entire Devil backfield combined talents to bring the first Durham T. D. Worth Lutz, Jerry Barger, Red Smith, and Jack Kistler were the main guns of the attack. On fourth, and with four yards to go, Lutz passed to Red Smith, perhaps the all-around best man in the Duke lineup Saturday, for the tally. There was not a Wake Forest defender within ten yards of the scorer. The placement by Ray Green was good, and Duke trailed 19-7.

Four first downs and a penalty against the Baptists put Duke in its second scoring position. The same Big Four in the Devil lineup took command of the situation and guided the Blummen on to their second score with comparative ease, for the Wake line was beginning to feel the lack of reserves. After a steady march all the way from their own 15, Red Smith scored from three yards out. The Deacs had held them for three downs on the goal. The conversion was no good, and the scoring for the day was completed.

ROTC Plans First Parade

Armistice Observance To
Be In Cooperation
With Legion

Members of the Wake Forest Reserve Officers Training Corps will participate in an Armistice Day Observance parade on Tuesday, November 13, in cooperation with the Wake Forest American Legion Post. Lt. Col. Joseph S. Terrell, ROTC commanding officer, last week announced plans for the event.

The parade is being held on Tuesday in view of the fact that Armistice Day, November 11, fell on Sunday and it would have been impossible for the unit to participate then.

The ROTC battalion will fall in a column of platoons in line on the campus in front of the auditorium at 12:40 Tuesday.

The group will then march to an assembly point on Owens Street, going through the underpass, Roosevelt Avenue, White Street, Jones Street, and Brooks Street to Owens Street.

Firing Squad
At the assembly point the ROTC Unit will fall in behind representatives of the Wake Forest American Legion Post. The entire parade will then proceed to the local cemetery where ceremonies honoring war dead will be held.

The ROTC firing squad will fire three volleys, taps will be played and the band will also participate in the event.

Following the ceremony the ROTC Unit will march back to the campus and be dismissed. This ceremony will replace the regular Tuesday drill session.

Special work was done last week with members of the rifle squad.

Broadcast Set For Taft Talk

Ohio Senator To Speak
At Wake Forest
November 28

Plans for the broadcasting of the speech which Ohio Senator Robert A. Taft will make at Wake Forest College on November 28 were completed last week. Gerald Chandler, chairman of the North Carolina Young Republican College Council, announced that the Taft address will be broadcast over WPTF, Raleigh radio station.

At present it is not known whether the program will be carried over WPTF by direct broadcast as it occurs here on the campus or will be used later as a transcribed feature. Chandler said that station officials are discussing the possibility of broadcasting the program during the evening of November 28 in an effort to reach a wider audience.

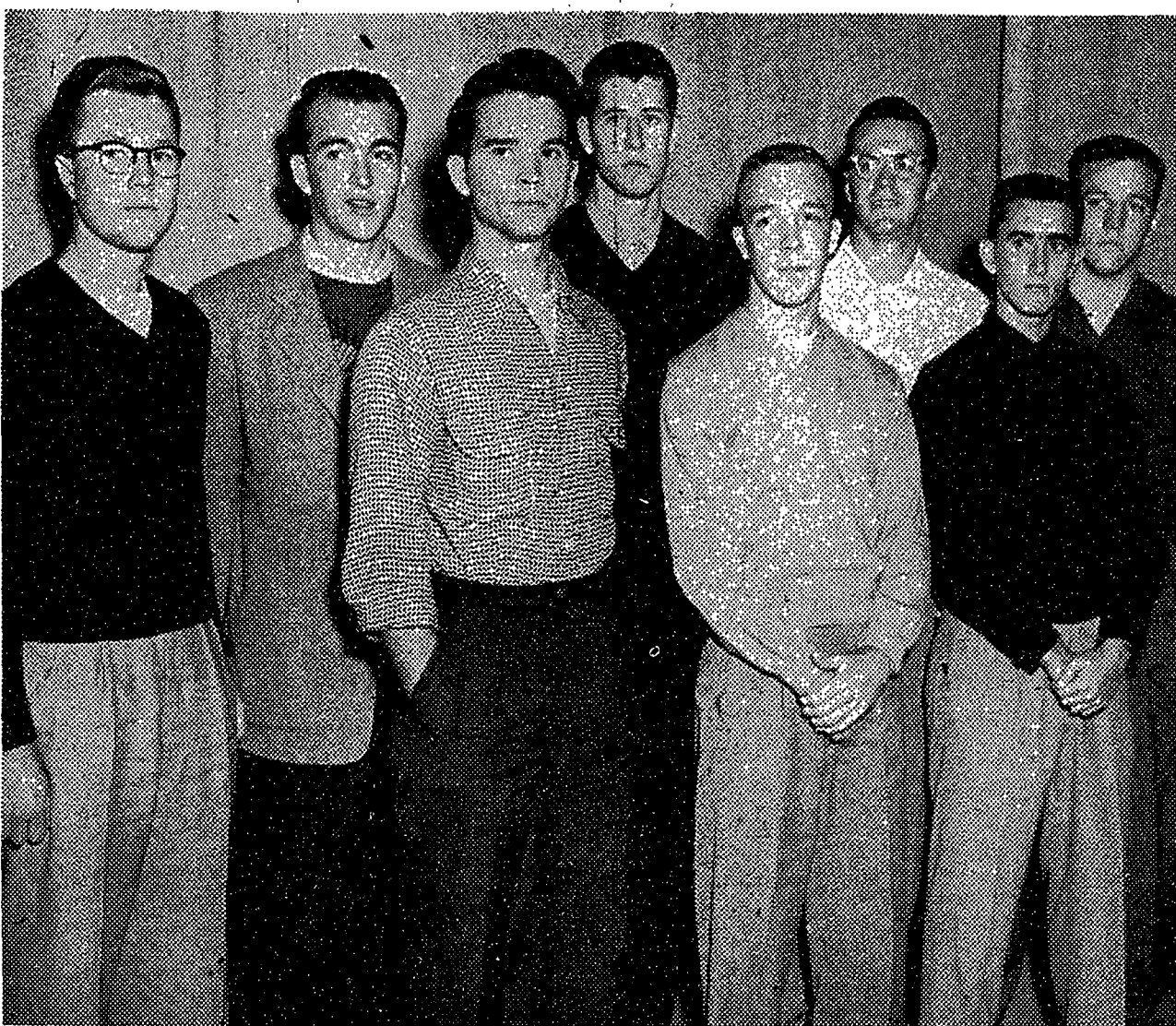
The broadcast, regardless of the time broadcast, is expected to include the question portion of Taft's address. Students and faculty members will be given an opportunity to question the Senator following his speech.

Plans are also being made to have Senator Taft speak to the Law School immediately after his speech in chapel. The chapel address will be made at 10 o'clock, during the regular assembly period. A definite announcement concerning the Law School address will be made later.

Senator Taft will reach the Raleigh-Durham airport about 2:30 Tuesday, November 27. He will go to Chapel Hill to deliver the first of three Well Lectures. He will appear at Wake Forest the following morning. His stay here, while brief, will be sufficiently long to give students an opportunity to speak to the man who has come to be known the country over as "Mr. Republican."

Senator Taft, outspoken administration critic, is the only announced candidate for the Republican nomination for the presidency in 1952.

Legislature Proposes Major Amendments In Wake Forest Student Body Constitution

Revisions Would Include
Organizational Changes
In Government

Several major amendments to the Constitution of the Student Body of Wake Forest College have been proposed by the special Student Legislature committee for the annual reviewing and revising of the Constitution. Besides the revision of some of the document's phrasing, the changes affect divisions such as organization of the governments, conduct regulations, and procedures for various types of business.

One of the major revisions in the constitution is in the provision for the organization of the Student Legislature. The membership of the group is to be increased from 13 to 15. It will include five seniors, three juniors, three sophomores, two law students, one representative of the Woman's Government, and the vice-president of the Student Body, who automatically becomes the Speaker of the body.

Membership Reduced
The membership of the Student Council is to be reduced from 19 to 13, to include five from the senior class, including the president, three from the junior class, two from the sophomore class and the president of the Woman's Government. The members of the Council elect a chairman from their own number.

The secretary of the group is to make and preserve the records of the Council and is responsible to the Legislature. The treasurer allocates funds for student activities and is to be advised on the budget by the

Legislature.
The Committee is recommending that there be an Executive Cabinet established to take care of the executive duties of the Legislature. (Creation of this new department would provide that the Student Council take charge of judicial powers, a provision lacking in the Constitution as it stands now.) The Cabinet is to be composed of the executive officers of the Student Body, the chairman of the Student Council, chairmen of the standing committees (not to exceed six), and the chairman of the Athletic Council. The Cabinet's purpose is to direct student activities and to aid the President in his work. The President is to have the power to remove from office any excessively negligent members of the cabinet.

Athletic Council Changed
The organization of the Athletic Council is to be revised also. There are to be two members of the Monogram Club (including the president), and three members of the campus Physical Education Fraternity, Phi Epsilon Kappa, on the Council. The group also includes the head cheerleader and the Sports Editor of the Old Gold and Black.

Freshmen would be affected by the new constitution in two ways. Freshman class officers would be nominated by petition to the Legislature in the Fall. The Freshman Advisory Committee would be appointed by the Executive Cabinet, with the approval of the Legislature.

New Presidential Duties
The President of the Student Body has several new duties as provided by the amendments. He would have the authority to appoint the Chapel Committee and the Hand-

book Committee, both of which would also be required to have the approval of the Legislature. He could also appoint, during the Spring, the summer school president, if he does not plan to attend summer school, and the other vacant offices in the Legislature. These

Men students will be elected by ODK in its meeting next Wednesday night. Those students who are bona fide members of the Student Body and who meet standards of leadership, scholarship and character required by the national organization are eligible for election into the fraternity.

Members must be outstanding in scholarship, athletics, social and religious work, publications, or speech, music and dramatic arts.

One Per Cent Elected
The group never selects more than one per cent of the Student Body and usually chooses from eight to ten for induction.

Seven student members and four faculty members are active in the local chapter. The student members

Wright Made Managing Editor

Old Gold And Black
Man Earns Staff
Promotion

L. M. Wright Jr., Thomasville junior, has been elevated to the position of Managing Editor of Old Gold and Black. The 24-year-old Navy veteran and former editor of The Triangle, student newspaper of Wingate College, has served as an Associate Editor of this paper since the first of October.

The promotion of Wright to the newly-created position was made last week as a part of a general plan of the co-editors-in-chief to reorganize the editorial staff setup of the paper into a more specialized system. The post will carry with it considerable more authority and responsibility than the associate editorship.

Valuable Newsman

A married student, Wright transferred to Wake Forest from Wingate College this fall and reported for duty on the Old Gold and Black during the first week of the semester. Since that time he has written several stories weekly and has contributed valuable aid to the co-editors in working with copy on press nights.

Much of his outstanding work has been the reporting of ROTC news, to which he has been regularly assigned since the unit was installed on this campus. He is currently writing an editorial page column of comment on the events of other college campuses.

An English major, Wright is plan-

ning a career in journalism. He is minor in history. Before coming to Wake Forest, he had done either part or full-time work on several newspapers.

Sees War Service

Total Of Freshman Candidates Numbers 36 In Second Round

Dissatisfaction With Procedure In First Nominating
Session Results In Second Meeting And
Addition Of Twelve Names

The total number of candidates for freshman class offices climbed to 36 last Thursday when 12 new names were added to the slate at a second round of nominations in the College Chapel. Student Body President Dan Fagg re-opened fresh nominations after a Student Council decision that the first nominating session had not been properly conducted. Fagg, who is in sole charge of frosh elections and who presided over both nominating meetings, acted on the advice of the Council in allowing the naming of more candidates.

Election Thursday

Freshman elections have been postponed until this Thursday. Voting will take place in the Student Center from 8 o'clock in the morning to five in the afternoon.

The Council, at the request of Fagg, met Monday night to consider protests of Freshman John Banks that the first nominating session "had no semblance of order" and that insufficient time was allowed before motions to cease nominations were granted.

Banks further stated that freshmen were "dissatisfied" about the matter and appealed to Fagg, as president of the Student Body, to remedy the situation.

Constitution Quoted

At the Council meeting Charles Glanville, a member of the Council, said the school constitution had not been violated in the nominating procedure in that the constitution gives the President of the Student Body dictatorial power in the matter of freshman elections.

Article VIII, Section 3 of the Constitution was quoted. It reads in full: "The organization of the freshman class shall not take place before October 15 and shall be in charge of the President of the Student Body."

Ernie Stines stated that "very definitely the freshman class ought to be given the right to further nominate whom they wish."

Several stated that provision should be made for a more satisfactory method of nominations in the future.

Red Barham expressed the opinion that "in an election of this type the floor should be held open until every student who wishes to make a nomination has done so."

Several Council members put forth the idea that the freshman class should vote on whether or not nominations should be re-opened. Barham stated several times that such a method was unfair to those not nominated.

Vote Is 10-5

A vote was called to see whether nominations should be re-opened. Ten voted "yes," five, "no."

After the meeting, President Fagg issued the following statement: "According to my wishes and the Council's, the freshman class will meet Thursday, and nominations will be re-opened."

Fagg stated he welcomed the freshman protests. "I only hope that they will continue to exhibit such an interest in student government," he added that sometime in the near future the Student Legislature will be asked to vote on an amendment requiring freshmen to nominate by petition and that parliamentary rules governing nominations probably will be set up.

All freshmen are required to have their identification cards with them when they go to the polls Thursday.

Nominee List
Ten students were nominated for president. They are Billy Downum, Ray Molsinger, Coy Privette, Tommy Cole, Dick McCall, Guy Walker, Joe Hough, Phil Cook, Phil Robins, and Jim Stines.

Vice-presidential nominees are: Tony Adamo, Bill Gray, Wayne Weber, Jack Boston, Bill Phillips, Bob Burns, Paul Lambides, Jim Privitt, Don Gerding, and Parker Wilson.

Two girls and five boys were nominated for secretary. The girls are Mollie Burden and Faye Tyndall. Other nominations were George Wall, Archie Tyson, Ken Hines, Graham Phillips, Charlie McDowell and Ed Hill.

Nominations for treasurer are Bobby Frederick, Frank Day, Bruce McDaniell, Danny Workman, Ralph Stuerer, Ed Powell, Beverly Lake and Bob Burgess.

Construction On New
Plant To Begin Soon

The green light to move ahead as soon as possible with the actual construction work of the new plant at Winston-Salem was given to Architect J. Frederick Larsen last Wednesday. The decision was made at a meeting of the Building Committee of Wake Forest College.

Dr. Harold W. Tribble, spokesman for the 15-man committee said that at the meeting at Reynolds the group decided to begin construction of the chapel in the "immediate future." Dr. Tribble explained that this means "within the next two or three months."

Cost Reasonable
He further stated that estimates of the cost were submitted to the committee but the figure was not revealed to the public.

"The committee was pleased with the estimate. The architect made a very thorough study and the figure was realistic but reasonable." He also indicated that the present plan is to build the chapel first, then begin construction on the other buildings at two-month intervals.

Wake Leaders To Address Baptist State Convention

Asheville Session To Open Tomorrow; Removal Of Wake Forest College To Winston-Salem Up For Discussion

Eight local residents will be among the representatives from the more than 2,900 Baptist churches in North Carolina as the annual Baptist State Convention gets underway at the First Baptist Church in Asheville tomorrow morning for a three day meet.

Dr. Harold W. Tribble, president of the College; Dr. J. Allen Easley, acting dean of the School of Religion; Dr. Clarence H. Patrick of the Sociology Department; Prof. A. L. Aycock of the English Department; Prof. J. G. Bond of the math department; and Dr. J. Glenn Blackburn, chaplain of the College will represent the College.

Dr. S. L. Stealey, president of the Southeastern Seminary, will represent the seminary and Wait Brewer, local businessman who is a member of the Board of Trustees, will also be present.

Other local people will possibly be sent as messengers from the church, but at press time plans were incomplete.

Wake Forest Discussion

Beginning Tuesday morning and continuing through Thursday morning, reports of accomplishments during the past year will be heard and plans for the future will be made by the delegates which represent approximately 700,000 North Carolina Baptists.

Of perennial interest to the group since 1946, Wake Forest College will again occupy an important part of the business of the convention this year. With Ground Breaking Ceremonies at Winston-Salem an event of the past, the removal program has become more definite in the minds of the North Carolina Baptists.

The report to the convention will show that the churches have contributed in cash about \$1,000,000 of \$1,500,000 goal for the removal program. An amount considerably more than \$1,500,000 has been pledged by the churches.

Committee Of Nineteen

A report of the Committee of nineteen will be heard on Tuesday afternoon. The committee, headed by Rev. E. Norfleet Gardner of Henderson, was authorized last year by the State Convention and was instructed to make a thorough study of all the institutions and agencies of the convention and to make recommendations for a nine-year financial program. The committee has made several visits to Wake Forest in the past year to study its financial needs to be included in the budget.

Another important item on the business agenda will be the plan to transfer the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina to a regular agency supported by the churches through the Cooperative Program. Currently, the Orphanage is operating on donations from the churches direct and on special Orphanage Day offerings of the Sunday Schools.

Seminary Report

The matter of the monetary needs for the Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem will also come before the Convention.

Reports will be given by Dr. Stealey concerning the recently opened Southeastern Seminary and by Dr. Everett Gill of Wake Forest on the foreign mission program. Similar reports will be given by representatives from the Sunday School, Training Union, hospitals, and other divisions of the Convention work. On Wednesday morning the Wake Forest College Quartet will give a short program of special music, followed by a worship period conducted by Evangelist Billy Graham and Shea Smith.

Dr. Grover Jones will give the keynote address, and such noted Baptists as Dr. W. Marshall Craig of Texas, James Morgan and J. Clyde Yates of Charlotte will speak.

Colleges To Provide Music

During the entire convention program groups from various Baptist Colleges will provide special music. On Wednesday night the Wake Forest Alumni will have a special dinner meet with Dr. Tribble giving a resume of the activities of the College during the past year.

The College Trustees will have a luncheon meet on Tuesday. Worth Copeland, assistant bursar, will attend this meeting as secretary-treasurer in the absence of E. B. Earnshaw, bursar, who will be unable to attend because of illness.

The convention will adjourn until next year with a worship program conducted by E. Gibson Davis, who will speak on "Deepening Our Christian Experience."

Dr. Perry Addresses Social Council Session

Dr. Percival Perry, assistant professor of social sciences here, spoke at the annual group meeting of the Social Studies Group of the Council of Christian Education of the Baptist State Convention at Meredith College last Friday night.

Dr. Perry was on a program which included three talks on the general theme, "Threats to Our Traditional Values," which was followed by a panel discussion on the topic. His subject was "The Threat of McCarthyism to Higher Education."

The group to which Perry spoke was made up of representatives of the Baptist Colleges in North Carolina. Speakers from Duke University, N. C. State College, and the University of North Carolina also were included on the program.

Moot Court

Duke, Wake Forest To Meet In National Competition

The Wake Forest School of Law and the Duke School of Law will engage in one of the first rounds of the nation-wide Moot Court competition, sponsored by the Bar Association of New York City, in room A of the Wake Forest Law School Building at 8 o'clock Friday night. In another first-round battle the same night the University of North Carolina Law School will meet the University of South Carolina Law School at Chapel Hill.

In the first round of competition the Wake Forest team, composed of James E. Sizemore of Erwin, Tenn., Norman A. Wiggins of Burlington, and Edgar L. Alston of Greensboro, will represent the appellee side of the case, which has the nature of one before an appellate court involving the constitutional question of contempt proceedings arising out of a congressional investigation conducted by one of the committees of Congress.

Finals In December

The competition is set up on a tournament basis, with a national winner emerging from the finals to be held in New York December 13 and 14. The winner of the Wake Forest-Duke contest will meet the winner of the U.N.C.-U.S.C. duel November 23 at Duke.

The winner of that engagement will compete against the winner of the University of Virginia-William and Mary contest Friday, November 30 at Washington, D. C. The winner there will be entitled to represent this district in the finals in New York December 13 and 14.

Joined in these moot courts are outstanding lawyers and justices throughout the country. For the first round contests at Wake Forest and Chapel Hill, distinguished members of the North Carolina Bar will be judges, and for the second round there will be three justices of the North Carolina Supreme Court.

This is the second year that the Wake Forest Law School has been represented. The program is set up and designed to give law students first-hand information about proceedings in real federal appellate courts and to promote a wholesome spirit of competition among the law schools of the nation.

Second Moot Session

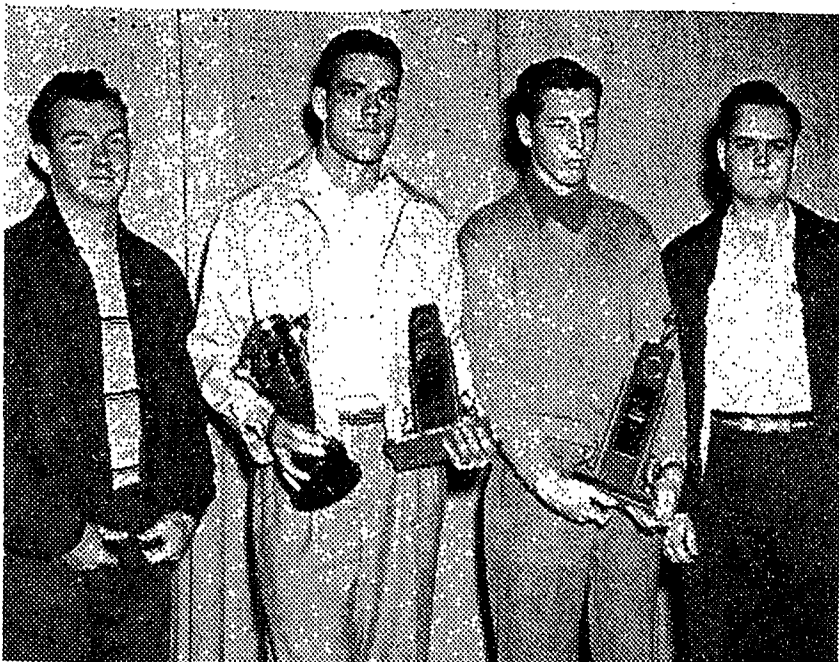

Assistants Are Thought To Run General Information Bureau

Have you ever worked at an information bureau? If you haven't, and care to do so, get a job as a student assistant in the Wake Forest library.

This year there are 21 students working in the College Library. They were chosen on the basis of grades and the classification. One does not need to have high grades, but must have at least consistent average grades. The library staff also tries to keep a balance in order that all the workers will not graduate the same year.

Two thirds of the employed students work at the desk, while the other third do special jobs such as shelving books and putting up newspapers. You are probably wondering what has happened to the fairer sex. It is the feeling of every one who has ever been in charge of a library desk that the work is too tiring for girls. One must remember that an assistant spends most all his time on his feet, racing back and forth to the stacks. Sunny Snyder and Delia Aycock do work as typists, however.

Miss Minnie Kallum and Mrs. Kent Barbee are in charge of the desks and all the student workers. These ladies train the students, and it usually takes one a semester to fully know the Wake Forest library setup. Even if one has worked in another library, he still must be trained, because every library has its own complicated setup and peculiarities.

Carlton P. West, librarian, says that he finds the student workers very satisfactory, and he has no

reason to complain. He did explain that training the turn-over of new people each year was rather difficult.

Why is working in the library good work? To begin with, the hours are suitable to the student's schedule, the pay is 65 cents per hour for the first semester and 75 cents per hour thereafter, and it is very definitely interesting work.

One of the outstanding features for the workers is the fact that they have stack privileges. By having to become acquainted with such a large number of books, they are bound to broaden intellectually. This helps one socially, helping him meet and deal with the public, and it certainly develops patience!

The assistants quite often become a general information bureau, being asked everything from "who was the third president of the United States" to how to work a complicated math problem.

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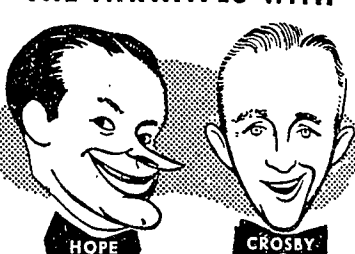

Psychologist Tells Girls How To Break Engagement Easily

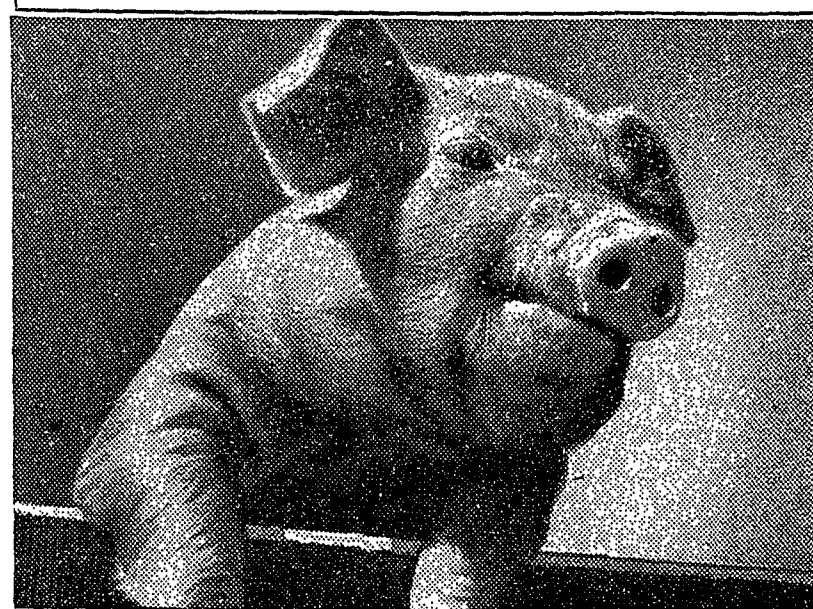

ROTC, Like All Freshmen, Quickly Becomes Part Of College

Ferrell Brown, Typical Cadet, Gives Views On Military Work

Participation In ROTC Takes Same As Any Other Course: Work And Time; Cadet Brown Gives Both

Necessity is the mother of invention.

The Reserve Officers Training Corps is an invention of the United States Army which has been necessary for a number of years. The ROTC is the Army's collegiate battalion. It has become a necessary part of the Army's overall training program because of the constant need of well-trained men in time of national emergency.

There are a number of people who contend that ROTC is nothing new, that it is merely another way of getting young men into uniform. ROTC is not new and, in a sense, it is another way of getting young men in uniform. But it is a very good method of staying out of uniform for a while, too. There are a number who contend that ROTC is not necessary, that it is just another scheme of the government to spend taxpayers' money. ROTC may not be necessary, but for a number of years it has been filling a very definite purpose in the Army's training program, and the cost is kept to an absolute minimum.

What is ROTC?

What, then, does ROTC do? How

does it effect an average student who just goes to college and decides to join ROTC? Is it a college course or an Army course? Does it require more or less time than other regular college courses? How does the average youngster react to the treatment he gets at the hands of ROTC?

About the only way to answer all these questions, and a lot of others that pop up as well, is to pick, at random, a typical ROTC cadet. Ask him questions. Follow his actions. Check his schedule. And find out as much as possible about his background. That is just what has happened.

The typical ROTC cadet is Ferrell E. Brown.

Cadet Brown is a freshman. His home is in Aberdeen. His father, F. H. Brown, is an automobile dealer in Aberdeen. Brown's parents and his younger sister live in Aberdeen now.

Brown Typical

In high school Brown was an outstanding athlete. He stacked up a total of eleven letters in football, basketball and baseball. Explaining the absence of that twelfth letter, Brown says, "They just had football three years while I was there."

At Wake Forest Brown takes English, math, biology, history and military science. He came here during the summer session this past summer to get a head start on his college career. In the summer he completed his freshman English requirements but flunked a course in European history. (That's why history is still on the list of courses now.)

Before coming to Wake Forest Brown seriously considered going to a large out-of-state college to play football. An operation on his knee bone put an end to football for this season, so he came to Wake Forest. Later he hopes to get into baseball and possibly other sports.

"Stay Out Long As Possible"

Cadet Brown is 18 years old. He comes from a family which would send him to college regardless of the times. Asked if he chose Wake Forest because it had an ROTC Unit, Brown said, "Not altogether. But the college I did pick had to have ROTC. I guess I'll have to go to the Army some day, but I want to stay out of this fracas as long as possible."

On Monday morning Brown has history, math and biology during the first three periods. Tuesdays he gets biology lab, English and a military science class.

Asked how work for his ROTC course compared with work for other college courses, Brown said, "I get by in ROTC with little outside studying. I just pay attention to what the man says."

Captain A. E. Vernon, ROTC Adjutant and Brown's instructor, reports that his grades at mid-semester stand at a high "C" average.

Major In Business

Cadet Brown hopes to major in business. He had no comment on his future plans but presumably the business course would fit in with his father's automobile agency. In addition to attending military science classes on a regular schedule, Cadet Brown spends two hours drilling each Tuesday afternoon. His knee operation caused him to miss the first few periods, but he is putting in his time on the drill field now.

Brown, like a lot of other young men at Wake Forest, realizes that membership in ROTC will probably keep him ineligible for the draft. At 18 he's a fine physical specimen, just what the Army seems to want these days. Brown, however, honestly hopes to be able to complete his college work before his activities come under the complete control of the Army.

Being an ROTC cadet apparently does not hamper a student's social life, Brown was pledged by Kappa Alpha social fraternity on October 11. He has gone through the usual routine of time-consuming duties necessary during the training period of new pledges.

Asked about dating, Brown said, "Now don't go into that; you'll fix me so I can't get a date on this campus." But like any man, Brown thinks the women are all right. He dates "two or three times a week." There is a picture of a girl in his room that he knew before he came to Wake Forest. "But she's moved to Washington, now."

In reply to the usual, "How do you like Wake Forest?" Brown said, "It's O. K."

And that's about it. Brown goes

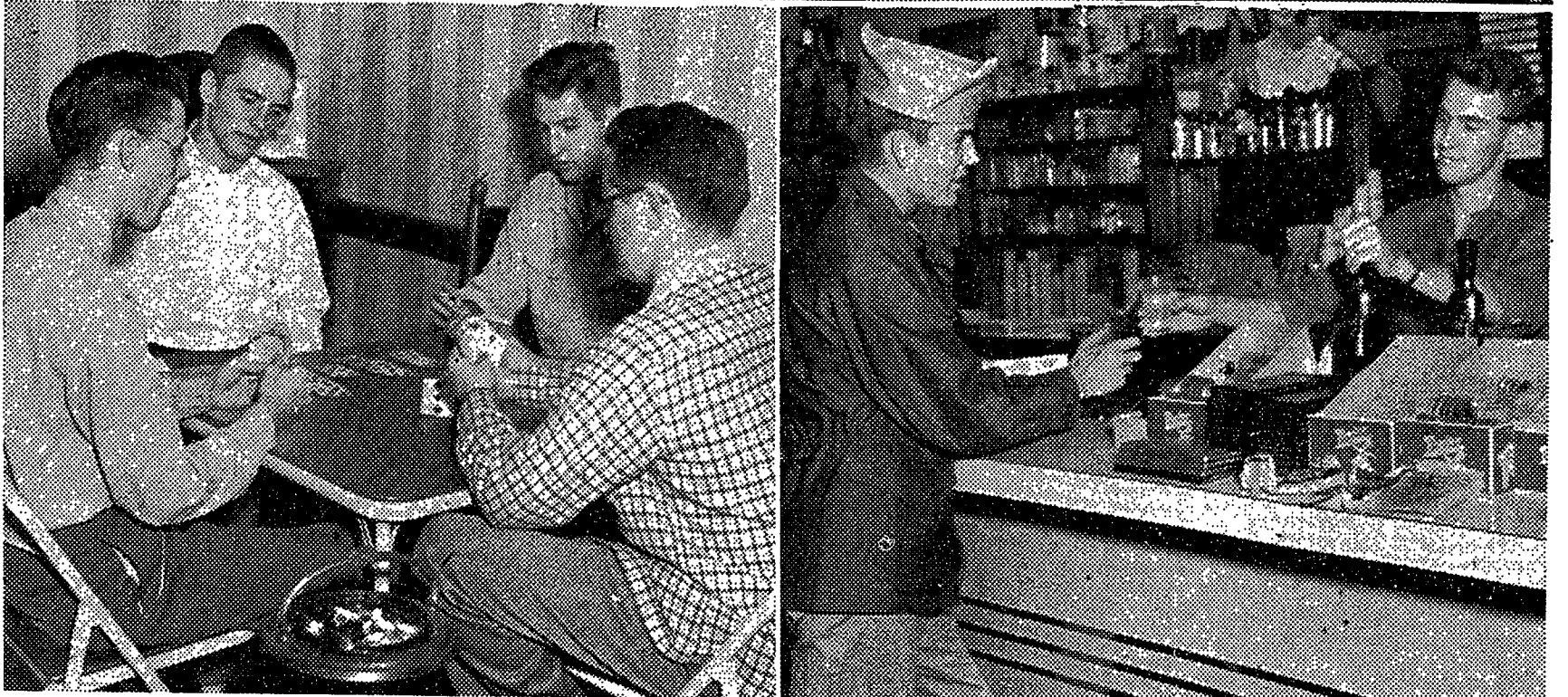
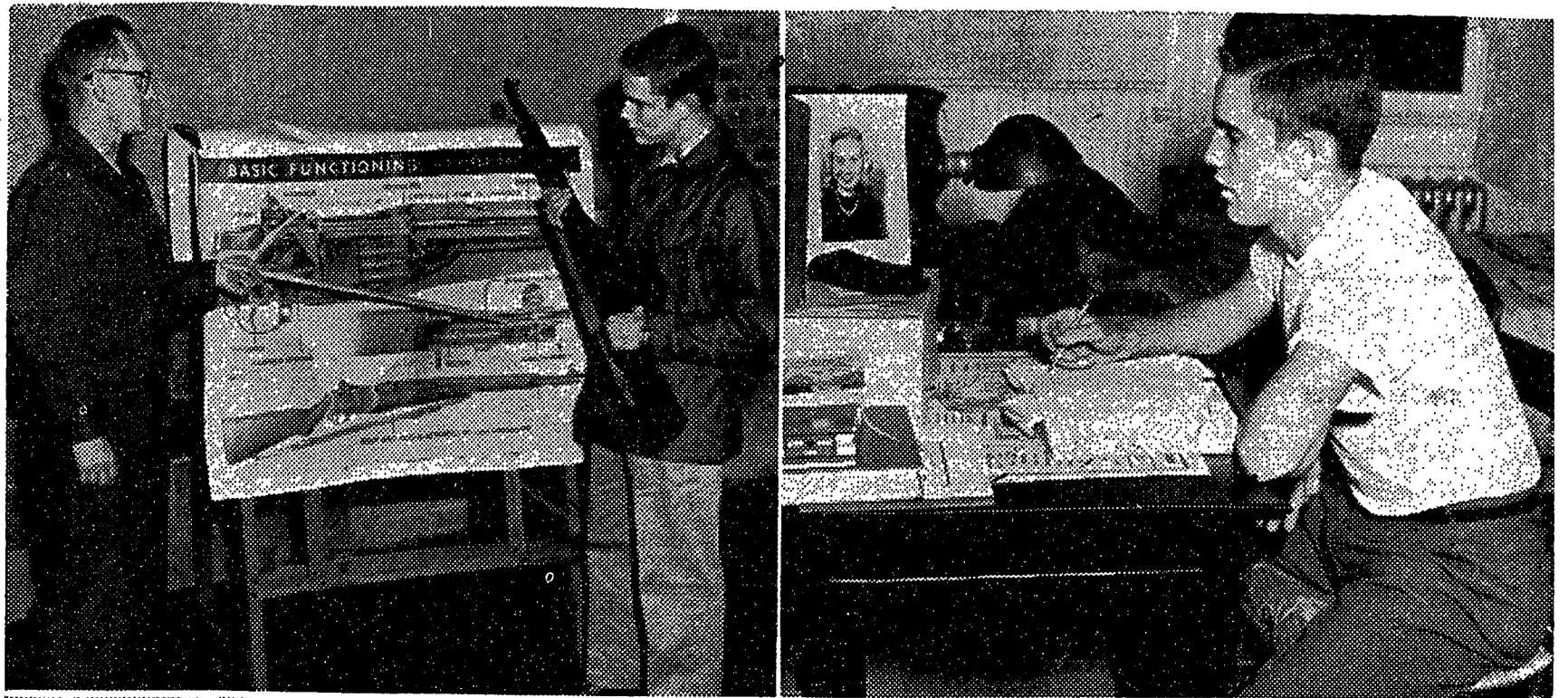

One of the more controversial issues to be introduced is an amendment to the rule against possession or drinking of intoxicating liquors on the campus. The new rule is altered to read "there is to be no drunkenness or boisterous drinking on the campus." Difficulty in enforcing the former rule is said to be the reason for the proposed change.

Revisory Committee

The committee has been working on the amendments since last summer. These changes are the first major ones to be proposed here since before the last war. They are scheduled to be presented by the group to the Legislature for their consideration this week. From this point the recommendations proceed to the Faculty Executive Committee for approval. If the proposals meet with approval from the Faculty, they will be read in chapel for the benefit of the students, and will then be put to a vote later.

Y.; Willis (Doc) Murphrey, president of the Legislature from Roanoke Rapids; and Dan Fagg, President of the Student Body, from Mount Olive, North Carolina.

Knox College Enlarges Tutorial System

Galesburg, Ill.—(I.P.)—Knox College announces that beginning this year its tutorial system will enlarge to become a two-year academic counseling program, and there will be an addition to the college in the establishment of a vocational and personal counseling center.

Heretofore, each freshman was assigned a tutor for his first year here, after which he selected his major field and was advised by the advisor in that field. Under the new program each student shall declare a major at the end of his sophomore year. Prior to that time he will be assigned to a freshman-sophomore Academic Counselor. The Council of Tutors proposed this change in procedure largely on the grounds that one year was inadequate experience for so important a choice as one's major field.

The Academic Counselors hope to improve the techniques and knowledge of their work through an "in service" training program. In this program they will have the assistance of a specialist in vocational and personal counseling. The new vocational and personal counseling center represents a new departure in the campus counseling facilities.

This center will include, in addition to the facilities for vocational and personal guidance, a comprehensive library of occupational information, offices for the placement service, and will provide for part-time student employment. It is hoped that by this change in the procedure, by giving more time in which to choose a major field, the improved counseling resources will enable students to clarify their educational and vocational objectives and to plan their programs wisely.

With this new insight and information in hand the Academic Counselor can then work more effectively with the student in planning his educational program. Should special problems relating to a major field arise the counselor may refer the student to the major advisor for assistance.

Y. this forthcoming season to pitch in a Class A league there.

Stan Johnson, also a leading pitcher on last year's varsity, has signed with the New York Yankees also, and is expected to go to Norfolk, Virginia in the Class B Piedmont League this summer.

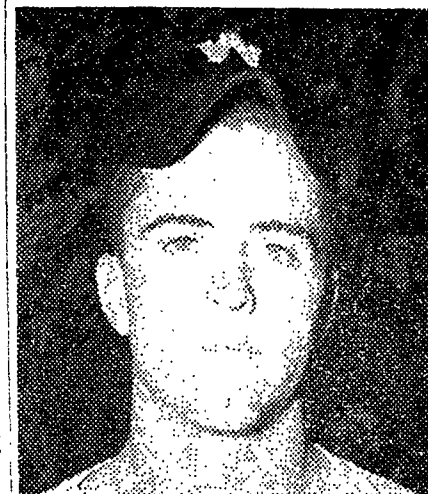
Three freshmen fell under the influence of the Big-Time. These were: Gail Allie, of Statesville, N. C., Buck Riddle, of Knoxville, N. C., and Jack Meyers of Philadelphia, Pa.

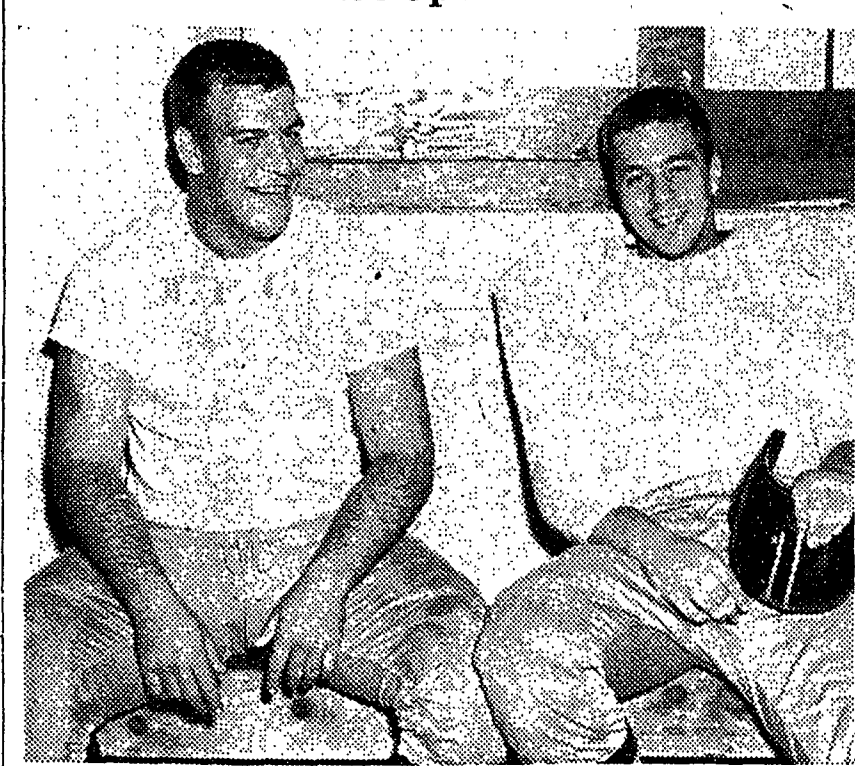

Big Ed Sparks Team With Ability, Cooperation, Friendliness

"Look at that big number 52 hit that guy! Who is he, anyway?" That's the way it is with Ed Listopad; he has played such superlative football at his right tackle post in the past three seasons that he is taken for granted.

A vicious blocker and tackler on the gridiron, the jovial Listopad is one of the most well liked players on the squad. The 6' 2", 230 pound lineman is known as "Cozie" and "Poo" among his fellow gridgers. Despite his heavy framework, Ed possesses a surprisingly high degree of agility, and he certainly uses this to good advantage for the Deacons.

Listopad received his secondary education at Patterson High School in Baltimore, Maryland, where he played next to Bob Auffarth, stand-out right guard of last year's Baptists. Also, Ed was the catcher on Patterson's baseball nine, and heavyweight on the wrestling team. Ed is perhaps the most valuable member of Coach Tom Rogers' forward wall, since he plays on both offensive and defensive platoons, which in itself is a rather rare feat in modern day collegiate football. He, along with Bill George at the left tackle berth, make up one of the most potent tackle combinations in the Southern Conference. It is indeed seldom that one witnesses rival backfield men gain any considerable amount of yardage off the Gold and Black tacklemen.

Off the football field, the blond crew-cut "Cozie" is an outstanding example of the Wake Forest tradition of friendliness. A bright "Hello" or a cheerful "Hi" spoken in his most eloquent Baltimorean brogue, is well known to the upper classes around Baptist Hollow.

Numerous All-American Candidates To Participate In Colorful Grid Attraction In Southwest Conference Stronghold

It will mark the second time in the last three years that a Wake-football squad has made the 1200-odd mile itinerary to the Southwest Conference stronghold state. The Deacs lost in the waning minutes of a hard-fought battle to Southern Methodist University by a score of 13-6 in 1948.

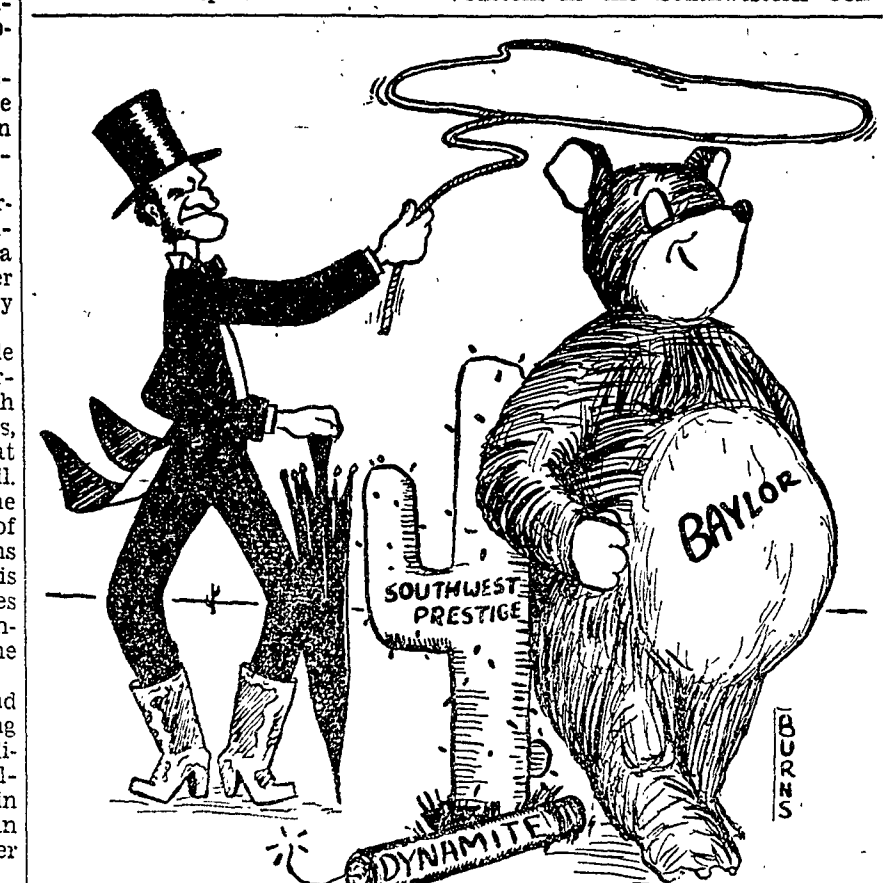
In the past few weeks, the Bears have ranked among the top ten teams in the nation, however, after a defeat at the hands of mighty T. C. U. last week, they dropped to 16th position. On the other hand, Wake Forest has ranked as high as 17th, but has now dropped out of the ratings due to a loss to the Clemson Tigers. Nevertheless, both squads are capable of playing wide-open and fast ball, and are excellent offensive machines.

Isbell Great
Perhaps the brightest star who will make an appearance in the 50,000 capacity stadium will be the outstanding Baylor back Larry Isbell. The senior quarterback has become the byword of the Texans, and promises to present a triple-threat to the wary Deacons. However, Isbell is not alone when All-Americans are mentioned for end Harold Riley, halfback Don Carpenter, and Bob Trout, and center Gale Galloway are also in the national running.

The Bears have sixteen lettermen returning, and although picked as a second division club last year, came in with a rush in November to almost claim the Southwestern title. Almost every position down the ranks has three men in readiness. At the end positions are eight men who play either offense or defense. Playing tackle are eight men who are also capable of seeing double duty although here the specialization tactics are used with Luke Welch, Ed Moak, and Steve Dowden seeing the brunt of the play. The guard positions are well fortified also with John Hancock, Bill Athey, Walter Bais, and James Duncan doing the work here. There are four centers who do the offensive chores and also play the linebacker slot. Foremost is Gale Galloway.

Coach George Sauer has fourteen first-class men handling the duties in the backfield. Of these, five are quarterbacks and safety men, four left halfbacks, five right halves, and five fullbacks. The reason for the larger number when they are counted is that many of the men play two positions.

Run From "T"
The Bears run from the "T" and the "T" with a flanker. The split precision of the fast backs, and the ball-handling of Isbell combine to make the squad one of the most potent in the conference. As is the custom in the Southwestern Conference, almost all of the scoring is done through passes, and the teams are offensively minded. It has been said that this conference is the strongest in the nation, and the reason for the fact is the wide-open ball played in that section.

The Chowan squad was a well-coached group, but they lacked the reserve strength needed for a strong attack. Coach Herb Appenzeller, a former Wake Forest man, had only a 19 man squad, but they presented a defense that stymied the Deacs for the whole first quarter.

He took the ball on his own 35 and raced down the sidelines for the needed 65 yards on an off-tackle play. The extra points just were not clicking that night. Score: 18-0.

Late in the third quarter Wake Forest was on its own 7 yard line, when Brincefield took a pitch-out around right end. He headed for the sidelines behind Bill Parham and John Welton who threw the key blocks that enabled him to go all the way. Midway of the final quarter the J. V.'s scored the final touchdown of the season when Cook on a quarterback sneak went to the Chowan 18. Three plays later Parham took it over from the 5. The extra point was made good on a pass from Cook to Ledford.

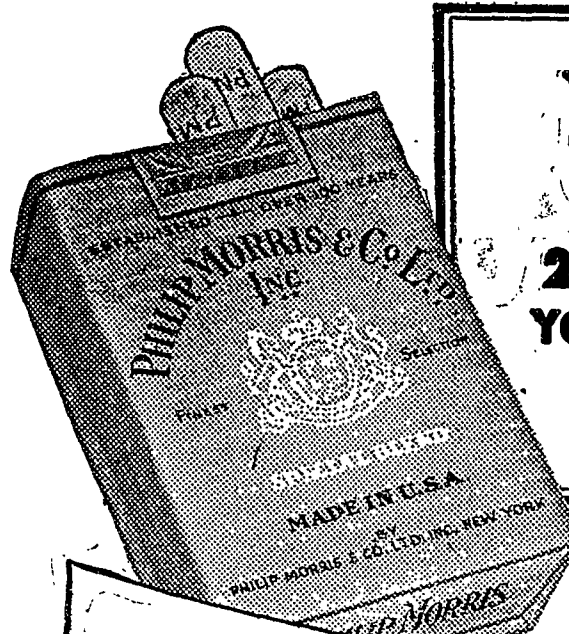

Baldwin-Wallace College Changes Tuition Rates

Berea, O.—(I.P.)—Changes in tuition rates at Baldwin-Wallace College this year probably will make this institution the first liberal arts college in Ohio to charge tuition on a credit hour basis. Under the new plan, regular liberal arts students will be charged \$9 per credit hour.

The previous system charged all regular students a flat rate of \$125 per quarter, though their course loads ranged from 12 to 17 hours.

Although the new plan results in an increase of about eight per cent for students taking a full course load of 15 hours, it provides advantages for those who because of outside work must keep their course load at a minimum.

Complete plans for the ceremony were still being arranged with the American Legion last week. Tentative plans call for the placing of a wreath on the grave of some person who lost his life during war.

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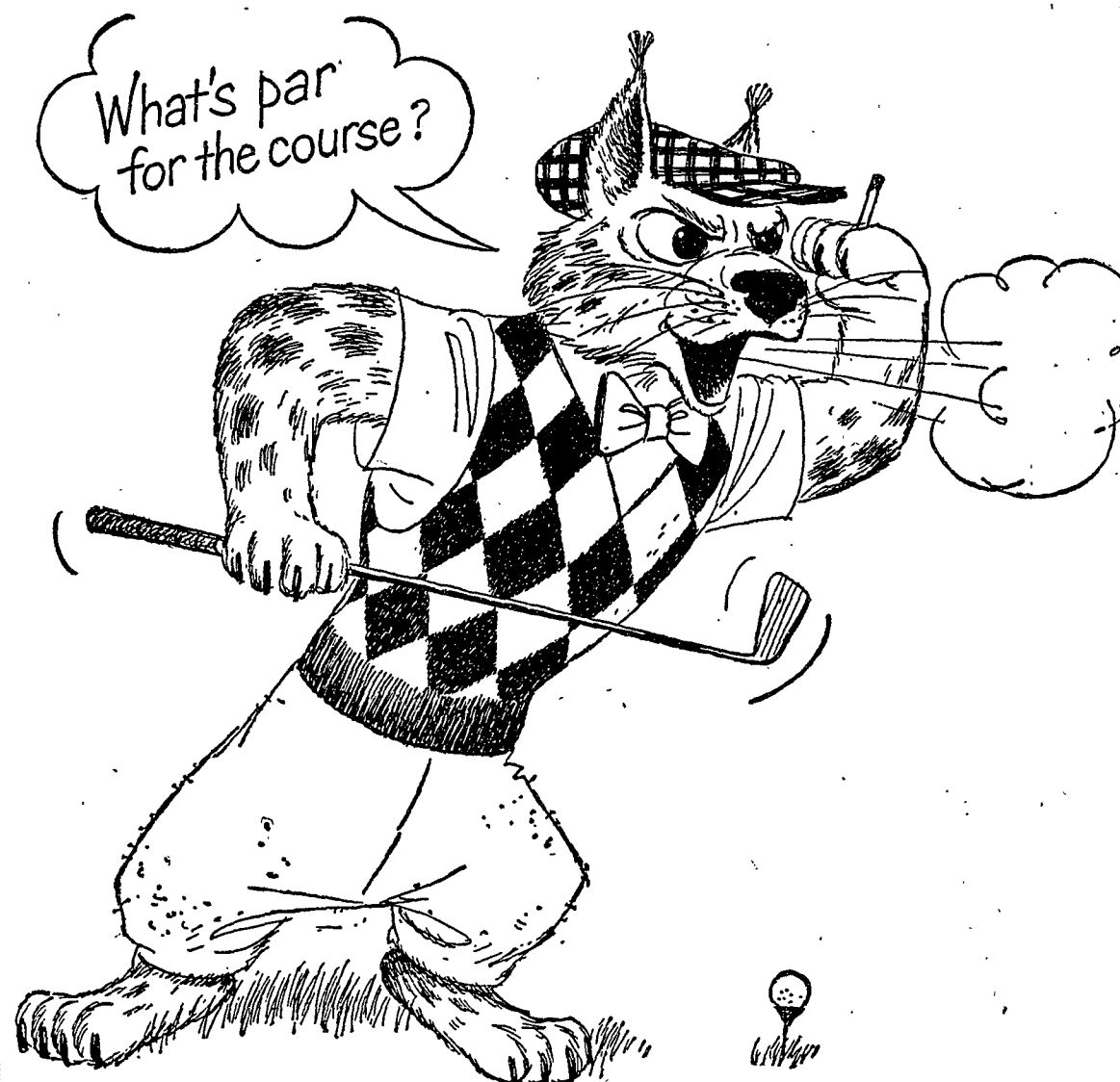
