Students Were Tapped At Chapel Exercises Monday

One Junior, two graduate students, and fifteen seniors were named to membership in Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges last Monday morning at the chapel period. Student Body President Lamar Caudle announced the selections, and presented each of the selectees upon the stage.

How Elected

Students are elected to Who's Who by a committee of faculty members and students appointed by the Dean of the College. Those who have completed two years of college work are eligible for consideration. They are picked in regard to character, scholarship, leadership in extra-curricular activities, and potentialities for usefulness to business and society. Only about 1 per cent of the student body is chosen. The names of Wake Forest's Who's Who members will appear in the organization's reference volume published each year at the University of Alabama.

Outstanding Students

Robert Crouch was the only Junior to receive the honor this year. Planning to enter Bowman Gray next fall, he has won national recognition as a debater, and been invaluable to the Student Council and the Phi Society while at Wake Forest. Clyde A. Douglass, one of the two graduate students, is president of the Law School. Jim Duncan, the other postgraduate, is president of the Monogram Club and an outstanding end on the football team.

Jewell Adams has been outstanding in Woman's Government work, dramatics, the Woman's Religious Association, and serving as chairman of the Social Standards Committee. Raymond "Moe" Bauer is president of the Senior Class, on the Student Council, and a star baseball pitcher. Bill Bethune's contributions to the campus's publications and his scholarship won him the honor.

Mary Griffin "Billie" Bryan stands out in scholarship and in the Little Theatre. Ed Christman is a varsity debater, leader in the Eu Society, and a member of the Student Council. Alton Hall is president of the Baptist Student Union, and is noted for excellent scholarship.

Bill Hensley is a standout on Publication's Row and is head drum major of the band. Vivian Hiers serves this year as president.

Moot Sessions Begin For Term

Next Wednesday's Moot Court session, the second of the term, will deal with the legal entanglements of a strictly business deal.

Clyde Douglass and Kermit Caldwell, as counsel for the appellant, will argue with Stanley Corne and Bob Morgan about the legal tangle a man who pawned some diamonds got into, three judges will hear and decide the argument.

The fictional client of Douglass and Caldwell a man called Andersin, purchased some diamonds from a merchant on credit. To raise some money for some other debts he pawned two of the stones although he did not have title to them.

The merchant heard about it and brought action against Andersin. However, Andersin raised some cash in the mean time and redeemed the diamonds, and even produced them in court. A jury ruled that the merchant could collect the full amount for all the stones.

Over 200 Students Now At Work On Coming Production

The Wake Forest Little Theater will present its major Fall production, Cyrano de Bergerac, at 8 o'clock Monday and Tuesday nights, November 14-15 in the College Chapel.

Charles Kincaid is directing the colorful Edmond Rostand tragedy which stars Bob Phelps and Joan Haywood.

The play features an outstanding cast of 35 persons, with a total of more than 200 people working for this one production, authentic costumes, and an elaborate set. Also, for the first time since the new Chapel was completed, a play will be given on the Chapel stage. These combined elements foretell an exceptional Little Theater play.

Director Pleased

Kincaid, student director for the drama, stated that he "had a superb cast, which has worked very hard to have a finished product for local theater-goers next Monday and Tuesday nights." He was especially commendatory in referring to Joan Haywood, freshman star who has been showing up quite well in the play's leading female role and declared that Miss Haywood "has interpreted her part excellently, showing an emotional maturity far beyond her age." The director continued by saying that Bob Phelps who is cast in the title role "is certainly as good as he was when he played Othello last Spring, and sometimes, I believe he surpasses his noteworthy performance in that drama."

Another actor singled out for recognition was Judson Trueblood. "In his role of the baker, Trueblood does his lines and plays the comic part with true feeling. For an amateur, with no previous Little Theater experience, he is remarkable," Kincaid said.

Cast of Characters

Clyde Randolph, Charlotte Duling, Bob Swain, and George Spence, who also have leading roles, are also among the best in the cast.

Others in the cast of 35 are Joe Miller, Bill Mitchell, Jim Talley, John Gibson, Betty Jo Ring, Sonny Burroughs, Robert Bennet, Charles Garrett, E. J. Cyrano de Bergerac, according to Little Theater officials, is costing more than any other two previous productions in Little Theater history.

Convention, Trustees to Meet Here

The dedication of the Wake Forest College Chapel, an address by Theodore F. Adams on the theme, "Christian Education," the singing of the A Cappella Choir, and a report on the Wake Forest College Enlargement program will be the highlights of the Baptist State Convention as it convenes, for one session, on the Wake Forest Campus Wednesday afternoon, November 16.

Coinciding with the meeting of the Convention on the campus will be the regular quarterly meeting of the board of trustees of the college, which will be in session in the Little Chapel in the Music-Religion Building. The meeting of the board of trustees will begin at noon Wednesday and will be followed by a luncheon for the trustees at 1:30 in the college cafeteria.

The session of the Convention to be held in the new Chapel will be a regular session of the annual State Baptist Convention held yearly in one of the larger cities in the state. The other

regular sessions of the Convention this year are to be held in the Raleigh Memorial Auditorium November 15-17. Dr. J. Glenn Blackburn, pastor of the Wake Forest Baptist Church and college chaplain, and general program chairman of the Convention for this year, has stated that approximately 2,000 delegates, or messengers as they are called in the Baptist Convention, are expected to attend the Convention in Raleigh with a slightly smaller number attending the afternoon session in the new Wake Forest Chapel. Dr. Blackburn has also stated that he hopes to have the afternoon session in Wake Forest broadcast by Station WFDD, the college radio station.

The Convention will be preceded by a pastors conference on Monday afternoon and evening in Raleigh, and the Convention itself will convene on Tuesday Morning, November 15 for the first session at 9:25 with hymns of praise and with a worship service led by Dr. Theo-

dore F. Adams. Dr. Adams will open all seven of the convention's sessions with a worship service.

The theme for the entire three-day convention will be "Our Worship and Our Witness." The Tuesday morning sermon will be given by Dr. Ronald E. Wall. In the afternoon the session theme will be "Our Responsibility For Others" with the afternoon message being, "Our Message for Today's World." This address will be delivered by S. L. Stealey.

Tuesday evening's theme will be "The Men in Our Churches." The two principal talks will be given by Rev. J. Winston Pearce, who will speak on the subject, "The Worship and Witness of the Layman," and "The Layman's Opportunity Today" being delivered by former U. S. Senator Josh Lee of Oklahoma, now a member of the (Continued on page eight)

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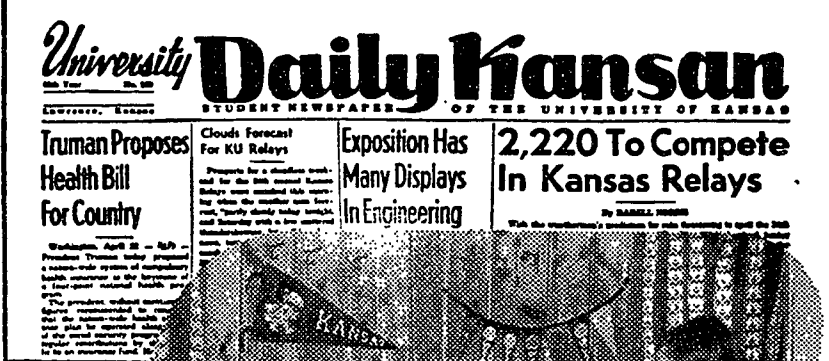
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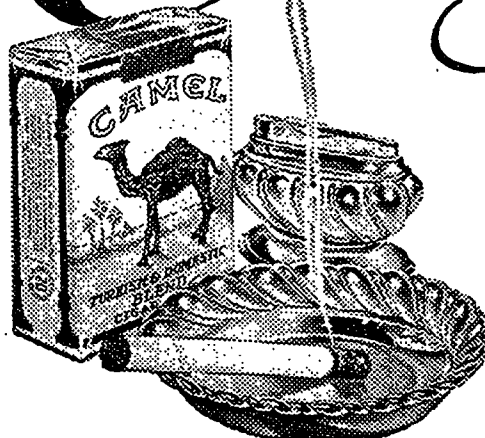
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Early Addresses Chemistry Frat

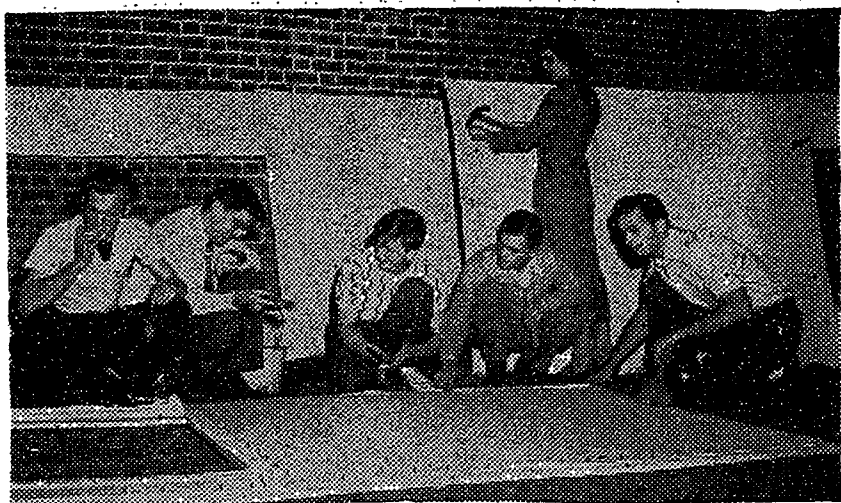

THAR'S GOLD IN THAT LITHOGRAPH

As soon as you finish reading this, run home and dig deep in your attic, you might be harboring \$500. Carefully check your old worthless pictures, they might be valuable, too. And if you really want some luck, call on Professor Aycock to help you.

Listen: Several years ago about 1940, Professor Aycock of the English department purchased a lithograph to be used in connection with a textbook then in use.

A lithograph is "an impression, as of a picture or of printed matter, often in colors, reproduced from a smooth, flat, porous surface of stone or other material on which the design has been laid down by the use of grease and water in such a way that when the whole surface is inked, only certain parts as desired will take the ink and, consequently, print." In other words, this particular lithograph looks like a pencil sketch, a very good one.

Known as "John Brown," the picture (or lithograph) shows that famous man in the foreground seemingly screaming at the winds. Behind him, a line of covered wagons may be seen, and in the distance, a tornado is sweeping the countryside. Standing beside him and gazing up at him mournfully is a Negro lad. The picture (or lithograph) is dynamic in its interpretation of the historical situation, and of course, the textbook, is Stephen Vincent Benet's "John Brown's Body."

The rental fee for costumes, alone, was \$300.00. They are being provided by Van Dorn's in Philadelphia, the same company that furnished the magnificent costumes for Othello, which was given by the Little Theater as a part of the second annual Magnolia Festival last Spring. Some of the cast have three or four costumes changes during the five-act tragedy. Joe Miller and Emma Brauer, co-chairman of the costume committee disclosed late

Wednesday afternoon that the entire wardrobe for the play arrived on Tuesday and a special dress rehearsal for photographs was held Wednesday night. Thursday morning several members of the cast, appeared on campus in costume, attracting notice and giving Cyrano de Bergerac publicity.

Another outstanding feature of the production is the elaborate set, featuring five complete changes of scenery.

The stage crew has been working several hours daily for a

number of weeks on constructing the set, and as the production date draws nearer, work has been speeded up so that at press time, the stage crew was working almost night and day. Dr. Charles Allen, who designed the set, has produced realistic 17th Century scenes, with wonderful perspective. The balconies and parapets of the set add to its real appearance, making it just as good, if not better than, the "Othello" set of last year. Prof. Franklin Shirley has supervised the building of flats for the set, while Dr. Allen and Charles Billings are directing the overall construction.

The additional space afforded by the new Chapel stage is an asset to the stage crew, which previously has always worked under the handicap of a very small playing space.

Another element that should make Cyrano one of the best of Little Theater productions is the novel lighting effects which have been arranged by Dr. Hermon Parker and Clarke Mitchell.

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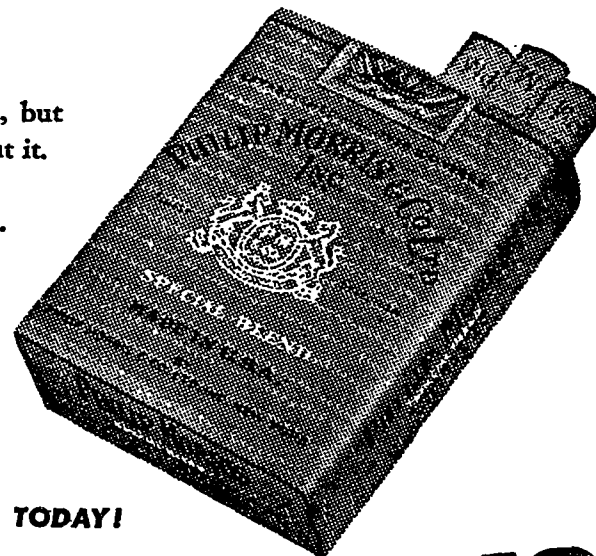

Within the town of Wake Forest there are several who from selfish interests or ignorance of the true state of affairs bitterly oppose the move. They declare that this move will destroy the real Wake Forest, that from the warm, human college of the present there will grow shining degree factory. These fail to realize that this danger while certainly present will never take place if the faculty, alumni, and student body will work hard to see that it does not take place.

Wake Forest College is one of the greatest accomplishments of the Baptist State Convention. The convention can go along way toward answering the critics of change by resolving, while assembled in Wake Forest in its beautiful chapel, to back to the hilt the efforts of those who are striving to make this expansion of Wake Forest a reality.

This resolution however will not be essential to the success of this campaign to move Wake Forest. The Baptists of this state and the friends of Wake Forest will not let this great undertaking fail. But such a resolution will answer the faint of heart who have as yet failed to grasp the full meaning of this chance to widen and increase the scope of this college.

For all but a selfish few who for personal reasons do not wish to see the college seize this opportunity of growth, the move to Winston-Salem is an accomplished fact and the Baptist State Convention might well take this opportunity of confirming it to the world.

MONTHLY REPORT

My fellow students,

Once again it's time for the monthly report to the Student Body.

The first action of consequence this month was the appointment of a committee to make a detailed and exact study of the Honor System as it now exists. This committee has conscientiously attacked this difficult problem and meets every week for a further analysis. It will present concrete recommendations for the improvement of the present system.

The second action of the council was to arrange for the sponsors at Homecoming. Lunch was prepared for all and corsages were presented to the young ladies of William and Mary and of Wake Forest. Special seating arrangements were secured for the game. By extending every courtesy to the visiting dignitaries, we transmitted for you the hospitality and good will of our Student Body to the Student Body of William and Mary.

Along the lines of Student Safety, the Council looked for possible traffic hazards. The intersection of U. S. No. 1 and North Street on the north side of the campus is a particularly bad example. With the co-operation of Chief Howard, we worked out possible solutions and placed our case before the Board of Commissioners of the City of Wake Forest. They too were concerned with the problem and assured us of their co-operation. Contact has been made with the N. C. Highway Commissioner and a remedy will soon be affected.

The Council has also taken care of a problem concerning a large debt owed by a student. This has been settled to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Realizing the need for a program to give students expert consultation concerning their future, the Council has appointed a committee to draw up a concrete plan for a vocational guidance program. When all arrangements are completed, the details will be announced. Such a program could give invaluable aid to those with vocational problems.

A committee is now making a study of Student Council procedures to provide more efficient operation. It will concern all phases of student government work and should be a great benefit to students and Council.

The Freshman Class has now been organized. Two run-off elections were necessary before the final results were obtained.

The Council is very interested in helping to beautify our campus. Quite frankly, our big problem is that of raising funds. Plans are now materializing for this purpose. We feel that with the backing of the students, many improvements can be made.

A request was made that the Student Government approve the issuance of debate emblems to varsity debaters. There was no conflict with the Monogram Club and the request was approved.

As all of us realize, the problem of food is a basic consideration to all students. A study of the existing situation is now under way. If there is a practical method by which conditions may be improved, the Council will do all in its power along these lines.

It seems as if those are the major points of our activities for the past month or so. As you can see, many phases of college life have been examined.

Included in the program of the Wait Hall Tower music this week are several selections by Brahms and Rossini. All of us remember Brahms for his "lullaby," which we have heard since early childhood. Rossini is also famed for his great works, "Stabat Mater," which have become very popular in the last few years.

Concerning Brahms, we have this: "Johannes Brahms was a big, plain man with a beard that lent even more dignity than his bulk; but in spite of his stature and his brusque manners, he was extremely shy. He could not possibly have sought to arouse the storm of critical controversy which his first works evoked, nor could he have sought the commissions which were offered him from time to time. Yet his career could not have been more successful if it had been handled by an expert public relations counsel. Brahms was thoroughly schooled in all the branches of composition and devoted many years to the study of the piano—even appearing from time to time as a soloist. It has been said of his playing, however, that it might best be described as 'turning the piano into a full orchestra . . . it was far more energetic than technically accurate.' In spite of that, Brahms was a great composer and was honored by the University of Breslau in 1880 with the honorary degree of Doctor of Philosophy."

Rossini's part on our Tuesday night program is an offering of the overture to the "Barber of Seville." The hero of Rossini's comic opera, "The Barber of Seville" is the handsome Count Almaviva, who is in love with cantankerous Doctor Bartolo's lovely ward, Rosina. But the character in the title role of this highly popular, amusing work, overshadows the others. He is Figaro, the gay barber of Seville. Figaro is not only a barber, but a factotum—an amazing jack-of-all-trades. As such he has access to many great homes, and comes by so much romantic gossip that he gains and exaggerated opinion of his own importance. The barber pompously describes himself in this aria.

LOCAL STUDENT'S NOVEL NEARING COMPLETION AFTER THREE YEARS

"Yes, I think I've found a publisher. It's not definite, far from it; but I've got my fingers crossed."

And if it should be definite, if the firm does agree to publish his novel, then Arthur Durwood Gore, Jr., will become the first Wake Forest College student to write a full-length novel and have publication plans started on this novel while still in college. This statement is made in good faith after preliminary investigation.

Last year, two seniors wrote and published several of the many legends of WFC in book form. However, as far as is known, no one student has ever actually authored a purely fictitious book that has all the possibilities of becoming a best seller.

This book, "Cry For Those In The Dark," marks the climax of a long and tedious journey. It also marks the beginning of another journey for its young 23-year-old war-veteran author.

During an interview yesterday, the Raeford junior admitted that he had never had any of his works published outside those accepted by the local Student. "But I've great hopes for this," he confided. "If my novel sells, then all the magazines will be clamoring for my short stories whether good or bad!" he added laughing. And only the fact that he continuously stroked his cropped hair during the interview betrayed his inner nervousness and excitement.

It will be the realization of a dream, he declares. And that is true. A dream that began long ago when Arthur Gore, Jr., was just another fellow down the block, but already one who wanted to write. "I had to wait until I was 17 before I could even halfway express myself, though," he said. That was when he wrote his first story, "The Infamy of War," which was written to show that German soldiers were just like the Americans. "It was a dismal failure," he grinned. "Mother and I were the only ones who liked it."

It was during the war year of 1945 that Arthur Gore, Jr., stationed in Korea as an occupation trooper, wrote again. Surrounded by filth, dirt, and sordidness, he scratched out what he termed "inadequate descriptions of the horrible life around me." The various stories could have made a novel, but they were so unreal, so unbelievable that no one would have realized they were true. I threw them all away on

the trip back across, except for a special few I liked."

In 1947, back from the wars, the budding novelist began to be more prolific in his writings. Even then they were just amateurish narratives, he claims. "They were maudlin, with poor motivation, lack of transition, and always were returned with rejection slips."

This first novel as it exists today had its humble birth way back in the spring of '48, when Gore wrote 37,000 words of a book concerning Negro life in the South. Conceiving his idea from regular visits to a friend's farm where an old colorful Negro man used to hang out, he wrote furiously until December of that same year, when he stopped and sent what he had written off to Paul Green, North Carolina playwright. "He was fine," commented Gore. "He gave me a very nice let-down."

Retaining most of the ideas expounded in the first novel,

Gore went to work again this past August and now has completed 60,000 words, or approximately 240 pages typewritten. This work is now undergoing screening by a prospective publisher.

Still concerned with the Southern Negro, the novel deals with such a family during the Great Depression. It is full of pathos and reality. The author's style is brutal, frank, and nakedly truthful. It reveals the shame and degradation the Negroes

suffer whether they are openly rebellious like Jim or the resigned type like Grandma, who rules this family. It is human, yet inhuman.

Gore explained that he was fighting for educational equality, and not necessarily social equality. He firmly believes that the Negroes' predicament arises from ignorance, and that through education their problems will best be solved. He holds that the race does not want to mingle freely with white people any more than white people wish to mingle with them.

It is the first big story attempted by this serious, conscientious man. And the pen of the publisher controls the future. . .

Everyone is cordially invited to visit the exhibition during the dates indicated.

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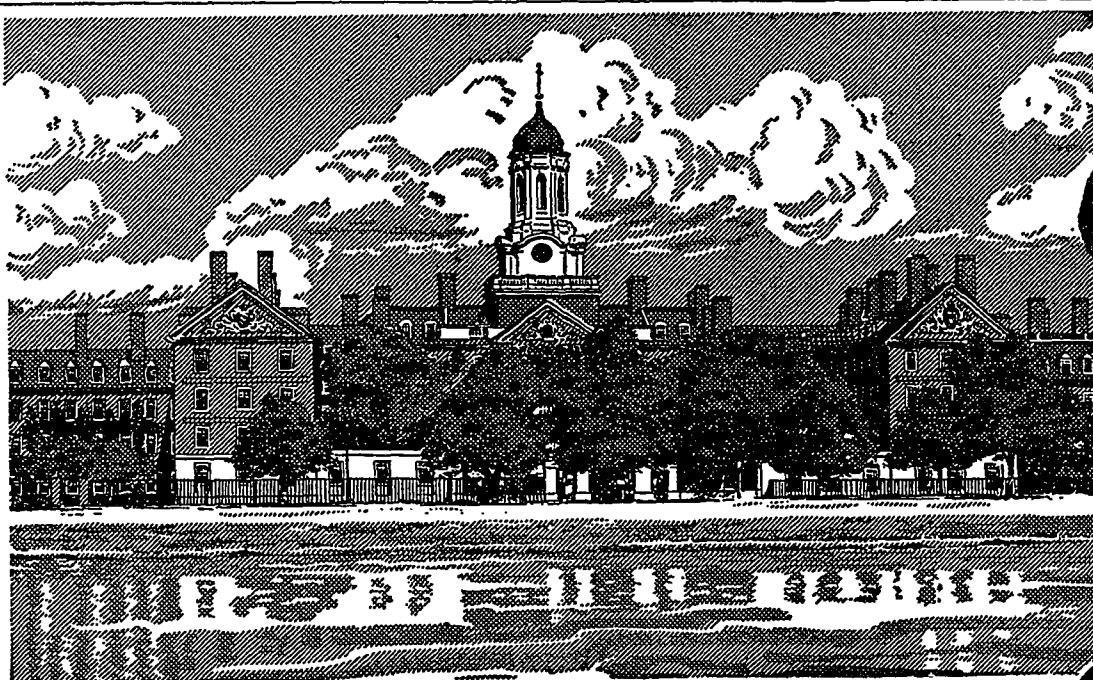
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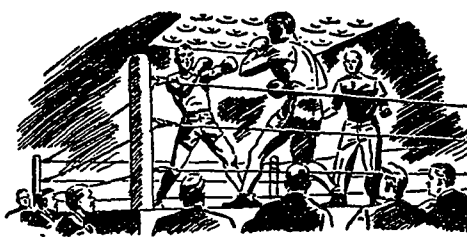

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Deacs Dump Devils 27-7; Tackle Wolfpack Saturday

DEACS AT THEIR BEST

Peahead Walker's improving Demon Deacons rose to the occasion last Saturday afternoon and smote the giant a terrible blow. Some 35,000 spectators watched a Wake Forest team which had faltered in the early part of this near-gone grid season linger along in the opening minutes of the game and then, in lightning-like fashion, strike for two scores and a lead that they never relinquished.

Quarterback Carroll Blackerby, mastermind of the Deacon attack, and a pair of Bills—Gregus and Miller—supplied the necessary punch that the big Deacs needed in grinding out their impressive win over a mighty Duke team that only a week before had been ranked sixteenth in the nation. Gregus carried the ball 26 times for a total of 95 yards and Miller hit the line 18 times for 60 yards. Neither was thrown for a loss the entire afternoon. Blackerby went all the way on offense and connected on nine of 14 pass attempts.

Other backfield standouts were Lou Pollacci and Bob Jones. Pollacci returned a kick-off 30 yards and picked up 29 yards in seven tries from the line of scrimmage. Jones intercepted a Duke pass in the waning seconds of the game and returned it 33 yards for the Deacs final score.

Up front, there were many stars. Ends Jim Duncan, Ed Bradley, and John "Red" O'Quinn were rugged performers against the Dukes. Guards Ray Cicia and Jim Garry, and Tackles Bill George, Tom Palmer, and Jim Staton came in for their share of the praise. Center Jim Zrakas, Francis Scarton, and defensive fullback Ed Karpus looked good in backing the Deacon line. It was the Deac line that provided the turning point of the game when it stopped Duke four times from the two early in the third period.

All in all, it was just a good day for the Deacons. The entire Wake Forest squad had a big part in the victory. It was ample proof of a Walker prediction earlier in the year which said that once mid-season rolled around, the Baptists would be ready to face the best in the country.

FORTY-THIRD TIME

A sellout crowd is expected to watch Wake Forest and North Carolina State College tomorrow afternoon in Riddick Stadium. The Deacs and the Wolfpack, whose rivalry dates all the way back to 1895, meet for the forty-third time.

In 1895, a 4-4 tie score resulted. But in 1908, when the two teams met again, State played the Deacons twice during the season and handed Wake Forest its worst beatings in the history of the college. The Wolfpack defeated the Baptists 25-0 in the first meeting that year and handed the Deacs an unmerciful 76-0 shellacking in the second outing.

Present records show State with 24 wins as compared to the Deacs' 14. Four games have ended in a tie. In those 24 victories by the Wolfpack, 13 have been shutout affairs.

Nothing would delight Wake Forest supporters any more than to see Peahead Walker's Deacons shackle the Wolfpack in similar fashion. The present Baptist club is capable of running up just such a score tomorrow. But, chances are that they won't do it because large scores like that are few and far between when two Big Four clubs meet nowadays.

BIG BAPTISTS SMASH DUKES WITH POWER

Wake Forest's Husky Line Impressive In Win

Wake Forest's burly Baptists had power to burn Saturday afternoon in blasting Duke's Blue Devils 27-7, before 35,000 fans in the huge Duke Stadium.

With the big Deacon line turning in one of its finest performances of the season, Wake's hard-running backs picked up yardage almost at will. Halfback Bill Gregus and Fullback Bill Miller did the most damage to Duke's eight-man line. Carroll Blackerby directed the Deacon attack all the way this afternoon in a game which saw the Duke forces go down to their worst defeat by a Wake Forest team in twenty-five years.

Deacs Score

The Deacs jumped into a 13-0 lead during the first half. Early in the second period, the Baptist's powerful offensive got rolling and marched 56 yards for the game's first touchdown.

Gregus made four yards to the 48, and then Blackerby passed over the middle to O'Quinn on the Duke 43. Miller and Smith picked up eight yards in two carries and then Blackerby tossed to Duncan on the 25 and Gregus, virtually unstoppable today, made a first down on the 18.

The big Deac line then opened a hole at left guard and Gregus, on a handoff from Blackerby romped through for eighteen yards and a Deacon score.

A punt exchange followed the kickoff and Duke was backed up to its 12 when Cox, rushed hard on a pass, was hit by Duncan and Bradley. The ball rolled free and Jim Staton fell on it for the Deacs on the four. Gregus piled into the Duke line for two, and then Miller crashed over for the score.

Duke Tally

The Blue Devils came right back with a touchdown in four plays after the kickoff. Glenn Wild, sub for Cox in the tailback spot, hit Tommy Hughes John Montgomery with successive passes that moved the ball to the Wake 47. After running for two yards on an attempted pass play, Wild dropped back and even though rushed hard on the pass, got it away in time to hit substitute wingback Fred Schoonmaker on the 12 from where he scored.

In the third period, Duke marched all the way to the two, only to be stopped by the husky Deacon line. A punt exchange followed and the Deacs took over on their seven and rambled 93 yards in 22 plays for their third score. Miller and Gregus were the leaders in this long march. On fourth down from the two, Gregus went off left tackle for the Deacon tally. George added the placement to give Wake a 20-7 lead.

Immediately after the ensuing kickoff, Duncan covered a Duke fumble by Wild on the Devils 44. Again, the Baptists showed their power, along with a few short passes and moved to within two yards of the goal. But this time, Gregus was stopped on fourth down with only a minute left to play.

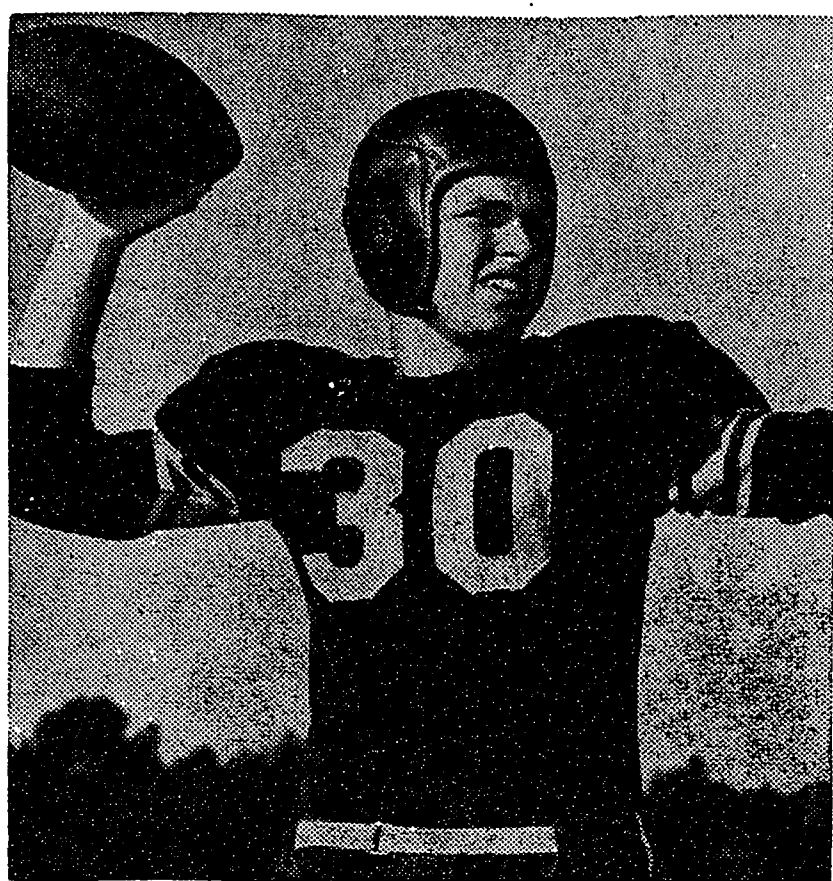
Jones Intercepts

Duke took over and after Mounie hit the line for a yard, a desperation pass was grabbed on the Duke 33 by Bob Jones who behind some good blocking went all the way for the last score of the afternoon.

The defeat knocked the Blue Devils out of contention in the race for Southern Conference championship and left the Big Four without a team with less than two defeats on its record.

N. C. STATE CLUB SEEKS TO UPSET WAKE FOREST

Stutts Expected To Miss Wolfpack Test Tomorrow

Tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock the surging Deacons encounter their next to the last foe of the season when they meet the Wolfpack of N. C. State. The game will be held on State's homefield, Riddick Stadium, before an estimated crowd of 20,000 fans.

For the Deacons it will be another acid test in their current season. Although the Wolfpack cannot brag of a highly successful season, the game should live up to all the excitement of past tilts between the two Wake County schools. The game, which is for the mythical county championship, brings together two of the oldest rivals in the state. Wake Forest will enter the game as the favorite due to the great comeback they have staged in their last three games.

The Wolfpack, after dropping their first five games, have emerged victorious in their last two encounters. They defeated VPI 14-13, and Richmond 20-6. Coach Beattie Feathers hopes to have his offensive team in top shape for the game after reaching their peak last Saturday against Richmond. State has long been noted for their defensive ability but have had trouble matching an offense to accompany their defense.

Fine Guards

Up front State can boast of two of the finest guards in the conference in Watts and Musser. End Tony Romanowsky and Center Hal Saunders have also been outstanding in the line play for the Pack.

In the backfield Feathers has three great runners in Paul Dinan, Ed Mooney, and Jim O'Rourke. Mooney was the offensive plug last season and turned in his best performance of the year against the Spiders. Dinan may miss the game because of a recent injury.

Stutts Out

Bobby Stutts, the Deacons' classy fullback and quick kick specialist, is the only question mark in the Baptist lineup. Stutts is still nursing a knee injury and may not see action. Coach Walker is expected to start the same offensive and defensive teams that trounced Duke's Blue Devils 27-7.

The game will end the Big Four activities for both teams. State opened their season with a 14-0 loss to Carolina and then dropped the Duke game by the margin of an extra point, 14-13. The Baptists were defeated by Carolina 28-14, and won over Duke last Saturday.

If the Deacons take the measure of State they may have an outside chance of tying either Carolina or Maryland for the Conference crown. Wake Forest is idle after the State game until they travel to Columbia after Thanksgiving for the season finale with the Gamecocks.

Earlier this season injuries to the Deacons' key tackles Bill George and Tom Palmer forced Coach D. C. Walker to dip deep into the reserves to find a competent linesman to replace them. He came up with a player who had played considerable football last season, but hadn't been thought of as one of the starters this season. That reserve was George Sniscak and George has carried on the fine tradition of Wake linemen such as the injured stalwarts had provided.

Sniscak is another of Coach Walker's imports from the "Keystone" state, Pennsylvania. Tipping the scales at 235 pounds, George is second heaviest man on the entire squad, although he is still a growing boy and is only 21 years old.

During his high school days at Lansford High School in Lansford, Pennsylvania, Sniscak lettered in football, basketball, and track being selected to lead the football and track teams his senior year.

A Walker Find

Coach Walker, himself, sought this huge tackle and brought him South to Deaconland. Sniscak had offers to Pitt, Syracuse and Villanova, among others, but declined all to come to Baptist Hollow.

Since arriving at Wake Forest, George has not only been of the most dependable linemen but one of Coach Phil Utley's track stars as well. Sniscak is a field events man specializing in putting the shot, and in this event, he gained points consistently for the thin clads last season.

It became apparent in last spring's football practice that Sniscak would become one of the Deacs leading linemen after he gained more experience in college ball. He quickly picked up the additional pointers offered by veteran pro-linemen, Pat Preston, and before the eight weeks were over, he was one of the roughest of Coach Rogers tackles.

When Southern Methodist beat the Deacons at Dallas and knocked out the starting tackles, Sniscak moved right into the lineup and played almost 60 minutes of the next several games, being one of the few tackles available.

Education Major

George is majoring in Education and minoring in Physical Education. With this preparation he will be able to teach and coach if a professional offer is not forthcoming. He definitely would like to join the "play-for-pay" boys for a couple of seasons after graduation, however.

The Demon Deacs are the only team who can answer the age old question of "Who is better, Doak Walker or Charlie Justice?" and Sniscak is another voter for Walker. He feels Walker's all-around play is superior to the Carolina Choo-Choo.

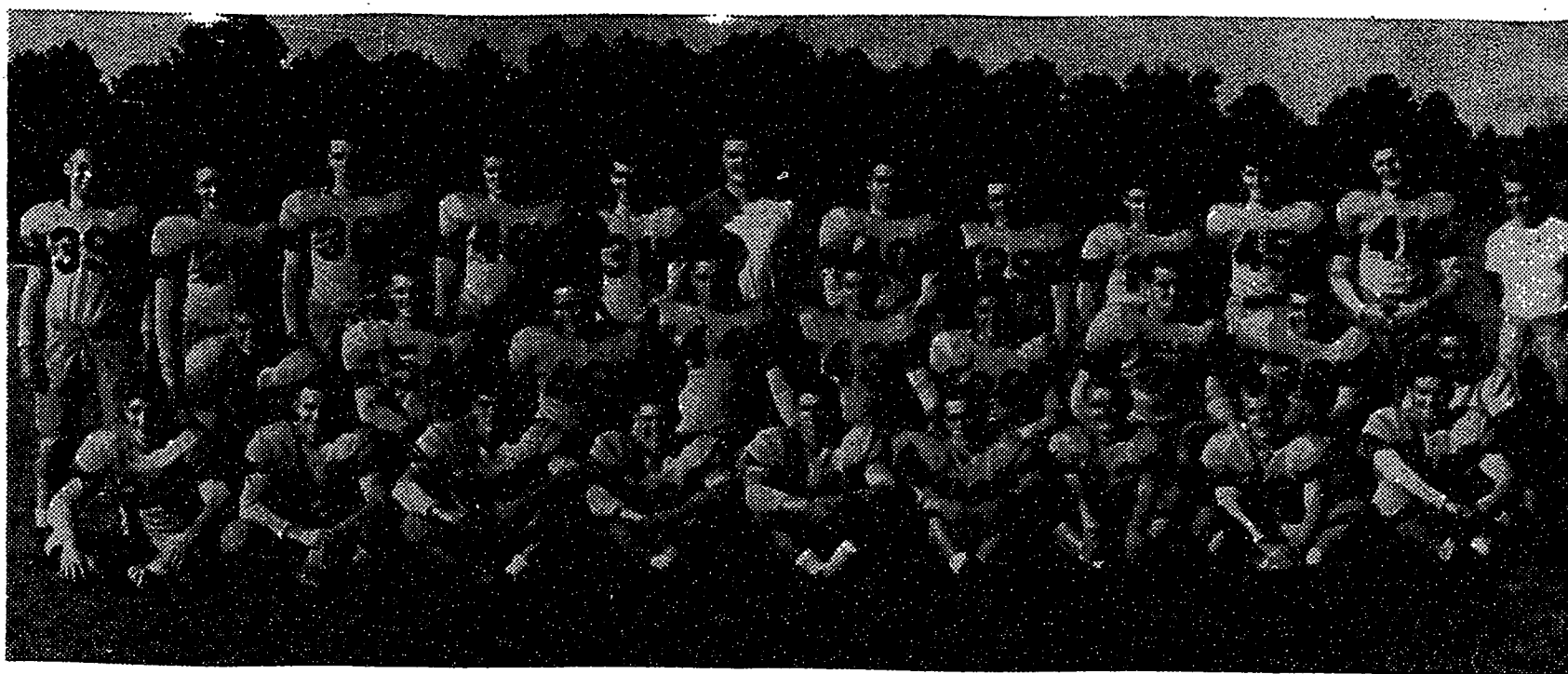

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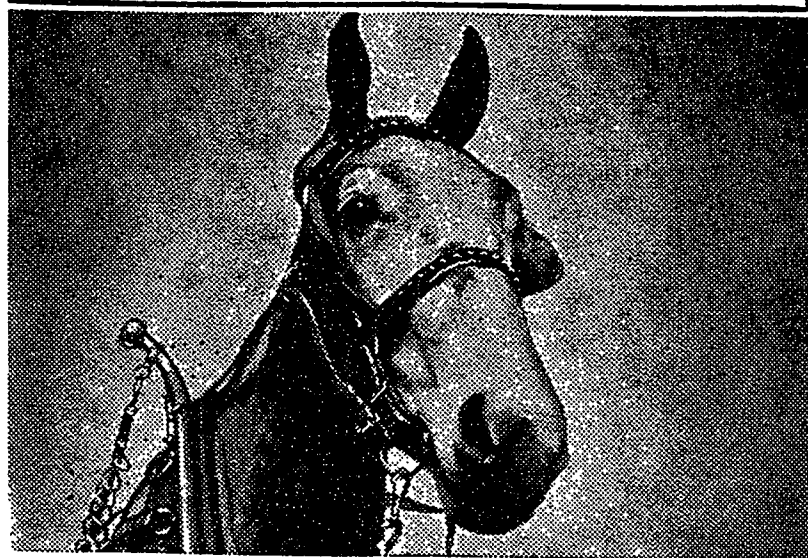

Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington, D. C. The session theme for Wednesday morning, November 16 will be "Meeting the Needs in North Carolina" and highlighting this session will be the report of the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness.

Wednesday afternoon the session will be held on the Wake Forest Campus and the theme then will be "Christian Education." The principal address of the afternoon will be given by Dr. Theodore F. Adams on the subject "Christian Education." After Dr. Adams' address the dedication of the Wake Forest College Chapel will take place, and the keys of the chapel will be turned over to Dr. Kitchin. It will be during this session that the Wake Forest A Cappella Choir will render two musical selections, "Now Thank We all Our God" and "The Lord's Prayer" by Malotte. At 3:20 p.m. Dr. C. C. Warren of Charlotte, will present the report of the Council on Christian Education and the Colleges, which will present the denominational phase of Christian Education in our colleges. At 3:50 Judge Hubert E. Olive, Chair-

man of the Wake Forest College Board of Trustees will speak on the Wake Forest Enlargement Program and the program which the trustees have planned for raising the \$16,000,000 necessary to make the move to Winston-Salem. After Judge Olive's report a general discussion and question period will follow until the session is adjourned at 4:30 p.m.

The Wednesday evening session will be highlighted by addresses by Arnold T. Ohrn, executive secretary of the Baptist World Alliance with headquarters in Washington, D. C., and by M. T. Rankin, who will speak on the subject, "The Worldwide Witness of Baptists." Dr. Rankin is executive Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Convention will close Thursday morning with the principal address being given by Dr. Walter Judd, at present Congressman from Arkansas and former missionary to China.

program will be interspersed with fight songs and lusty cheers.

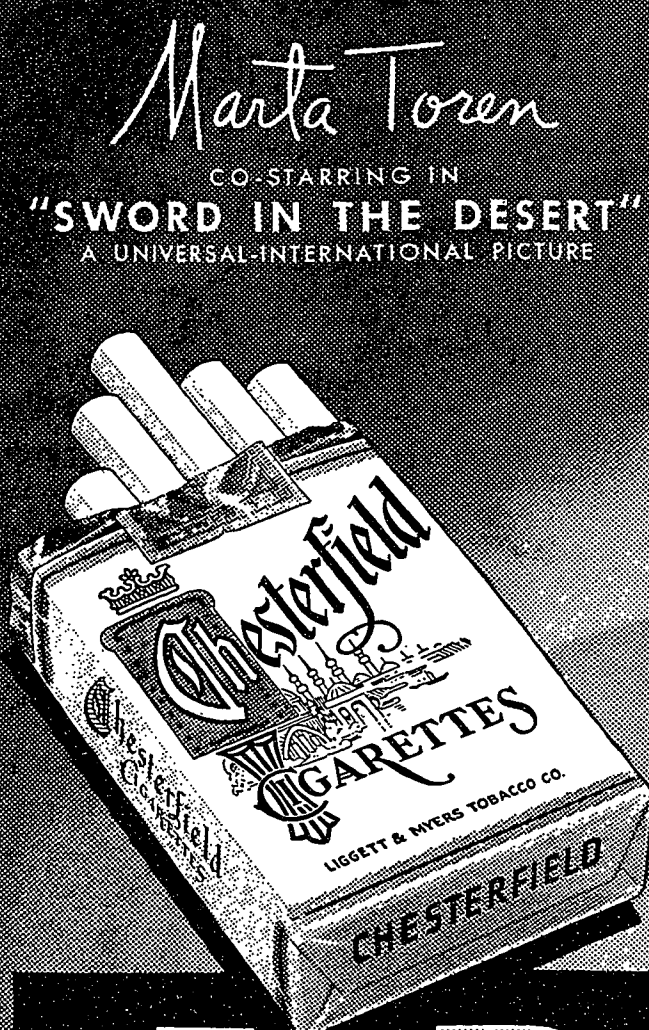
