Antioch Baptists Burn Note At Dedication Of New Church

The Antioch Baptist Church in the Iron Duff community had a special noteburning service recently to dedicate the church. The Rev. Claude Conard, Baptist director of missions, was special guest at the service and the Rev. E. S. Morgan delivered the sermon.

When construction began on the new building in April, 1979, around \$100,000 was in the building fund treasury. On Sept. 21, 1979, the church borrowed \$50,000 at an interest

rate of 9% for 10 years to complete the construction. Hardly four years later, on Aug. 8, 1983, the debt was paid in full, with dedication services set for the end of October.

The church was organized in 1875 by a group of 20 people who met in a log building known as the Crawford School, which stood just below where the present building now stands. The first pastor of the church was W. H. Conner who served for two years.

In 1887, church construction began on one acre of land

which was given by J. M. Crawford. Men of the community hauled logs from Cove Creek and built the church. Two years later in 1889, dedication services were held.

During the early 1900's, offerings ranged from \$7 to \$12, sometimes reaching \$20 per Sunday. The largest individual offering was \$2 and the pastor was given whatever was received in special offering, which at times was no more than \$3.50, according to church records.

By 1920, membership had grown to 38. Around 34 pastors have served the church over the years. Some of the more familiar names are Rev. Doug Davis, better known as "Uncle Doug," who served a total of 33 years nonconsecutively, Yoder Davis, E. R. Treadway, Forest Ferguson, Tom Erwin, Lucius Rogers, Bale Rogers, Jarvis Underwood, Clarence Taylor, Frank Early, Gaye Chambers, M. H. Raby, and Jarvis Teague.

The Rev. Teague first served at Antioch in 1942. He was

elected on June 14 and filled his first appointment Aug. 16, 1942. At the end of one year, he left the church to enter seminary at Southern Baptist Seminary in Louisville, Kent. Again in April 1963, he became the pastor and has served in this capacity since.

Many improvements have been made since Antioch was organized. In the early 1950's, the auditorium was renovated and brick was added to the weatherboarded structure which was graced by stained glass windows. To finance this remodeling job, the sum of \$800 was borrowed and was paid in full December, 1953.

Land was purchased from Grover Hogan and an educational building was added in 1963-1964. Again in 1967, the church purchased property

from Hogan, which was used for enlarging the church cemetery and parking area. The church driveway and parking lot were first paved in 1969, but three years later, the driveway was changed, making entrance to the church more accessible.

On May 29, 1970, the church note was burned for the indebtedness on the educational building.

Special services were held to celebrate the church's 100th anniversary on August 20-24, 1975. Those taking part in this celebration were: Rev. M. H. Raby, Rev. Frank Early, Rev. Arlin Freshour, Rev. Gaye Chambers, and Glenn Brown. Homecoming on Sunday closed the services.

In July, 1976, the church voted to allow the Young

Men's Class to build a picnic shelter which served a very special purpose during the building of the present structure. When weather permitted, the morning worship services were held under the shelter. At other times, the members met in two classrooms which were divided by a folding curtain. Children's church was held at 10 a.m. and Sunday school at 11 a.m., alternating with the adults to give room for all members to participate in both services. The picnic shelter is also used quite frequently for many church and community activities.

Plans were beginning to be made for a new church auditorium. On July 3, 1977, members voted to accept floor plans drawn up by architect,

Robert H. Moody, and on Aug. 20, 1978, members voted to start construction on a new sanctuary.

The last church service held in the old auditorium was on March 4, 1979. The following week, men of the church began tearing down the structure. By April 1, grounds were made ready for Don Crawford and his employees to start construction.

By August the auditorium was enclosed enough to have homecoming.

Almost one year later, on March 9, 1980, the new church was complete and the first service was held. May 17, 1981, a joint dedication and baptismal service for 17 candidates was held. Lunch in the new fellowship hall followed.

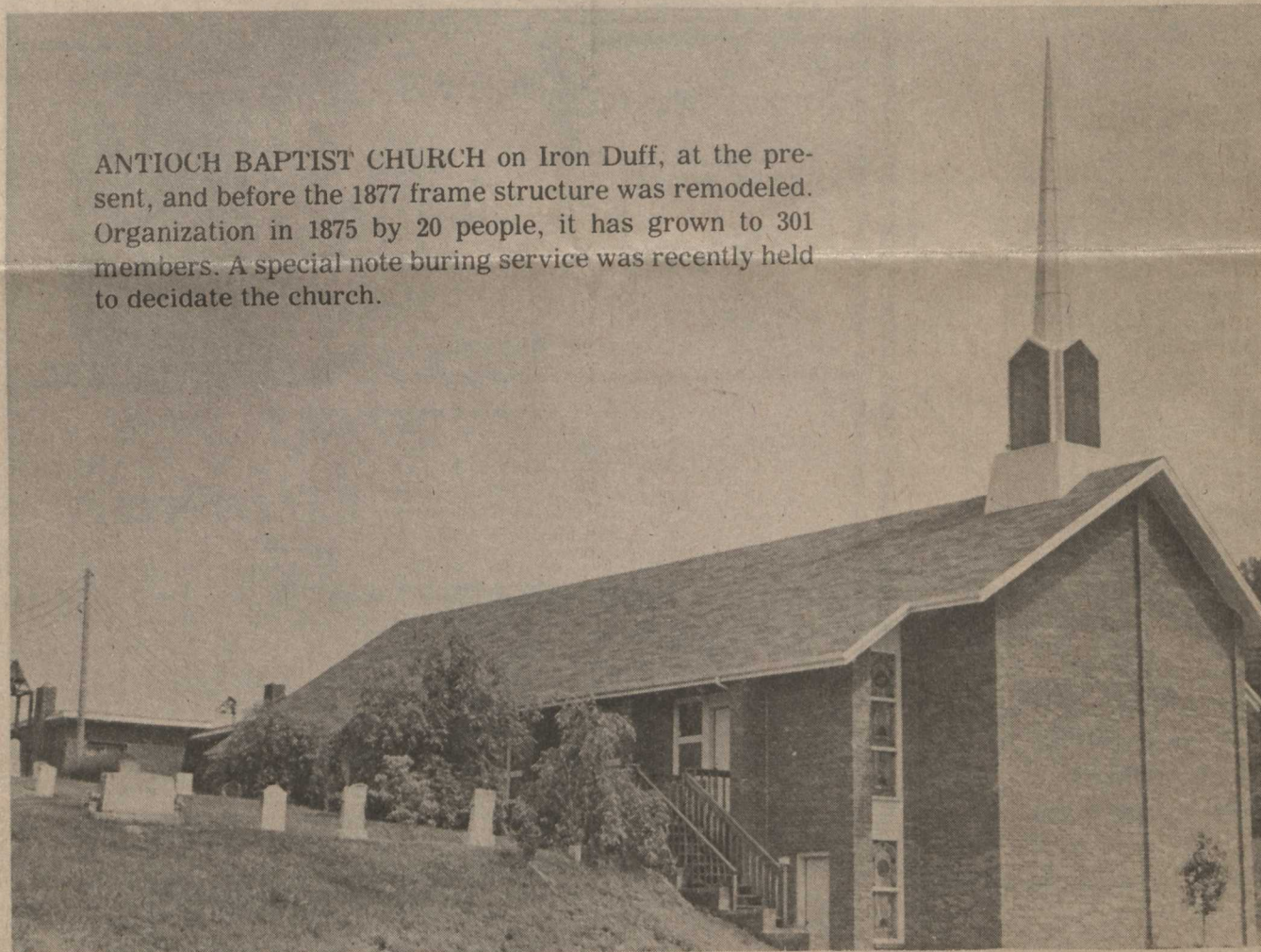
Many gifts have been received by Antioch Baptist Church. Libby Fisher Etherton established a library in memory of her mother, Myrtle McCracken Fisher, who attended church there as a young girl. Mrs. Etherton has continued giving books over the years.

The church grounds were beautified when the landscaping was contributed by Doyle Justice, one of the church members.

The most recent gift was given by the late Gussie Medford and her nephew, Robert Burress. Proceeds from the sale of the trailer owned by Mrs. Medford, and a thousand dollar gift by Mr. Burress will be used to start a youth program at the church.

Not only has the church been the recipients of gifts, but they have honored the Rev. Teague with some during his pastorate. A trip to the Holy Land was given on his tenth anniversary. An automobile was given to him in 1981, and on May 22, 1983, the congregation honored the Rev. Teague with a "This is Your Life" program and presented him with a clock and a gift of money for a vacation of his choice. This marked his twentieth year as pastor of the church.

Progress has been made at Antioch Baptist Church over 108 years. It has grown from a membership of 20 to 301.

291 Blaze demolishes Antioch sanctuary

Members of Antioch Baptist Church in Iron Duff today are searching through the building for belongings that may have survived the Sunday morning fire that destroyed the 12-year-old church sanctuary.

The cause of the fire was still under investigation Monday morning. Randy Fugate, Haywood County assistant fire marshal, said when firefighters arrived at the church at 12:45 a.m., the blaze was so hot that a crew sent into the church basement was forced back outside.

Fugate said 40,000 gallons of water were needed to douse the flames because the building is so large and because high ceilings made the fire difficult to control. It took seven local fire departments, 95 firefighters, seven Haywood County Rescue Squad members and several deputies three hours to get the fire under control.

Haywood County Sheriff Tom Alexander said his department is also looking into what caused the fire.

"Right now, there are no signs of any kind of foul play," Alexander said this morning.

The church's 250-member congregation won't give up because of the fire, the Rev. Joe Medford said this morning. Antioch's congregation will meet at the Haywood Baptist Center on Paragon Highway beginning Wednesday at 7 p.m.

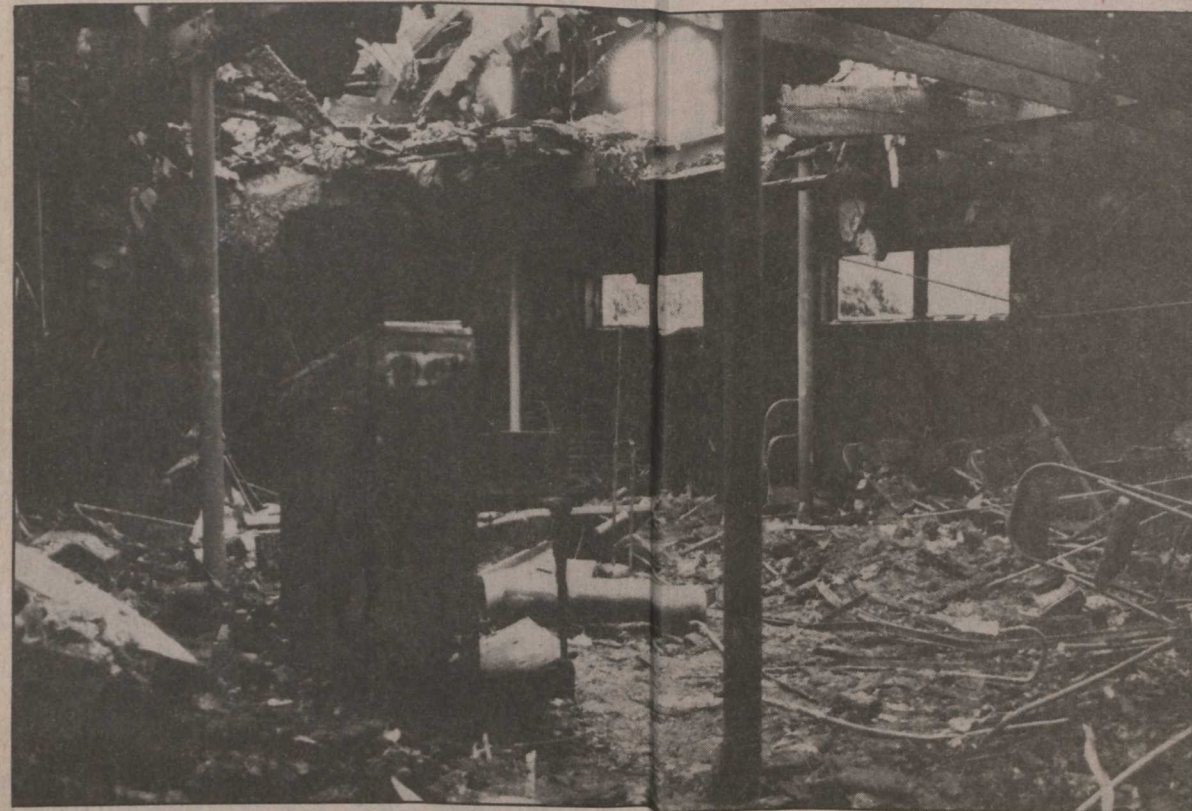
Medford said the church will meet there until the church's education building, which suffered only smoke and heat damage, can be repaired to hold the congregation.

Medford said although losing the church sanctuary is traumatic, Antioch members are already moving toward recovery.

"Yesterday afternoon, I was there, and there was a large group of our teenagers crying and hanging onto each other," Medford said.

"After they had a good cry, I saw them going in (to undamaged areas) busying themselves and getting out things that were not damaged. It was a good, constructive attitude and a good way to respond to it — after we all cried, we got together

and started to rebuild. That's the spirit of this church."

Several old pictures and artifacts from Antioch's 216-year history were saved from the flames, Medford said. However, the church's organ was destroyed.

Insurance adjusters are scheduled to see the church Tuesday, and Medford said he thinks about half of the fire damage will be covered under the church's insurance.

Church member Bruce Crawford, who is Haywood County's building inspector and who

helped build the church, went to the church site when he heard the building was on fire.

"By the time I got there, the fire had broken through the roof," Crawford said.

"The smoke was so bad you just couldn't see. I don't see how the firefighters could stand it.

I'm really thankful to them for saving what they did."

This morning, Haywood County Fire Marshal Nolan Palmer referred questions about the fire to Fugate.

"I'd rather you talk to him," Palmer said. "He was in charge of that operation."

The roof of Antioch's sanctuary caved in when the building burned. Fire officials said high ceilings make fighting a church fire more difficult.

Investigators still uncertain of cause of blaze at church

"The building is gone, but the church is still here."

Those words, posted on a lighted Antioch Baptist Church sign in Iron Duff that burned earlier this week, symbolize the spirit of the church's congregation, the Rev. Joe Medford said this morning.

Investigators still aren't sure what caused the early morning fire. Bill Matthews, State Bureau of Investigation western district field supervisor, said the SBI is still looking at several possible causes for the fire.

Matthews said the SBI believes the fire started in the church sanctuary, and are looking closely at light fixtures and the area where the church organ once was located.

However, he said the cause may never be determined because of the extent of damage.

Matthews said arson has not been ruled out.

Although damage to the church is more extensive than first estimated, Medford said members are trying to keep a positive attitude. The congregation is meeting temporarily in the Haywood County Baptist Center.

"We had a splendid group on Wednesday night," Medford said. "Also, we have some wo-

men who have taken some dishes from the church kitchen and are scrubbing them clean. We think we'll be able to save some of those."

The congregation thought it would also be able to salvage chairs and some tables from the church's education building, but even after being cleaned, those items still smell strongly of smoke, he said. Church members will try again to scrub the smell from the furnishings, he said.

Medford said church members had at first thought the education building damage slight, but now it appears that, too, will need extensive renovation.

"The ceiling will have to be removed, and the insulation is heavily damaged," Medford said. "It looks like it will be a major job just to repair that. Even some of the electrical switches on the walls, ones that are plastic, have melted."

Medford said county fire chiefs told him they believe the fire may have started because of a short in the church organ.

Meanwhile, the church was visited by insurance adjusters this week, who took pictures and asked questions about the fire.

Medford said he doesn't know yet if the church will get the entire \$260,000 of the policy.

Rebuilt church robbed

Equipment taken from sanctuary

Just as it was beginning to get back on its feet after a fire destroyed it a year ago, the Antioch Baptist Church suffered another blow this week.

Thieves broke into the not-yet-opened sanctuary Tuesday morning and stole several thousand dollars worth of sound equipment.

The church all but burned to the ground last April after a blaze gutted the 12-year-old sanctuary. About all that was left standing was the church's fellowship hall, where the 250-member congregation has continued to gather.

"We just about had the new sanctuary ready," said Wilma Crawford, the church secretary. "It just needed the pews."

Crawford said church members had passed by the sanctuary in Iron Duff around 7:45 a.m. Tuesday and found the building secure. Then, when they stopped by only an hour or so later, the church had been broken into, she said.

"We had just got a good stereo system, and they got it," Crawford said.

The Rev. Joe Medford, pastor at the church, said three doors had been tampered with, and the locks had been forced with a hammer and screwdriver.

A sound board, a camcorder and tripod were taken, said Medford, who estimated the loss at more than \$6,000.

Crawford said the thieves also took the boxes the equipment

came in, and believes the crooks may try to sell the stolen goods.

"(Officers) seem to think it must have been more than one person," he said. "The sound-board alone weighs about 70 pounds."

Medford said the church also had been broken into a few months ago. Law enforcement officers found a broken window in one of the Sunday school rooms. Nothing was taken in that

incident, however.

"They think someone probably just needed a place to stay and came in to spend the night," Medford said.

The church is only a few feet from Interstate 40, which may be one of the reasons why the church has been a prime target lately.

"We're in the process of putting in a burglary alarm system," Medford said. "Electronic 'eyes' will spot any movement in the church and will set off an alarm."

But installing such a system takes time, Medford said, and it

isn't completely in place, yet.

"I guess they're going to work now with greater zeal to get it completed," he said.

Medford said he hopes a new insurance policy that the church upgraded only a few months ago will cover the latest losses. If not, he said, they will simply have to find a way to replace the stolen equipment.

"It's just another one of those things," he said. "We're going to have to deal with it."

The incident is under investigation with the Haywood County Sheriff's Department.

Burn victim returns to joyful church home

Iron Duff man's survival described as a miracle

Burn victim Ray Milner wanted to go to church on Easter Sunday. He made it, despite the explosion and fire that almost claimed his life two months earlier.

Milner was seriously injured at his Coleman Mountain Road home in February when a propane gas heater exploded in his face.

Against the odds, Milner survived and attended his church service on Easter. He is scheduled to go home from Thoms Rehabilitation Hospital today.

Easter Sunday proved an emotional time for parishioners of Antioch Baptist Church, who describe Milner as a giving person.

Milner, 73, suffered burns on his neck, face, arms and upper thighs in the accident. The explosion went up a stairway, also injuring Milner's wife, Edith. Ray Milner was immediately transferred to the burn unit at Bowman Gray Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem.

Doctors at Bowman Gray told family members they didn't expect Milner to make it through the night.

"I'm a miracle, there's no doubt about it ... I should not be here," Milner said.

His story is about faith and about relatives and neighbors who rallied around the family in their time of need by repairing the house, starting prayer chains, and going to Winston-Salem to help the family.

The fire

Milner was in his basement, working on the tank, when it exploded. The explosion sealed the doors shut, in effect locking its victim inside. Milner escaped by breaking open a small window in the basement and pulling himself out, said Regina Haynes, one of Milner's daughters.

The fire went up the stairs and destroyed most of the first floor of their home. Edith Milner was

able to escape through a side door. The heat from the flames had melted the phone, and Edith left the scene to call 911.

Despite his injuries, Milner had the foresight to get into the cars and move them away from the house, Haynes said.

Milner's response was a part of the "fight or flight" reaction. During this reaction, the body's senses are sharpened, the person is able to think with unusual clarity, and adrenaline sometimes supplies super-human strength, said Priscilla Raasch-Mason, one of Milner's physical therapists at Thoms Hospital.

"When he was moving (around) he did not realize how bad he was," said Art Lynch, another physical therapist at Thoms.

Milner was brought into the burn center with 45 percent of his body burned. To further complicate things, he contracted pneumonia and infections, he said.

Despite the problems, Milner pulled through.

After leaving Bowman Gray, Milner came to Thoms Hospital in April. His room was decorated with coloring book pictures from grandchildren and photos of his beloved dog and cows. Though Milner said he is feeling well, he still cannot feed himself due to limited use of his arms and hands.

He sings the praises of neighbors who rallied behind them during this tough time, and especially for those who prayed.

"We don't have the words to express our appreciation for all the prayers that have been

offered up," he said.

The support

Hours after the accident, community members were already repairing the house and praying. The community volunteerism enabled the Milners to replace the damaged first floor of their home.

When Milner was being taken to Haywood County Hospital and then to Bowman Gray, he was unconscious most of the time. But there was one thing Milner was aware of. When the ambulance pulled away, he saw about 35 people on his front lawn having prayer.

"I'll tell you how the Lord works," he said. "The Lord woke me up to where I could see them praying."

Giving back

Neighbors say they were simply giving something back to a man who has given so much to his church and community.

"There's not words to describe him, he's such a wonderful person," said resident Floyd Frisbee. "He prefers to help someone else rather than help himself ... he drops what he's doing and comes to help. The young people at church think there's no one like Ray Milner. He's been like a dad to me. He's a fighter, and if anyone can pull through, he can. He trusts in the Lord, that's what pulled him through."

"He's probably the kindest-hearted person I've ever met," said Sandra Wood, also a member of Antioch. "I think it's still something that shook us up. It made us aware of what he means to us. It's like a miracle to see him again."

The fire and Milner's injuries deeply distressed the community.

"Everybody was heartbroken. They walked around in disbelief. You could not speak his name without starting crying," Frisbee said. "Ray Milner always said one thing: 'It doesn't matter how bad it is, everything will be all right.' That's the faith he has."

Immediately after the accident, members of the community started a massive prayer chain. Local churches were asked to pray. Milner's friends from out of state were called and asked to pray.

"The whole U.S. was praying for him. If there's a God, God answers prayers, and I'm sure there is a God," Frisbee said.

The Easter Sunday that Milner returned to church was an inspirational and tearful time.

"I thought it was amazing how he had recovered," Frisbee said. "It's his willpower, faith and the prayers. It's a walking miracle to see him."

Milner has served as a deacon at Antioch Baptist Church for 25 years and was chairman of the benevolence committee.

"Just about anything that goes on in this church, he was involved with it," said the Rev. Steve Taylor. "Doctors talk about that

miracle child ... in all actuality, he shouldn't be here."

"There's only one route to go, and that's with the Lord. If you turn loose of the Lord, you've lost it all," Milner said. "As long as they have faith in God, they come out victorious. He never fails. He'll stay with you as long as you hold to him."

"Thanks ten thousand times for all those who prayed for me. Although I was badly wounded, I knew they were praying for me ... thanks to all the people who came and worked on my home, who fed my cows, looked after my dog."

"That's the kind of neighbors we've got. There's no way we can repay them."

Old Antioch Church Plans Last Services

Special services, the last ones to be conducted in the present sanctuary of Antioch Baptist Church in Iron Duff, will be held March 4. Plans have been made to start construction on a new auditorium in April.

Antioch Baptist Church was organized in 1875 by a group of 20 people who met in a log building known as the Crawford School, just below where the present building now stands. The church was given the Biblical name, Antioch, by the Rev. W.H. Conner, who served as the first pastor.

In 1887 construction began on the present auditorium on property given by James M. Crawford. Dedication services

were held in 1889.

Several improvements have been made over the years with a remodeling job in the early 1950s and an educational building added in 1963-64.

The present enrollment has grown from a membership of 20 to 219.

The Rev. Jarvis Teague, pastor of the church, invites all former members and residents to attend this service.

If you use raspberry preserves as a filling for jellyroll cake, you may want to force the preserves through a fine-mesh strainer, to remove the seeds, before spreading on the cake.
