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TIMBERLAKE, EDWIN WALTER (4 July 1854-2 Jan. 1933), lawyer and judge, was born in Franklin County, N. C., son of R. H. and Mary A. Harris Timberlake. His father was a country doctor and young Edwin traveled around with his father and learned first-hand the poverty and hardships of his area. His family moved to the town of Wake Forest and Timberlake entered college. He was graduated by Wake Forest College in 1873. He attended the law school of the University of Virginia in Charlottesville and was graduated in 1876.

He began to practice law in Louisburg, N. C. in 1877. He was a member of the Republican Party. The Democrat Party was in a majority from 1872 to 1894 in the state and this closed the avenue of judicial advancement to Republican lawyers but in 1894, the Populists Party fused with the Republicans and became the majority party. On this occasion Timberlake was nominated by his friends as Superior Court judge of his district. He served eight years from January 1, 1895 to January 1, 1903. During this time he made numerous acquaintances over the state. In 1904 he moved his family back to Wake Forest, N. C. where he lived until his death.

Timberlake was a Baptist and a member of the Odd Fellows and the Masonic order. He served as chairman of the Wake county, N. C. Draft Board in 1917 and 1918. He was a member of the Wake Forest College Board of Trustees from 1896 until his death.

Timberlake married Ada Lee Simmons, daughter of professor William Gaston and Mary Foote Simmons, on May 27, 1879. They had three children, Mary Lee, Mrs. Phil M. Utley, and Edward Walter Timberlake.

Judge Timberlake died at his home in Wake Forest, N. C. His funeral services were conducted by Drs. Willis Richard Cullom and J. W. Lynch at the Wake Forest Baptist Church. He was buried in the cemetery at Wake Forest.

Edward Walter Timberlake, now a resident of Wake County, was born in the County of Franklin on the 4th of July, 1854.

The Timberlakes have for many years been well known citizens of their community, and Robert H. Timberlake, the father of the subject of this sketch was a physician and esteemed particularly for the kindness of his disposition and his charitable acts, while to his professional knowledge and training he added in a high degree that common sense which underlies successful management of affairs in every line of work. He lived on his farm whose operations he conducted with intelligence and skill, and there he practiced his profession and by his course in life impressed himself upon his community.

In the political divisions that were incident to the changes made by the result of the war, Dr. Timberlake sympathized with the Republican Party and affiliated with Col. Hawkins and some other leading men of Franklin County in his political action. His abilities, capacity and character led to his being chosen Clerk of the Superior Court of Franklin County, and he discharged the duties of that office with acceptability for a period of years. He married Miss Mary A. Harris, who became the mother of the subject of this sketch.

In his early youth, Judge Timberlake was delicate, but as his home was in the country, the exercise which he naturally took on the farm and in the pastimes and sports of country life, tended to invigorate his frail constitution, and as he approached manhood he became more robust. He attended the country schools of his vicinity, and then became a student at Wake Forest College, graduating there in 1873. Inheriting intellectual gifts from both his father and mother, with a bright mind and of an unusually studious disposition, he had an

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progress. The custom in North Carolina of electing the Superior Court Judges ^{by vote of the} of the State at large and the fact that from 1872 to 1894, the Democratic Party always had a majority in the State, during that period, closed the avenues of judicial preferment to Republican lawyers; but in 1794 the Populist Party having sprung up and in that year having established fusion with the Republican Party, the Democrats fell into a minority. On that occasion Judge Timberlake was nominated by his Party friends as Superior Court Judge of his District and was elected to that office for a term of eight years.

His practice had been largely confined to his own County and he was but little known throughout the State, and he entered upon the discharge of his high and important duties almost a stranger to the people where he held his Courts. There was some misgiving as to his administration of the law, for he was so unpretentious that at first his capabilities were not immediately realized. But it was not long before as a man and a Judge he became fully appreciated. As an illustration, we make an extract from a newspaper comment: "Some excellent Judges have presided in our Courts in years past, but it is safe to say that no man ever held Court here who gave as universal satisfaction as Judge Timberlake, both to people and lawyers as well. Not only is he regarded as a good Judge of Law, but he is extremely fair, courteous and pleasant, and has a way of expediting business that is approved by everybody, doing it in such a way as to create no friction or unpleasantness."

Among his characteristics on the bench, was the same quiet, ~~and~~ gentlemanly carriage that ~~marked~~ marked him in daily life, , and he possessed the faculty of bringing cases to trial and disposing of the business of the Court in an easy way , without irritation to the suitors and attorneys who often desired to prolong the litigation. The Greensboro Record contained the following item: "The two weeks' special

inclination for a professional career, and Dr. Timberlake being in easy circumstances, he attended the law course at the University of Virginia, where he graduated in 1876, becoming well grounded in the law under the tutelage of the admirable professors at that famous institution. On obtaining his license, he opened his office in 1877 at Louisburg and soon received a fair share of the business of ^{his} that County.

With a pleasing address, quiet and unobtrusive in his demeanor, careful and prudent in the management of the legal business committed to his charge, he year by year gained more and more of the personal esteem of his community and won the confidence and regard of the leading men of his County.

His father being an adherent of the Republican Party, he himself became indoctrinated in the same political principles though he did not enter on a political career, preferring to devote himself strictly to his professional work.

On May 27, 1879, when he had become well established in business, Judge Timberlake married Miss Ada Lee Simmons, who bore him three children, of whom ~~two~~ ^{two} are still living.

Judge Timberlake was reared in the Baptist faith and early attached himself to that communion, and throughout his life he has been a consistent member of his Church and has long been highly esteemed by the members of his denomination for his sincerity and zealous interest in whatever appertains to the welfare of his Church.

Charitable in his disposition and of a sympathetic nature, Judge Timberlake has become a member of the Odd Fellows and of the Masonic Order, and he is also a member of the Fraternity.

Fond of reading, besides his professional ^{studies} books, Judge Timberlake has indulged his taste for general literature, while in particular he has been a student of biography, finding a particular pleasure in following the actions of the great men who have left their marks in the annals of the world's

term of Court for the trial of civil causes came to an end this afternoon. It has been well worth the expense and time for a lot of work has been done. Judge Timberlake waded right in and kept the mill grinding steadily, so that a large number of cases have been disposed of, leaving the civil docket in better shape than it has been for years.

His Honor tackled the heaviest cases with as much eagerness as the lighter ones, and so it happened that those requiring the most time came up first, so that only about three were heard the first week, but this week much better time has been made and the docket has been cleared of quite a number of old cases that have been hanging for a long time. It affords the Record pleasure to again bear testimony to the faithful, honest work of Judge Timberlake who held the term. His rulings have been fair and he has conducted the business in the quiet, dignified way that has earned for him just praise from lawyers, litigants and jury".

We are permitted to make an extract from a letter written by one of the best known Democratic lawyers of the State: "You have now finished this circuit of Fall holdings, so far as any territory in which I practice is concerned. This being so, I will not be subject to any suspicion of insincerity when I say to you some not disagreeable things. I am warranted after observing and considering you as a Judge, in saying that you are a conscientious, upright Judge, clear and accurate in your reasoning, with a rare readiness of apprehension and perception. You display a consciousness that there is always something to be learned in our most noble and useful science, and you are trustful of your brethren of recognized integrity.

All of this is very agreeable and grateful to the practitioner, and cannot fail to enhance your judicial reputation, now and in the future; of this I am much pleased, because your, to me, agreeable personality makes me concerned for your welfare and good name. I shall look for your continued growth

in fitness and usefulness on the bench. My reverence for and earnest desire for the high character and good name of the judiciary of our State are such that I do not like to withhold any word or act which might help a good Judge on his delicate and arduous way."

And so it happened that the longer Judge Timberlake remained on the bench the higher he grew in the estimation of the bar as well as of the people of the State. On the termination of the period for which he was elected, he returned to the practice of the law and located after a while at Wake Forest.

EDWARD WALTER TIMBERLAKE

By N. Y. GULLEY

Born July 4, 1854, in Franklin County. Graduated from Wake Forest College June, 1873. Student in the Law School of the University of Virginia from 1874 to 1876. Studied law in Raleigh for about six months, under the direction of the late Richard H. Battle, Esq. Licensed by the Supreme Court of North Carolina to practice law at the January Term, 1877. Married Ada Lee Simmons, daughter of Prof. W. G. Simmons and Mary Foote Simmons, on the 27th day of May, 1879.

Served as Judge of the Superior Courts from January 1, 1895, to January 1, 1903. In 1917 and 1918 he served as chairman of the Local Draft Board of Wake County. Member of Board of Trustees of Wake Forest College from 1896 until his death.

Died on the night of January 2, 1933.

This is the record stated briefly, but it is merely a skeleton, the frame work about which a life grew.

His father was Dr. R. H. Timberlake and his mother before her marriage was Mary A. Harris. At the time of his birth and during the days of his early boyhood his parents resided in Franklin County, about two miles east of where Youngsville is now located. His father was a practicing physician and was a "country doctor" in the best sense of that word. He drove in his buggy over that section and carried his medicine and relieved the sick and suffering. This was before the day of prescriptions, drug stores and hospitals. The want and poverty and hardship arising out of war was seen and felt on all sides. Frequently he took his son with him and the young boy learned first hand of the life of his neighbors. It was this that gave him the charitable view he had through his whole life as to the deeds of his fellowmen. He often said, "Nearly every one does the very best he can under the circumstances that stand around about him."

When he entered college his parents moved to Wake Forest where they spent the remainder of their lives.

Judge Timberlake, with his family, resided in Louisburg for about twenty-five years, removing from there to Wake Forest in 1904, where he spent the remainder of his life.

He was a lawyer of ability but never liked the trial of cases before the Courts. As Judge for eight years he held courts in every county in the State, and made an enviable reputation for ability, fairness, courtesy and dispatch of business. This gave him a wide acquaintance and a large number of friends in all parts of the State. In his later years it was a great source of pleasure to him to drive over to Raleigh several days in each week and meet and talk with such friends from other parts of the State as he might by chance find there.

He was much interested in the work of his church. He always attended the State convention of his denomination and took an active interest in all important subjects before it.

One of his individualistic traits was his deep friendship and devotion to certain individuals. He seemed to realize the truth of the idea expressed by Cicero in his discussion of friendship, that a man needed a friend to whom he could tell all things as to a second self. He had a number of such friends to whom he could tell all things at different periods of his life. Probably none made greater impression on his life than the late Rev. Baylus Cade. Here was a strong stimulating intellect, a bold spirit that dared think fearlessly, a man of lovely Christian character, with unbounded sympathy with all people, it is no matter of surprise that contact with him considerably modified the life of Judge Timberlake and others.

It would not be proper to close this sketch without reference to a colored man who for eleven years before his death was his servant, companion and friend, Charlie Taylor by name. Charlie was his chauffeur, attendant, care taker, agent, secretary, companion and friend. After a very brief illness death claimed Charlie on the 14th day of November, 1932. Nature

made a real man out of Charlie and his death was such a staggering blow to Judge Timberlake that he never recovered from it.

The writer first met Judge Timberlake in September, 1875, and a friendship came into existence that grew stronger as the years went by. For some years, when the weather was pleasant on Sunday afternoons we drove together over various roads in this section and talked about many things. These conversations gave me new views of his character, his appreciation of his friends, his broad charity for all and his love of God.

He is survived by his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Phil M. Utley, wife of the Director of Physical Education in Wake Forest College, and one son, E. W. Timberlake, professor in the Law School of Wake Forest College.

"If a man die, shall he live again?" or rather if a man live, shall he ever really die? Surely the ties of friendship sometimes rudely severed by the hand of death, will be knit together again in a blessed Eternity with God and Christ.

James J. Hatch, an honored member of this Association, as a result of a tragic accident, died on the morning of January 15, 1933. As one of the leaders in his profession at the time of his death, apparently he stood on the threshold of a splendid career.

He was born in Mt. Olive, Wayne County, North Carolina, on the 23rd day of April, 1889, the son of James Rhodes Hatch and Glennie Kornegay Hatch, and from these ancestors he inherited, to a marked degree, those sturdy qualities that have characterized the good citizens of that section of North Carolina. He was prepared for college in the Public Schools of Mt. Olive; and from there entered Trinity College at Durham in 1906. Leaving college in 1909 he engaged in business, being connected with the tobacco industry until 1922.

Having received a Bachelor's degree from George Washington University, having completed the practice of law
