Deacon Defense Faces Tough Test

The veer versus the veer.

That will be the situation this afternoon when two explosive teams, Wake Forest and William & Mary, battle in Groves Stadium during Homecoming festivities for the Demon Deacons.

While Wake Forest relies mainly on its running attack, William & Mary blends its running and passing game. And it has been most effective as the Indians will enter the game with a 5-3 won-lost record.

Phil Mosser, the Southern Conference Player of the Year in 1970, heads the corp of Indian running backs with 651 yards on 137 carries for a 4.8 per try average. Dennis Campal has added 379 yards on 79 carries.

But the balance of the Indian attack shows in their passing game. Quarterback Steve Regan has completed 60 of 111 attempts for 810 yards and four touchdowns. In his first start last week against North Carolina, John Gargano completed 16 of 25 passes for 283 yards and added 106 more on 18 carries.

The Deacon rushing attack has the chance to be the most productive in Wake history. Through eight games, they have collected 2,393 yards on ground, which leaves them only 103 yards shy of the school record of 2,496 yards set a year ago.

Fullback Larry Hopkins could also place his name beside another rushing record. The senior needs only 83 more yards to snap the single season rushing mark of 1,044 yards set in 1964 by the late Brian Piccolo. Hopkins is averaging over 120 yards through the Deacons' eight games with 962 yards.

The Indians will also be facing a much improved Wake Forest defense. In the last two games, the Deacons have yielded less than 200 yards in total offense and now rank second in the ACC.

It was last week against Clemson when the Deacons intercepted two passes, pushing their season total to 18 to break another school mark.

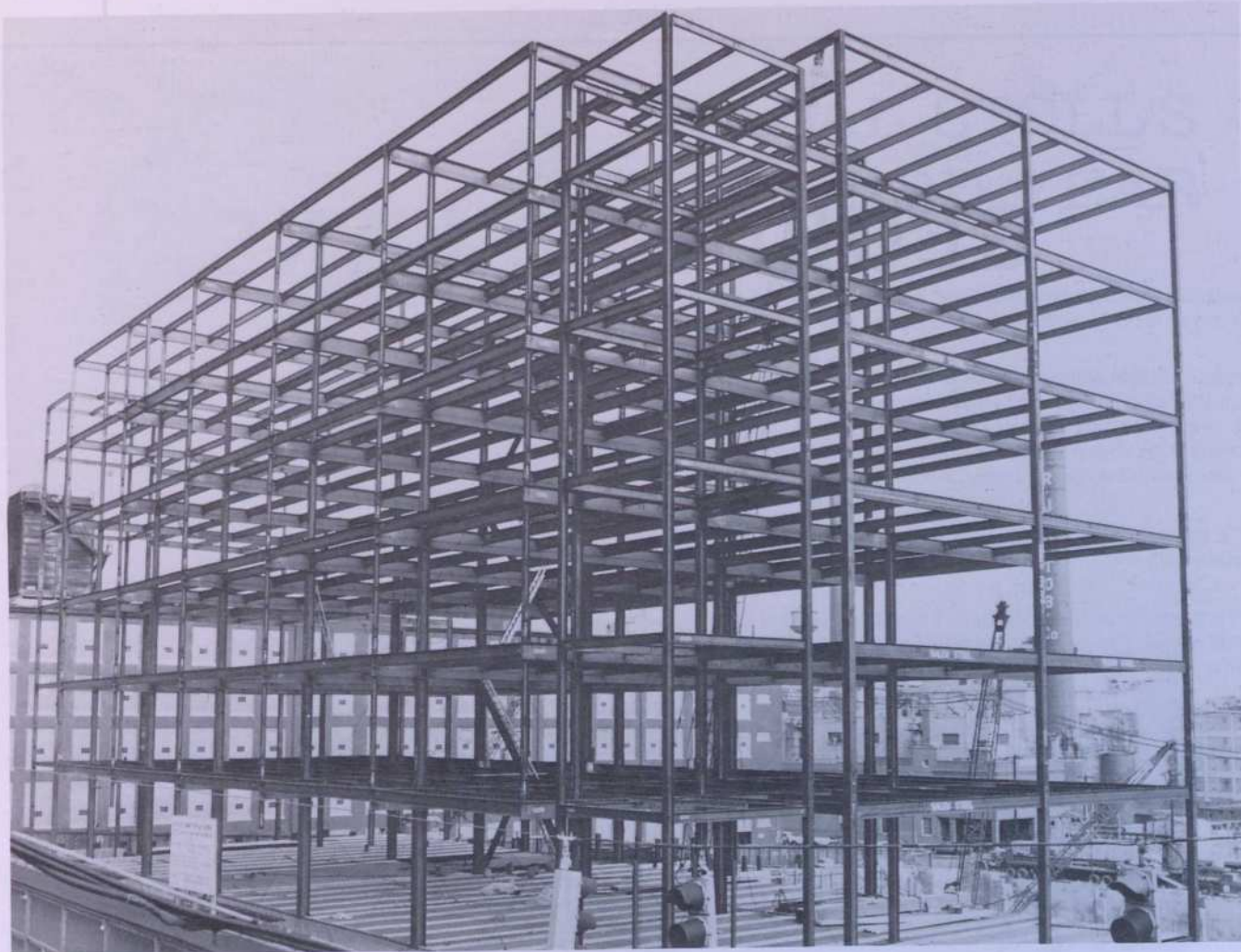
Both teams will be seeking to rebound from disappointing losses. A two-point conversion with two minutes left by North Carolina handed the Indians a heartbreaking 36-35 defeat last Saturday while a 29-yard field goal by Eddie Seigler with only 37 seconds left boosted the Clemson Tigers to a 10-9 triumph over the Deacons.

This afternoon's game marks the renewal of the Wake-William & Mary series. The last time the teams met was in 1956 when the Deacons took a 39-0 victory.

In the overall series, which started in 1921, the Indians hold a 7-6-1 advantage. The Indians' last victory came in 1954 when they captured a 13-9 triumph.

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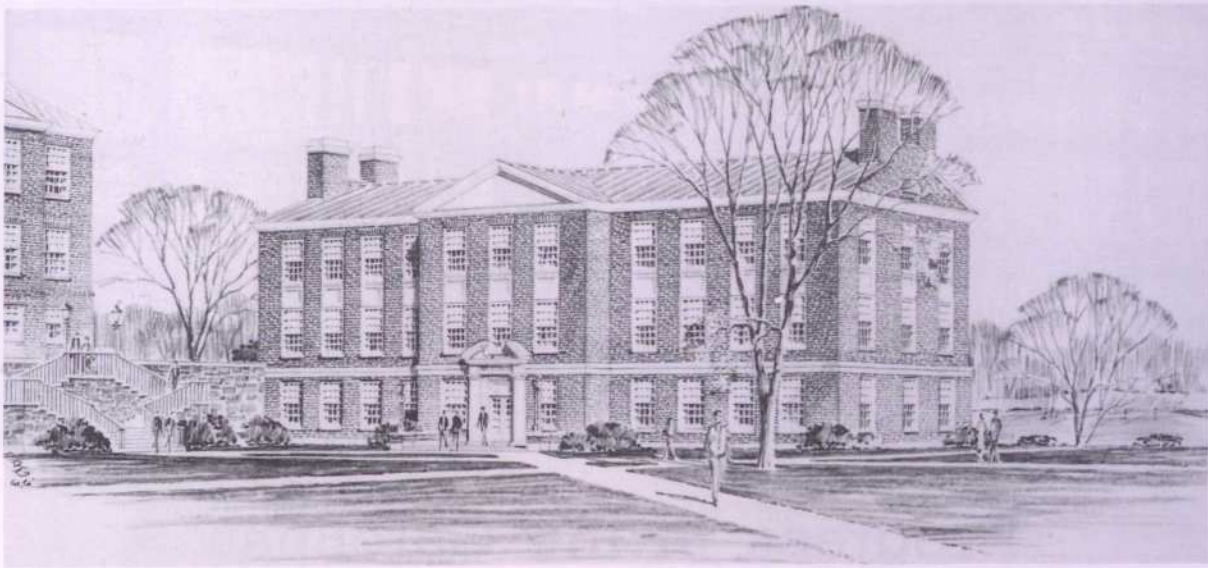

CAL STOLL'S THIRD YEAR

In only two years, Cal Stoll has produced some of the most exciting moments in the history of Wake Forest football and the most productive.

After taking over the Deacons' coaching reins in December, 1968, it took him only two years to accomplish something that had never been done in Wake Forest history — win a conference football title. In addition to last year's ACC championship, the 6-5 overall record was the first winning mark since 1959.

But more important, in two years he has replaced a losing attitude which had plagued Wake Forest for many years with one that emphasizes the winning principle.

Stoll is the 22nd Wake Forest football coach and the fourth to handle the job since the school moved to Winston-Salem in 1956. He came to the Deacons from Michigan State, where he served for ten years under Duffy Daugherty.

He is a 1950 graduate of the University of Minnesota and he launched his coaching career at Mound High School in suburban Minneapolis, where his first team won a league championship with an 8-1 record.

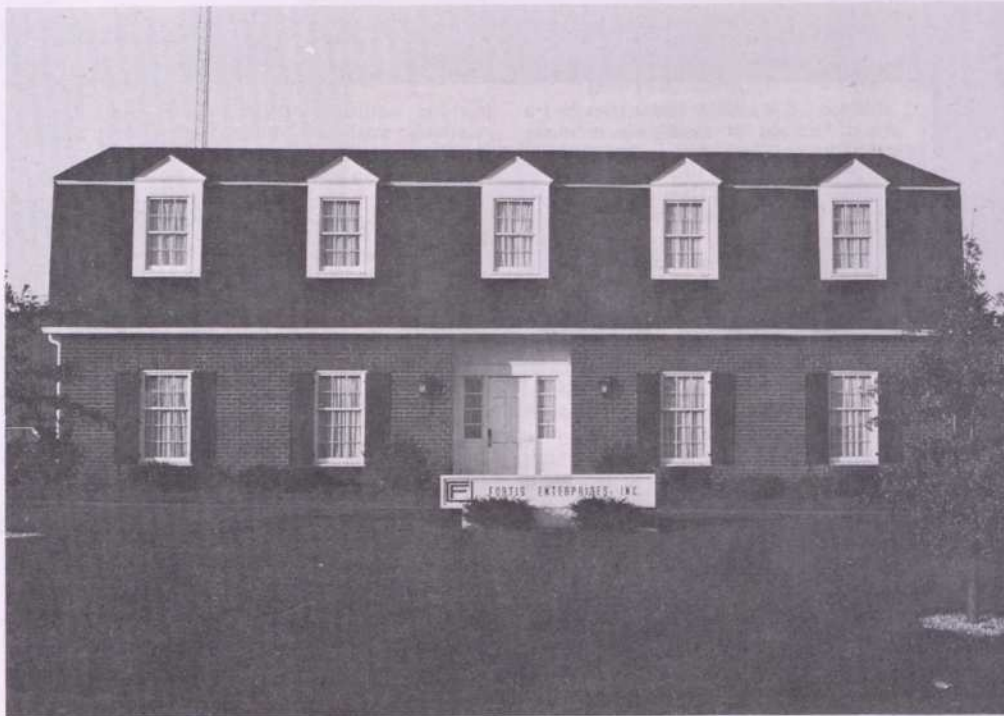
Wake Forest has established a well deserved reputation as one of the finest

We hope that you enjoy your stay at Wake Forest and will take time to acquaint yourself not only with the football program but also with the facilities of the University.





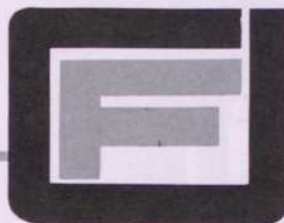
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THE FIRST CHAMPIONSHIP

... 1970 - A Title Year

If there was ever a football season that housed a treasure chest full of memories for Wake Forest, it would be the year of 1970.

Any Deacon fan can tell you that it was a year when Wake Forest landed its first football championship. But it wasn't an ordinary title. The true excitement of the success isn't told only in a championship trophy.

To start with, most of the forecasts stated that the Deacons would finish last in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Facing their most demanding schedule in history, the most victories the Deacons could hope for was two ... maybe three.

It was also only Cal Stoll's second season. Even though his first team in 1969 had won three and lost seven, there was still a feeling that something different was happening at Wake Forest. But it still wasn't enough to cause many heads to snap, much less to predict an ACC championship.

The season started true to predictions with consecutive losses to Nebraska, South Carolina and Florida State. Stoll and his small, depth-shy team, however, refused to fold.

A sudden reversal started with a victory over Virginia and then the Deacons continued to move toward the crown with

triumphs over Virginia Tech, Clemson and North Carolina.

Tennessee snapped the win streak at four, but the following week the Deacons moved into a tie for the league lead with a 28-14 victory over Duke. N. C. State tried to block the Deacons' title hopes, but a late comeback pulled out a 16-13 triumph to produce a 5-1 record against conference opponents.

Only hours before a battle with Houston, the Deacons captured the ACC crown when North Carolina defeated Duke. The season came to an end with a 26-2 loss to Houston, but the Deacons had earned the title of league champions.

What had seemed only a dream had suddenly become reality. Under Stoll, the Deacons had been resurrected as a winner and a truly remarkable year had been completed.

"No one will ever realize the mental and physical strain last year's team went through," said Stoll. "I have been associated with many teams during my career as a coach, but I have never received as much satisfaction from a team as I did last year."

Indeed, it was more than just a championship year for Wake Forest during 1970.

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Athletes

A pair of All-Americans, Win Headley of the 1970 football team, and Charlie Davis, who let the Deacons' basketball squad for three years, were named co-winners of the Arnold Palmer Award as Athlete of The Year during the 1970-71 sports year.

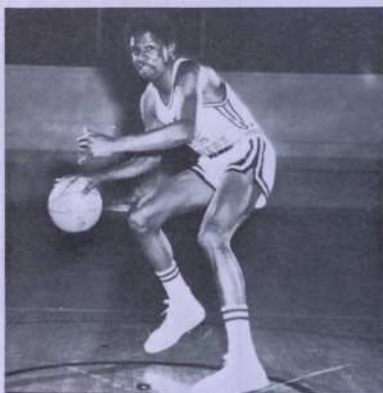
It marked the first time since 1964 when the award was started that two players have been so honored.

Headley, who was a starter for three years at defensive tackle for the Deacons, was also named to the All-ACC defensive team. He was presented the first annual Brian Piccolo Award following his performance in the Deacons' victory over North Carolina a year ago.

Following graduation, Headley, a 6-3,

245-pounder, was drafted in the eighth round by the Green Bay Packers.

Davis completed an outstanding basketball career at Wake Forest by being chosen as the ACC Basketball Player of The Year. He was also the only unanimous to the 1970-71 All-ACC team. It also marked the third time he had been selected to the all league squad.

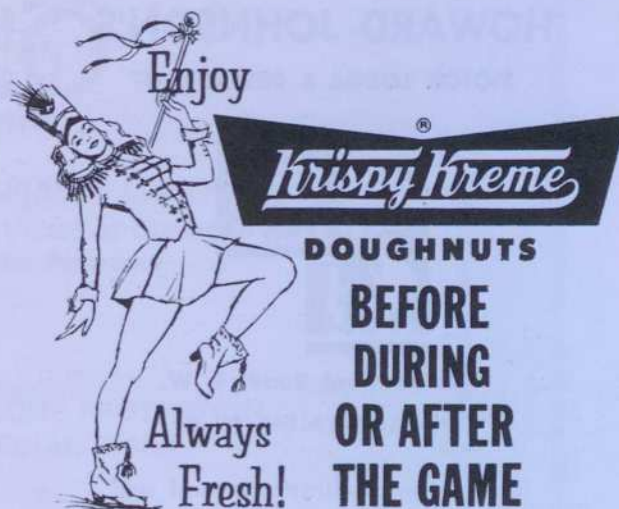
The 6-1 guard established a career scoring record by averaging 24.9 points a game during this three years on the varsity. He finished as the third leading all-time scorer with 1,970 points.

In the pro drafts, Davis was the first selection by the New York Nets of the ABA and an eighth-round selection of the Cleveland Cavaliers, with whom he signed.

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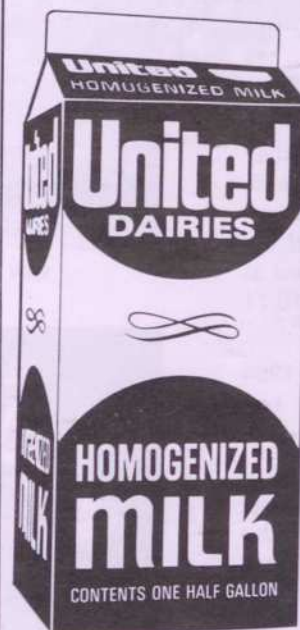

SPORTS HALL OF FAME

In order to honor former Deacon greats in the field of sports, Wake Forest established a Sports Hall of Fame last year. The first inductees were honored last season during halftime ceremonies of the homecoming game.

Murray Greason, Douglas C. (Peahead) Walker, Brian Piccolo and James H. (Jim Weaver) were honored posthumously a year ago.

Greason served as the Deacons' basketball coach for 23 years, compiling a record of 285 victories and 239 defeats. Walker was head football coach and left Wake Forest in 1950 with a record of 77 victories, 51 losses and six ties. Piccolo distinguished himself as an All-American fullback in 1964 while Weaver served as football coach and athletic director before being named ACC commissioner.

A fifth inductee will be honored this year. Arnold Palmer, the athlete of the decade during the 1960's, is the newest member.

The Hall of Fame is a most fitting tribute to these men who have added so much to the history of Wake Forest athletics.



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College Athletics Steps In To Battle Drug Scene

"Americans put out the most expensive urine in the world. It is a beautiful bright yellow urine loaded with excreted vitamins."

The speaker was Dr. Donald L. Cooper, an Olympic team physician and the team physician at Oklahoma State University, and his subject was ergogenic aids and drugs in athletics—a speech that he has now delivered to many of the nation's coaches, athletic associations and other interested groups.

As part of the NCAA's Drug Education Program, Cooper delivered his speech to over 1600 delegates and coaches at the January NCAA Convention, expounding on the hazards of many of the ergogenic aids used by athletes, and their overuse. He has traveled extensively since.

The NCAA has taken an active role in the athletic anti-drug program. The NCAA Drug Education Committee first met October 21-22, 1970, and in the short period of time since that date, it has provided the impetus for one of the NCAA's most comprehensive programs.

The Committee, of which Robert W. Pritchard, director of athletics at Worcester Polytechnic Institute (Mass.), is chairman, is composed of Dr. Cooper, Thomas J. Hamilton, immediate past Pacific-8 Conference executive director; and James H. Wilkinson, NCAA. It was formed by the NCAA Council last August "because of the rising public concern over drug abuse by young people and athletes," Wilkinson said.

Cooper is the expert among the group, and has studied drug and ergogenic aid use by athletes perhaps more than any other physician in the country.

Unlimited Definition

"The definition of ergogenic is very unlimited," Cooper says. "According to Dorlands Medical Dictionary it is defined simply 'anything tending to increase work output.'"

Cooper categorizes athletic ergogenic aids into four main groups, emphasizing that many are dangerous and that many don't do any good at all.

"This entire area of ergogenic aids and drugs has always fascinated us. We human beings are notoriously on the prowl for a 'gimmick' or 'an easy way' or that 'special something extra.' There are no short cuts to excellent performance, but I guess it is the nature of the beast to keep striving to find some help."

The four ergogenic categories outlined by Cooper are physical and mechanical, nutritional, pharmacological

(drugs) and psychological.

The pharmacological ergogenic aids are the most dangerous and potentially harmful. Mainly two families are used—the amphetamines and anabolic androgenic steroids.

The anabolic steroids taken by weight men and the amphetamines and related "speed" and "uppers" are the drugs that Cooper says are most commonly used by athletes.

Cooper and Dr. Hardin Jones, also an NCAA drug panelist, from the University of California Berkeley, say the amphetamines have paradoxical dangers.

"When an athlete takes an amphetamine, he thinks he's the greatest," Cooper said. "A pitcher may think he's really throwing hard, but in reality he's throwing softballs up there and probably just gave up four home runs. His performance is probably worse, but he doesn't think so," Cooper commented.

"The drug is used," Jones said, "to speed up the nerve-muscle reaction, but it has a reverse effect on athletes."

"In any athletic event, the capacity of the adrenal gland to put out adrenalin is important to any athlete. But an athlete has lost some control over the mobilization of adrenalin if he takes an amphetamine before an event. And over a period of time, it may cause other difficulties."

Anabolic Steroids

The anabolic androgenic steroids, the other form of drugs taken by athletes—are used to gain weight at an extremely fast rate.

Used medically, they help the body retain protein and nitrogen, and help the building of muscle tissue.

Other steroids are given to patients with other deficiencies.

"The only way John F. Kennedy could be President was to take cortisone," Cooper said. "He had Addison's Disease and had a disfunction of his adrenal gland."

"You can give anabolic steroids to a person who is 93 pounds to start with. But to a normal human being? We just don't know the total effects. Studies done over a short period of time show there have been no adverse effects with normal dosages. But athletes sometimes are taking two, five and ten times the normal dosage."

Some studies indicate that athletes may gain weight, but don't increase their strength and quickness.

"The problems started with the weightlifters and the muscle beach boys—the body beautiful people. A

doctor at UCLA conducted a study, and concluded that anabolic androgenic steroids caused most people to gain weight, but did so because the body retained fluids. His study showed that there was no increase in speed or strength."

Jones says that the steroids are the main drugs being misused.

"It has been proven that they may cause testicular atrophy and hypertrophy of the prostate gland," Jones said.

"I consider that a pretty big danger signal."

Cortisone

He also said that cortisone is misused by some athletes, doctors and trainers.

"It is used to get an athlete back in action faster," he said, "but sometimes he plays before the actual healing takes place."

The studies into drug abuse by athletes are new and, as of yet, meaningful statistics on the amount of drug abuse by collegiate athletes are not available.

Cooper has said that a few coaches give them out like candy, and that there is probably a lot of under-the-counter traffic that "we don't know of."

"But I don't think, and can't believe, too many reputable physicians or trainers are dispensing them. Reports alleging many athletes are using drugs really aren't too scientific in their evaluations."

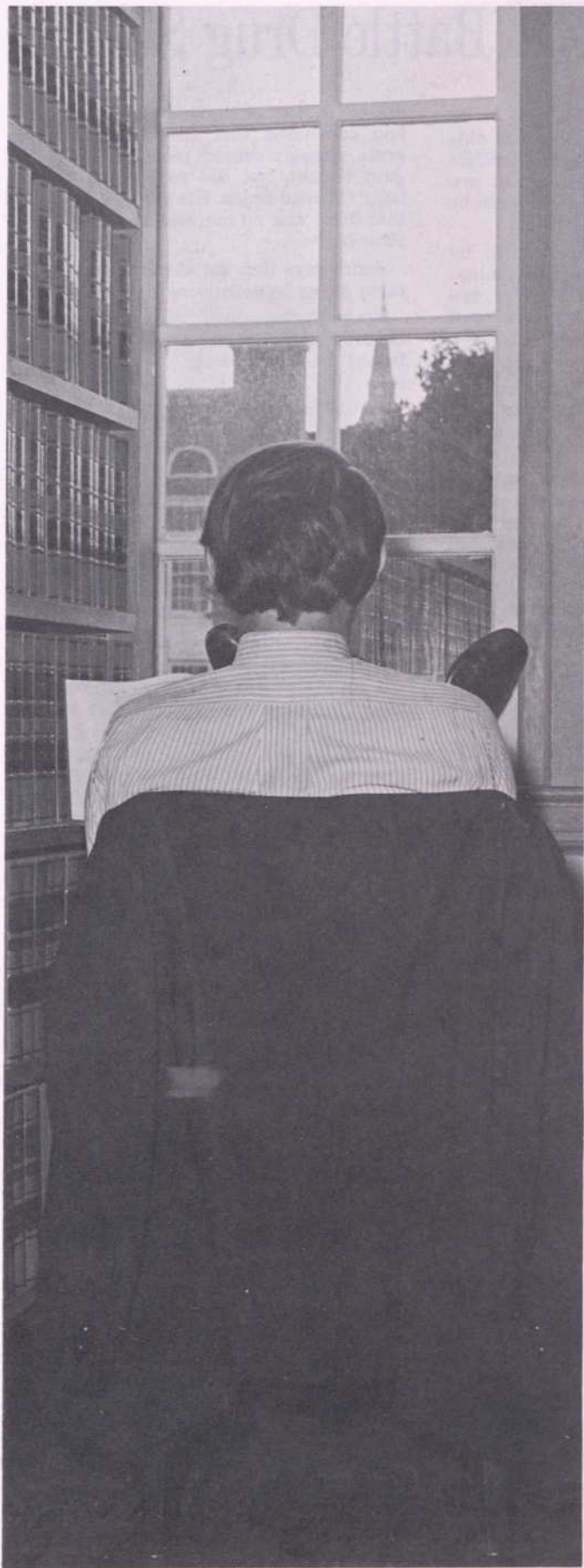
"More are using drugs than we probably think," he said. "But they do it on their own. Like the drug scene everywhere, you don't see many drug abusers. I think most of the athletes are getting the drugs from the outside."

Eternal Hope

"Hope always springs eternal that someone will find something that will make the weak stronger, and the slow faster. But there's one fact that I think should be set very straight: To our knowledge, a normal, well-fed human being can never be improved by any drug."

"Of all the people taking them, the one who holds the world record in the shot put doesn't take them. Randy Matson used to at one time, but he went off them. That's when he set the world record."

"I took care of Randy, so he's a personal friend of mine. A lot of other weight men are getting bigger, but this doesn't mean they're getting quicker and stronger. If they are, why aren't they catching Matson?"

WFU Law School Meeting Today's Needs

Technology, science, population growth, man's ever-questing mind . . . Each day our society grows more and more complex.

Somehow we must untangle the complexities, establish some order, derive some meaning. One of the best tools we have is one of the oldest: the law.

New problems demand new laws, and new interpretations of old laws. More men and women are seeking legal training today than ever before. But too many of them are confronting "No Vacancy" signs on the doors of the country's law schools. The schools simply cannot accommodate all those who seek expert legal training.

Today the Wake Forest University School of Law has taken a major step toward helping to meet the growing need for legal education.

The Wake Forest School of Law, traditionally a small school with high standards, is feeling its share of the pressure of increased demand for legal expertise. The number of applications for admission has more than doubled over the past two years. Only one of seven applicants could be accepted for the current school year. And that number of new students has brought the total enrollment to 290, a number which is severely straining the capacity of the school.

As the result of a six-week fund-raising campaign among law alumni, ground was broken today for a major addition to the law building, which will enable enrollment to reach a maximum of 440 by 1975-76. The ground-breaking was held in conjunction with the awarding of J. D. degrees to more than 500 law alumni who graduated before 1967, when LL.B. degrees were offered.

Law alumni during the past six weeks have donated money to match a generous challenge gift from Mrs. Guy T. Carswell of Charlotte, widow of a well-known alumnus of the law school.

Mrs. Carswell, who received the University's Medallion of Merit last winter, also helped to establish Wake Forest's most sought-after scholarships, the Guy and Clara Carswell Scholarship Fund, in 1968. Carswell left more than \$1 million to Wake Forest when he died in 1966.

A highlight of the ground-breaking ceremonies today was the announcement that the law building will be named for Carswell.

Estimated to cost \$500,000, the addition to the building will provide two large classrooms which can double as auditoriums, six faculty offices, a faculty lounge, additional library and study space, and space for student activities.

Coupled with the addition to the building are plans to increase annual contributions and to build a permanent endowment, so that educational improvement will be sure to accompany physical growth. Building and endowment add up to a \$3 million investment, which the School will be seeking during the next five years from alumni and others interested in the future of legal education. The annual fund will be sought each year throughout the school's future.

The funds will make possible an increase in faculty, from ten to 18 by 1975-76. The student-faculty ratio will be improved to 23-to-1 or better, even as the size of the student body increases. Faculty salaries will be increased to be more competitive with private practice.

New techniques and courses, more individualized training and more advanced work will be added to the curriculum. Clinical training will be added, to prepare students better for actual practice. Scholarships will be increased, the library strengthened, and other improvements made.

While plans call for a substantial increase in the size of the School, it will remain the smallest of the state's three major law schools. It will retain its historic small size; it will retain its historic high standards.

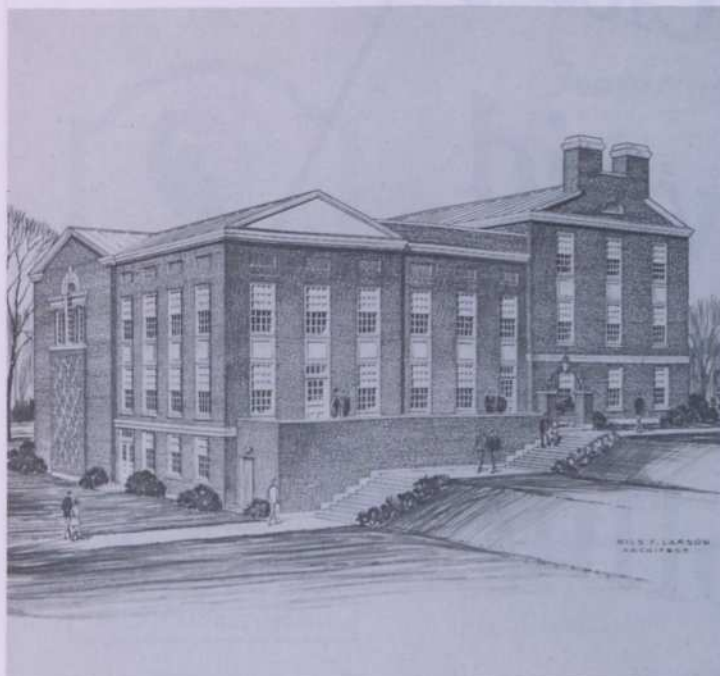
The School has made undeniable contributions to North Carolina, out of proportion to its size and financial resources. It has trained a large percentage of the state's legal and political leaders, and increasingly it is sending well-trained lawyers into important positions in other parts of the country.

Like most law schools, the School of Law of Wake Forest University is a place of tradition, but an integral part of that tradition is a dedication to serving the needs of society, however rapidly they may change.

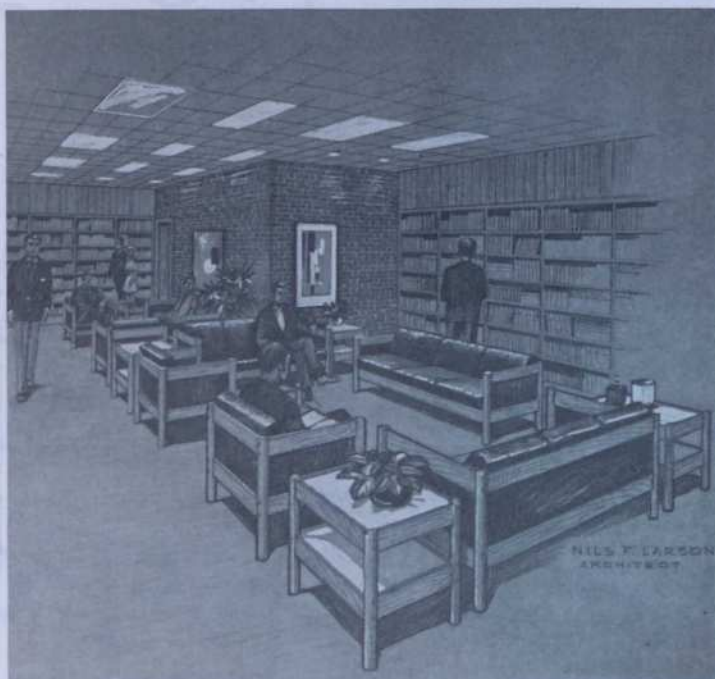
The law is an exciting field in this complex world, and the Wake Forest law school promises to be an exciting place as it adjusts to the new demands.

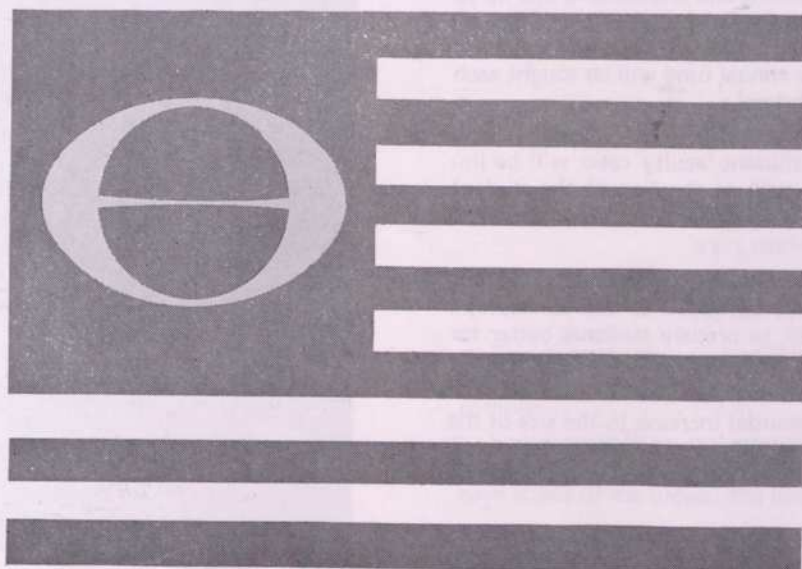


Architect's rendering of the addition to the Law School.

ACC Comments: How I Started In Athletic Training



MAX CROWDER, Duke: Several years had elapsed from the time I finished high school until I started my college days. When I enrolled at Gardner-Webb Junior College in 1958, I planned to teach and coach. However, the football coach at Gardner-Webb was an old friend, and when he learned I was coming to school there, he asked me to be his trainer. He had no trainer at the time and, even though I knew nothing about athletic training, I agreed to help him and learn as much as I could. As I learned more

about the work, I became more interested in athletic training. After two years at Gardner-Webb, I transferred to Duke where I was fortunate enough to get a job as a student-trainer working under the late Bob Chambers. During my two years at Duke, I considered myself very fortunate to be able to work with and learn from such capable people as Bob Chambers, Dr. Lenox Baker and Dr. Frank Bassett. Upon graduation in 1962, I was happy with the offer to become a fulltime trainer at Duke. This afforded me the opportunity to remain in athletics and work with young people.



JOHN LACEY, North Carolina: I've always had a great interest in athletics. When I could no longer participate as a player, I began to think of a line of work which would keep me closely involved in sports. I didn't particularly want to be a coach so I chose a career as a trainer. I knew the profession would afford me an opportunity to travel a great deal and this appealed to me. Also it meant I would have a chance to meet athletic officials and members of the medical profession across the country. I'm very

happy I chose this field. In some ways, the rewards are small. But when I treat an injured player and see him return to make a contribution to the success of our team, it gives me great satisfaction. I also take pride in the achievements of our athletes after they leave Carolina.



HERMAN BUNCH, N. C. State: Athletics has long been a consuming interest for me, beginning with participation in high school sports programs at the elementary and at the secondary level. Wishing to pursue this interest in college, I asked to work in the training room at the University of North Carolina. The two very fine trainers there, Fitz Lutz and R. A. "Doc" White, gave me excellent instruction and experience. Their encouragement was a major factor in my decision to continue work with the conditioning

and treatment of athletes. Even though for several years my work was outside the field of athletics I remained involved by volunteer work with high school athletic teams in training. In working with young people in athletics I find much personal satisfaction, lasting and invaluable friendships, and a great challenge.



FRED HOOVER, Clemson: I became interested in athletic training because of a long-time desire to work with athletics. When I started to college I wanted to become a coach, but because of my size and ability I could not participate in college football. So the next best way to learn coaching procedures and techniques was to become a manager or student trainer. I became a student trainer at Florida State University and the more I was exposed to the training profession the more interested I became in it as a

career. At this time the training profession was being upgraded and I could see many opportunities in a fast growing career field. It is a most rewarding profession because of the opportunities of working with young men and seeing them overcome the problems, injuries, joys of winning, sorrow of losing and everything else that is part of the game.



BILL (SPIDER) FRY, Maryland: I began my career in athletic training as a result of an injury sustained while playing varsity soccer at Maryland in 1946. I was treated for several weeks by the late Duke Wyre, then the head trainer at Maryland. The injury finished my playing career, but I still wanted to be a part of athletics so I applied for a position as a student trainer under Duke Wyre. As a student trainer I received instruction in the art of taping, the treatment of and, most important, the

prevention of athletic injuries. In the fall of 1947 Duke Wyre gave me my first assignment as a student trainer and manager of the varsity soccer team. I later served as assistant trainer at Maryland before becoming head trainer at Dartmouth College for five years. Since returning to Maryland as head trainer I now teach a course, "Advanced Training and Conditioning" which is available for both men and women and I feel is most beneficial to those aspiring to become trainers or coaches.



JOE GIECK, Virginia: Athletics has always been one of the most important aspects of American life. Athletic training offered me a chance to be a part of this life. It has been a great privilege for me to work with many of the fine athletes, coaches and people in the world. As a physical therapist, athletic training is most satisfying to me in that athletes have an amazing recuperative power in comparison with the general population because of a tremendous desire to excel. I started athletic training, working with

the prevention treatment and rehabilitation of athletic injuries as a junior high school student as a hobby. It is still as enjoyable now, if not more so, as it was then. To work with the youth of America has kept me young.



LEWIS (DOC) MARTIN, Wake Forest — Perhaps the one person most instrumental in me starting my career as an athletic trainer was Henry L. Langston, my junior and senior high school coach. He realized the value of a trainer to an athletic team even on the junior and senior high level and encouraged me to enter the field. It was during my junior high school days in Atlanta, Ga., and under the direction of Coach Langston, that I started in the athletic training profession. Following graduation from high school, I received a scholarship to the University of Georgia and served as student trainer there for three years. It was here that I decided on a career in athletic training. My thanks go to Coach Langston for his leadership and guidance at an early age in starting me in what I consider a most satisfying and rewarding profession.



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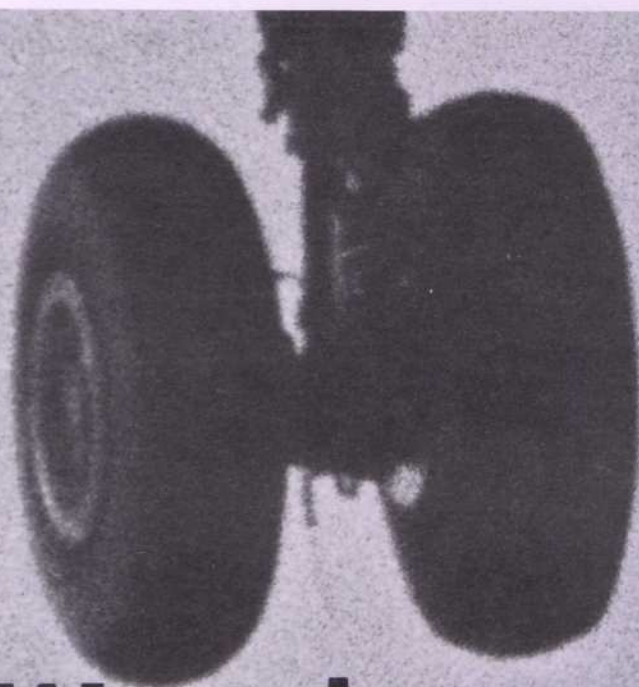

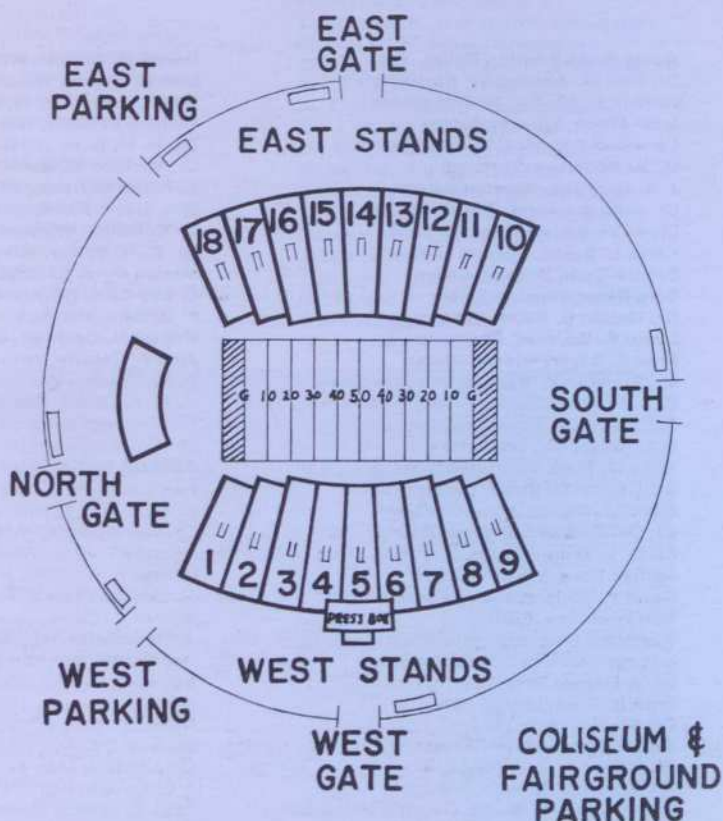
PUBLIC TELEPHONES — Pay stations are located on the concourse under the stands on both sides of the field.

TICKETS — The Athletic Ticket Office in the W. N. Reynolds Gymnasium on the campus will be open until 12 noon before the games for person desiring to purchase tickets for the remaining games on the schedule. Tickets may be purchased at the stadium after 12 noon on the days of the games.

PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEM ANNOUNCEMENTS — No special announcements are made over the public address system except in case of gravest emergency. Please do not request the service needlessly.

EMERGENCIES — FIRST AID — Attendants are on duty during the game at First Aid rooms located under the stands on both sides of the field. On the West side the room is at the Northwest corner, and on the East side at the Southeast corner. In case of illness or an accident, fans should attract the attention of the nearest arm-banded usher.

REFRESHMENT STANDS — Refreshment stands are located on both the East and West sides of the stadium on the concourse.

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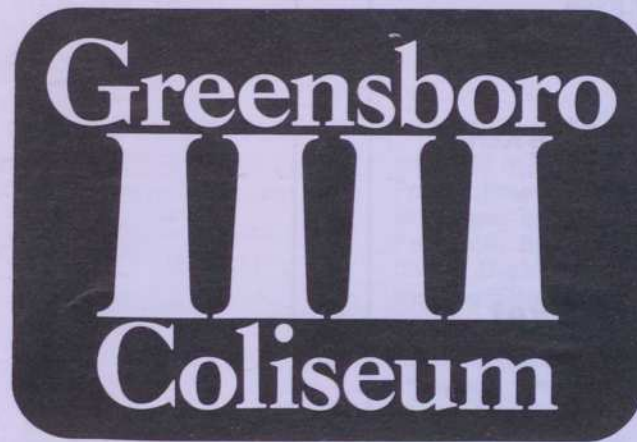

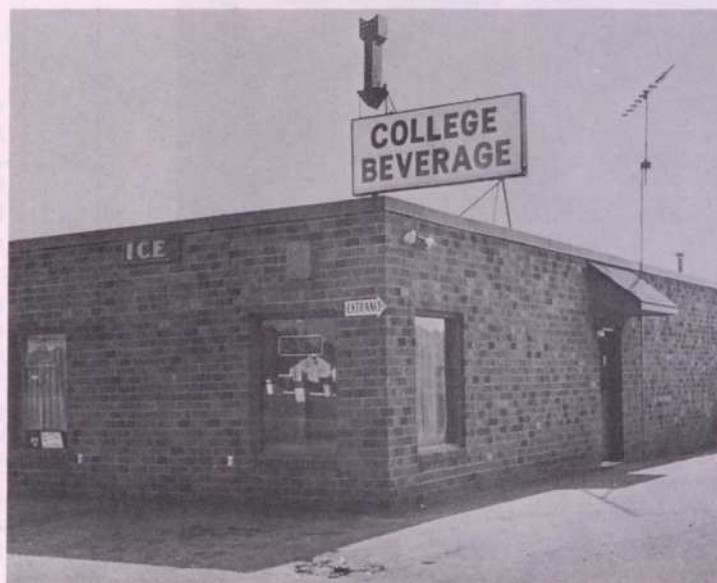

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DEACS CONTINUE GOLF TRADITION

During recent years, the Wake Forest golf program has been known as one of the best in the nation and the 1971 team kept the tradition alive.

The Deacons entered four tournaments during the regular season and captured the championship trophy in three, including their fifth straight Atlantic Coast Conference crown. Their other titles included the first annual Big Four tournament plus the Palmetto Invitational in Orangeburg, S. C.

In the NCAA tournament held in Tucson, Ariz., the Deacons finished fourth, making it the fifth straight year they have finished in the top five among the nation's best.

Not only was it an outstanding year team wise, but the Deacons further distinguished themselves in national and international competition.

Both Jim Simons and Lanny Wadkins competed in the Master's and then traveled together to Scotland for the Walker Cup matches and the British Amateur. Simons, a rising junior, advanced to the finals in the British Amateur before losing to Steve Melnyk. Wadkins also captured the individual crowns in the Red Fox and Palmetto invitational tournaments.

Simons captured the fancy of every golf fan when he fired a sizzling 65 to take the third round lead of the U. S. Open. He remained in contention for the title until the final hole before finishing fifth.

Eddie Pearce, a rising sophomore, qualified for the Greater Greensboro Open and then finished as the low amateur in the event with a two-under-par 282. The Temple Terrace, Fla., native then came back to win the prestigious North-South amateur crown with a 5-4 victory over Vinnie Giles.

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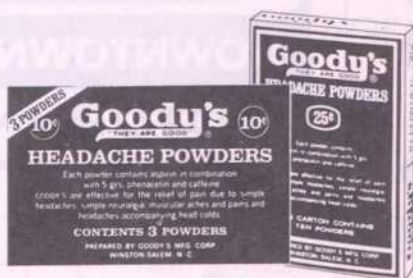
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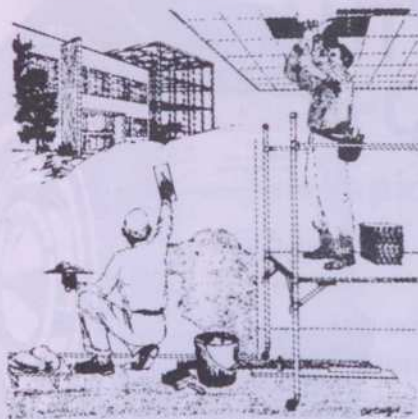

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The Trenches: "A Tough Spot To Play"

Go into a football locker room after any football game and it is easy to pick out the linemen. They are the dirtiest, sweatiest and seemingly tireddest of the players there.

Of course there is a reason for this. They hit someone on every play of the game. A back may get hit on every other play but "the men in the trenches" are in on the action every time the ball is snapped.

Yet the backs get the headlines and the big pro contracts. You never hear about a lineman signing a professional contract for half a million dollars. No, playing in the line is more like an eight-to-five job. You go in, do your job, and leave. If you do your part well nobody notices it but if a lineman makes a mistake, the whole world seems to know about it.

Bill Bobbora is one of these linemen. He does his job and does it as well as anyone in the South. He was runner-up in the voting for the Jacobs Blocking Trophy last season, an award annually given to the best offensive lineman in the ACC.

Bobbora wouldn't trade jobs with a back. He came to Wake Forest as a tight end and linebacker, but when Cal Stoll came he was moved to offensive guard.

"I can see that guard is the best position for me," said Bobbora. "I'm too short and slow to playend and we have three fine linebackers.

"The offense that we run is good for offensive backs but it is also good for offensive linemen. I know that I have done my job when the back scores or picks up a large chunk of yardage."

It is sometimes frustrating for a lineman to go through his entire college career without scoring when often times he played in the backfield in high school and crossed the goal line many times. Bobbora almost scored against Tulsa when Larry Russell fumbled into the end zone.

"I had my hands on the ball but one of the Tulsa players had it too and the official gave them the ball," said Bobbora.

Bobbora's biggest thrill at Wake Forest was the victory over N. C. State in 1969.

"That was a key game. It was our first game under Coach Stoll and we wanted to establish ourselves," said Bobbora.

"It wasn't the best game I have played but it meant the most."

"Being the Deacon is pretty cool." And Don added, "It's nice not having to sit in the stands being still when it gets exciting."

The cheerleaders seldom sit still. Their work goes far beyond the few hours a week they spend on the field at a game. There is practice twice a week, where they learn new cheers and work on the old ones. There are pep rallies to organize, posters to be made and displayed and balloons to be blown up (by machine, luckily) for each game.

During the actual games, the cheerleaders spend much of their time trying to find out just what's happening on the field. When it's cold, they keep moving to get warm. And when it's raining, "You lose your vanity," said Terry. Nancy agreed. "After the first time it rains, they've seen you at your worst."

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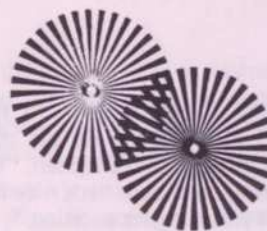
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
