HON. BRUCE WHITE MAKES THIRD MEMBER LAW FACULTY

New Law Professor Has an Established Reputation in Public Life of The State. Began his Work Monday

Hon. Bruce White, of Franklin, has notified the executive committee of the Board of Trustees of Wake Forest College of his acceptance of the position recently tendered him as Professor of Law in the Wake Forest Law School. He makes the third member of the faculty of the Law School, Dr. Needham Y. Gulley and Prof. E. W. Timberlake being the other two members. Mr. White began his work at Wake Forest Monday.

The new member of the Law faculty is a man of established reputation. In addition to having an established reputation in his profession of law, he has had extensive experience in the public life of North Carolina, as a teacher. He was Superintendent of Public Instruction in Franklin County for a number of years. Mr. White is a member of the present State Senate representing the sixth senatorial district.

Mr. White is a graduate of Wake Forest College, receiving his Master of Arts degree in 1892. He returned to Wake Forest in 1895 and attended the Law School for two sessions, and secured his law license. He has been quite successful in his practice and is a member of the law firm of Bickett, White, and Malone.

WAKE FOREST WINS FROM GUILFORD WITH EASE

Baptist Score 33 Points in the First Half. Champion Plays Star Ball

In the initial game of the season on the home grounds, Wake Forest easily defeated Guilford's football eleven last Saturday, Oct. 7, rolling up a 33 to 0 score against the Quakers.

The game started with a rush, Wake Forest kicking off to Guilford who lost the ball on downs on their own twenty five yard line. By a series of line plays by Captain Parker and Champion, the ball was pushed over the line, Champion making the first touchdown within five minutes after play was called. Shaw kicked goal. A few minutes later Blankenship intercepted a forward pass on Guilford's thirty yard line, and the Quaker defense crumbled under the hard playing of Pace, Champion and Parker and the second touchdown was made.

The Baptist's final score of the first quarter when Croom, breaking through the line, used his stiff arm effectively and raced through the whole Guilford team for a seventy-five yard run and a touchdown. During the second quarter thirteen more points were added, Parker and Champion successively carrying the ball over a few minutes before the end of the half.

In the second half, with several substitutes in the Baptist's line and backfield, Guilford stiffened on both

Athletic Field Fund Grows

The fund which was recently started for the grading and equipping of the new athletic field, is growing steadily and has passed the \$1,500 mark although only about two hundred and fifty students have contributed thus far. Various clubs are being organized, having for their purpose the securing of a pledge from each of their members. The South Carolina Club was the first to organize and had already promised to secure a contribution from every man from the Palmetto State. The Central committee is co-operating with these clubs and desires to have every student numbered among its contributors before the end of the week. The object in getting every man to contribute is two-fold, in the first place, the committee desires to raise \$2,590 from the student body, and in the second place, it wants to be able to say that every man in college is behind the movement, both in spirit and deed. When the object is reached, the success of the movement is assured.

WILSON-BICKETT CLUB IS ORGANIZED AT WAKE FOREST

First of College Clubs in State Is Organized With Prominent Democrats Present

The initial step in the formation of democratic clubs throughout the various colleges of the State was taken last Monday evening, when Mr. R. M. Gantt, of Durham, and Mr. J. M. Broughton, Jr., of Raleigh, met over three hundred enthusiastic student democrats in the Wingate Memorial Hall and organized a Wilson-Bickett Club. The following officers were elected: J. B. Rucker, President; J. C. Newton, Vice-president; D. C. Hughes, Secretary-Treasurer.

Dr. N. Y. Gulley called the meeting to order, and introduced Mr. R. M. Gantt as the first speaker of the evening. Mr. Gantt, in a very striking manner, pointed out the achievements of the Democratic party in State and Nation, paying a glowing tribute to Thomas Walter Bickett and Woodrow Wilson. He next stated the object of the meeting, explaining the nature of the organization that was to be perfected and briefly outlining the benefits to be derived from the club by its members, also showing the wholesome effect that these organizations will have upon the party.

"ON TO RALEIGH" IS THE SLOGAN AT WAKE FOREST

Large Crowd Will Witness The A. & M. Game In Raleigh On Fair Day. Special Train Will Run

Both of the football elevens of Wake Forest and A. & M. remained idle today with the exception of practice preparatory to the annual between the two teams in Raleigh next Thursday. The occasion for the game is fair day, and in addition to the students and supporters of both teams, large numbers of visitors in attendance upon State Fair will witness the contest. It is generally conceded that Wake Forest will not face as formidable and smooth-working machine on Thursday as they did last year, when the Aggies wrested a 7 to 0 victory from the Baptists. Wake Forest has been hard hit by the loss of many veterans this season, and injuries to a number of star players has handicapped the team in the games played thus far this season. But with the return of a number of players to the line-up, and it now appears that Wake Forest will face A. & M. with full strength, it is believed that Wake Forest will make A. & M. exert herself to the utmost to gain a decision.

A. & M's line from end to end weighs on an average 169 pounds, "Doc" Cook, tackle, is the giant of line, tipping the scales at 195, while Kirkpatrick, guard, is the lightest line-man with a weight of 150 pounds. From end to end Wake

Director Crozier Gives First Lecture to Gym Class

Last Monday, during the three gym periods, Prof. J. R. Crozier, gymnasium director, gave a very interesting and instructive talk on the most common human defects, their injurious effects, and the various exercises for correcting them.

He first took up the most important bones and muscles, giving the structure and functions of each. Next he explained how a drooping head is one of the worst defects, for it increases the curvature of the spine, presses in the chest, and makes the other framework change position in order that the body may preserve its centre of gravity.

Furthermore, drooping shoulders are a great evil, since, by hanging forward, they cramp the chest. One shoulder drooping causes lateral curvature of the spine. When the head and shoulders go forward, the hips and knees must follow; thus an "S" is made, and the shoulders and hips pressing upon the digestive organs, cause indigestion and other ailments.

This talk was the first of a series Prof. Crozier will give at various times throughout the year. His next will be "The Value of Exercise."

Forest's line averages 182 pounds. The two heaviest players, Shaw and Blizzard, guards, weigh 215 and 205 pounds, respectively. The lightest men are on the flanks, Harris weighing 155, Jordan 152 and Moore 140.

The Aggie backfield is extremely light. With McDougall, fullback, Rice, quarterback, Van, Brocklin and Pearson, halfbacks, constituting the backfield, the average weight is 147 1-2 pounds. Pierson the lightest member of the quartet weighing only 130 pounds. Pace quarterback, is the lightest member of the Baptist backfield, weighing 145 pounds, while Parker, fullback, is the heaviest tipping the scales at 205. With Champion, halfback, weighing 165 pounds and Croom at the other half weighing 172, the Wake Forest backfield will average exactly 172 pounds.

Coach Billings has been constantly and repeatedly shifting his backfield candidates to find the fastest and most effective quartet. Champion fully justified the judgement of the coach in shifting him from quarterback to halfback by his brilliant offensive playing in the last game. He can be called upon more to carry the ball from halfback, and his excellent interference aids his running mates to a great extent. Pace, the diminutive quarterback, runs the team with good judgement, and is one of the most dangerous men on the squad in a broken field. Croom, halfback, has shown wonderful improvement in his work and

with the needed experience he should make the team a strong halfback. His defensive prowess, however, is not up to the standard of his offensive ability. Captain Parker, fullback, has been handicapped with an injured shoulder since early in the season. He is a tower of strength to the eleven, both on offense and defense, and his return to true form would greatly enhance the strength of the Baptist eleven.

Since the game with University of North Carolina several shifts have been made in the line. Olive, guard, has been shifted to tackle, replacing Tatum, who has been confined to the hospital with sickness for the past two weeks. Blizzard is playing Olive's guard, and for a new man is showing up well. He charges well, but has a tendency to tackle too high. Blankenship has been playing a consistent game at center, Langston having been kept out of the game ever since the Carolina contest with a wrenched shoulder. Langston may be in condition to play Thursday. Moore is making a strong bid for a place as running mate to left end Harris. Jordan has not been tackling as he should, and it is a toss-up between the two players for the position.

In the Good Roads Parade to be held in Raleigh Wednesday, Oct. 18 Wake Forest will be represented by an appropriate float. A committee consisting of J. R. Crozier, F. W. Dixon, and J. S. Bullard, has the matter in hand, and Wake Forest should stand a good chance of winning the prize offered for the best decorated float in the parade.

"The Challenge of an Unfinished World"

The alumni address of Dr. W. R. Cullom, of the School of Bible, delivered at the last commencement of the Louisville Theological Seminary on, "The Challenge of an unfinished World," appears in full in the "Review and Expositor" for October, 1916.

Dr. Cullom in his address contrasts what he calls the dynamic and static conceptions of the world--the living, expanding, growing world, and the the dead, inert, drifting world, with illustrations of the history of Religion.

He concludes his address with pointed suggestions, first, in the matter of revelation; second, with reference to the virgin birth of Jesus; third, with certain current isms, as Christian Science and Russellism.

Mr. R. E. Walker, B. A. 1910; M. A. 1913, has been doing excellent reportorial work since his graduation. He left Wake Forest and connected himself with the Winston-Salem Journal, and is now with the Daily Index-Appeal, Petersburg, Va. He not only has rare journalistic ability, but shows himself capable of expressing the love of his native State in verse.

\$100 Essay Prize

One of the recent items of interest to college students is the announcement of the \$100 prize to be given, by the Lake Mohonk Conference on International Arbitration, to the undergraduate man of any college or university of the United States or Canada, submitting the best essay on "International Arbitration." This contest, which is the ninth of its kind to be held, will close March 15, 1917, but the prize will not be awarded until May 1917, as the meeting of the Mohonk Conference, to which the winner will be invited.

Any undergraduate male student is eligible to compete, who is a candidate for a bachelor's degree in any college or scientific school of the United States or Canada. The essay, which should not exceed 5000 words (preferably about 3000) should be typewritten on letter size paper; and with it should be included a list of references to all the works that have been consulted.

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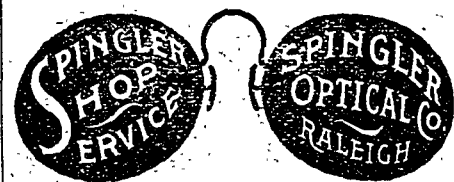

Let's Lend a Helping Hand

We have taken a long step forward with our honor system this year. The rules of the honor system as they stand are incomparably better than they were before the amendments added by the present honor committee. Compared with the light ten and thirty day suspensions of freshmen, expulsion for the rest of the term is a great improvement, but erasing the names of the upper classmen from the rolls of the college shows that at last Wake Forest has outwardly shown the contempt that she has long inwardly felt for the cheat.

The clause that has personal application to every man in school is the pledge to report anyone observed to be cheating. This clause is not popular but it is a step in the right direction. It would hardly be expected that in a college where cheating has been considered an affair between a man and his conscience that this clause would be popular, but let us see if it should not be carried out. The only reason that has been advanced against it is that no one likes to tell on a fellow student; no one cares to carry tales. A moment's reflection will show that this is a wrong view point. You would not consider that you were interfering if you stopped a man from robbing a house; and when you stop a man from cheating you not only expose an unmitigated rascal, whose crime is as great as the robbers and without the robber's excuse but you are preserving the honor of your alma mater. Wake Forest cannot hold her head high in the assembly of colleges unless her sons keep her honor bright. Some

few rascals should not be allowed to cheapen a degree from Wake Forest by their dishonest practices.

We may not rid ourselves of this vice this year but we are started on a crusade against dishonesty and no loyal son of the college can refuse to come to her aid. Reforms are not carried through in a day but we do not question that the day will come, and indeed it is not far distant, when the name of cheating in this school will be the fable of a bygone generation of students. Wake Forest has the right to demand of every son that he join with her for the common good and see that the benefits of these rules be not a dead letter but the foundation of the best honor system in the South.

Literary Larceny

Every man who uses the college library has felt the explosive vexation that strains his moral safety valve, when after searching the card index he happily comes upon the number of the book he wants, only to find it subscribed "lost" or "missing." It is dismaying to observe how many valuable books are gone, and how many of the costly library editions and sets of authors are broken by the loss of one or more volumes. And where are these errant books? They are flown on the diabolic wings of theft. Does the fault rest with the library administration? Not altogether, for the librarians must presume upon honesty in those who have access to the reference shelves and especially in those who go among the stacks; and they are helpless when they must depend upon honesty that is not.

It is ignominy enough that there should be students among us who degrade themselves to any thievery. It is infamy unutterable that there should be scoundrels so base as to steal the books of our library. For those books are the property of the students, and larceners of them become public enemies. Let us eradicate this unprincipled sect of literary thieves from our midst by referring all cases of book-theft to the Honor Committee, whose duty is to deal with such matters, and by demanding that the committee shall take effective penal action.

First Lecture Number Pleases

The College Committee on Lectures offered the first attraction of the season on last Saturday night, in a concert by the Original Strollers Quartette. The program was varied, comprising solos, readings, impersonations, and renditions on the bells, as well as quartet music. The large audience attested its appreciation by continued applause, to which the musicians were liberal in returning with encores.

The Lecture committee is to be commended, we believe, upon the policy of intermixing a few light

entertainments with the usual number of more serious addresses. The students, being young humanities, need some forms of amusement at seasonable times, and if they are not supplied with the right sort they are apt to furnish themselves with something otherwise.

offensive and defensive play, holding Wake Forest scoreless throughout the remainder of the game. The play in this half was marred by the frequent fumbling of both teams and by rather slow work which was probably due to the excessive heat. The inexperience of Guilford was shown by her frequent fumbles, which proved costly, by a lack of teamwork in the backfield, and the tendency of line-men to tackle too high. For the Quakers, the work of Captain Jones at right end and Hollowell at full back stood out most prominently.

The change in the Baptist backfield was all that could be desired. Pace, in his new position at quarterback, displayed his versatility, and run the play off with snap and good generalship at all times. Champion, the famous Raleigh High School star, run excellent interference for his treatments and smashed the Quaker line for telling gains time and again. The hard, consistent playing of Croom, who featured the game with his sensational seventy-five yard broken field run, and excellent offensive and defensive work of Captain Parker were important factors in the victory. Harris at end displayed his old time form and speed until an injury forced him to retire from the game. Blankenship played a creditable game at center, and Blizzard showed up well at guard.

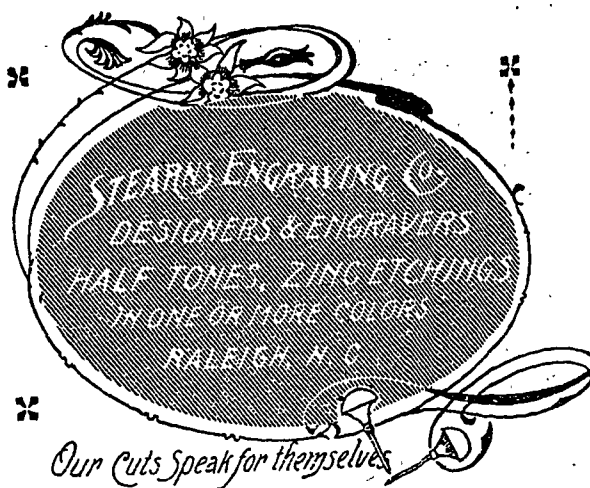
The change in date and the assurance of having the girls from Meredith point to a most successful celebration.

ing over to Dr. Gulley, who conducted the election of club officers. The way had scarcely been opened for presidential nomination before groups of men were on their feet, clamoring for recognition. A number of fiery speeches were made by politically inclined gentlemen, no effort being spared by campaign managers to recount the outstanding qualifications of the respective candidates. For a while it seemed that a second Baltimore Convention had been called and was facing a dead locked situation. However, this was prevented by the shifting over of a few delegations and the clever maneuvering of politicians. The ballot resulted in the election of John B. Rucker as president.

Mr. Rucker made a very elaborate introduction of J. M. Broughton, Jr., as the second speaker of the evening.

Mr. Broughton, an alumnus of the college, expressed pleasure in having an opportunity to return to Wake Forest, and referred to the splendid representation that the college has in party leadership. The speaker next made a brief mention of the democratic achievements, speaking very highly of the democratic gubernatorial nominee, and commented upon the all-roundness of Woodrow Wilson. The chairman of the County Democratic executive committee made "Americanism" the key-note of his speech, showing that a broad spirit of Americanism is more prevalent among our people to-day than ever before. He said that it had been almost universally adopted as the slogan of the present campaign.

Mr. Broughton also stressed the importance of every student lining himself up while in college, remarking that the men who are active in college politics, invariably become the statesmen and party leaders out in the world. In his closing remarks, the speaker pointed out the rare opportunities afforded college students for party service and leadership.

Short talks were then made by Dr. W. L. Poteat, Prof. H. A. Jones, and T. E. Holding.

The organization of the Wilson-Bickett club, on the whole, was a success. Democratic members of the student body have fondly anticipated the organization of this club, and some of the leaders say that every effort possible will be put forth to extend its influence to the points where it will count for most. It is planned from time to time to have prominent Democrats address the club.

Dr. Sledd Heard Monday

Dr. B. F. Sledd delivered an interesting address before the Y. M. C. A. Monday evening in which he discussed chiefly the problems that young men of America will have to face after the European War.

Dr. Sledd laid down as a basis for his remarks the statement that when the war is over there will be a complete change of conditions and then proceeded to show how we are to meet this new order of things. He mentioned first, however, the wonderful opportunities on the sea this country has lost since the beginning of the present war. He declared that the refusal of Congress to buy the ships that have been rotting in American harbors, because they were not made of American material, and feed the world, has lost to America a wonderful opportunity to become a power on the sea.

In speaking of what we are going to do with our local opportunities, Dr. Sledd said that we have got to produce; that we can't depend on the west any longer to feed this nation, but the people of the South should go to work and have more scientific production.

The second means of preparing to meet the future problems, as mentioned by the speaker, is to educate. "Not only should we send to college," but we should offer training in thrift and industry."

In closing, Dr. Sledd said that the Southern boy has such opportunities now as he has never had before,

that they are only beginning, and that the Southern boy, in order to take advantage of these opportunities should learn to love hard work and submit to rigid discipline.
